

NATIONAL GUARD MAY START FOR BORDER IN NEXT 24 HOURS

State Troop Movement Awaits Decision of Formal Orders From White House.

RUSH PLANS BEING LAID

Reference Is Made With Transportation Officials to Arrange Details for Handling of Troop Trains.

Washington, June 22.—(U. N. S.)—Whether any national guard troops will move to the border tonight or tomorrow will depend upon orders from the White House.

The administration is proceeding upon the assumption that intervention upon the immediate front are being laid for the rushing of the entire national guard to the border.

Secretary of War Baker spent the whole day, with the exception of a few hours, in the White House, in the mobilization and transportation of the troops as soon as the president gives the word.

Carranza Meeting With Cabinet. Early today Secretary Lansing received from Special Agent James Lynn Rodgers at Mexico City a message stating that General Carranza had received the American note and that his cabinet had gone into secret session.

The tremendous problem of handling the 100,000 national guardsmen, should they be rushed to the border, was disposed of today in the developments of the following plans:

Regular Army to Be Increased. Four regiments of infantry, two regiments of cavalry and two regiments of engineers, authorized by congress will be sent for service as soon after July 1 as possible.

Department commanders have discretion to select the regiments that may be ready and send them according to plan already made.

A conference of railway traffic managers was held at the quartermaster's department today. These are the details of the movement:

Five Pullman coaches and 43 day coaches will be allotted to one regiment of infantry, composed of 85 officers, 1890 men, 177 animals and 22 vehicles.

Car Allotments for Cavalry. Eight Pullman coaches and 25 day coaches will be allotted to one regiment of cavalry, composed of 54 officers, 1284 men, 1485 animals and 26 vehicles.

Nine Pullman coaches, 25 day coaches and flat cars will be required for a regiment of artillery carrying 45 officers, 1170 men, 1167 animals and 35 vehicles.

A regiment of engineers will be assigned to two Pullman coaches and 12 day coaches for 16 officers, 502 men, 165 animals and 12 vehicles.

A signal corps outfit will require two Pullman cars and four coaches for nine officers, 111 men, 206 animals and 15 vehicles.

Mexico City Is Terminal. Conditions in Mexico City that have reached the limit of endurance were again reported today by Special Agent Rodgers.

Carranza has promised that a complete refugee train will leave Mexico City for Vera Cruz. He also has promised that this train will have ample protection.

Members of the diplomatic corps also may leave Mexico City for Vera Cruz on this train. Private reports to the state department are that mob violence cannot long be postponed.

Food supplies have gone up 900 percent in value. There are still in Mexico City adherents of the Zapata regime who are trying to precipitate trouble.

Mexican Navy of 2 Ships Concentrating

The Zaragoza and Bravo in Waters on Southeast Coast of Country—Both Reported in Uncertain Condition.

Washington, June 22.—(U. P.)—The Mexican navy is concentrating off the southeast coast of Mexico.

The navy consists of the Zaragoza and the Bravo.

The Zaragoza is an 1181 ton training ship that carried the name of Porfirio Diaz until Diaz lost popularity in the republic.

It is 313 feet long and 32 feet wide and carries two 4.7 inch guns, two 34 inch six pounders and two one-pounders, similar to those used by American warships to fire a salute.

The Bravo is a 1260 ton gunboat, 249 feet long, carrying two four inch guns, six 6 pounders and a torpedo tube. The Mexican navy at present has no torpedoes.

"Lucky" Baldwin's Daughter Will Charge Judges of Recent Oakland Dog Show With Unfairness.

San Francisco, June 22.—(P. N. S.)—Charges of unfairness and trickery in the "dog game" on the Pacific coast which are to be lodged with the American Kennel club by Mrs. Anita M. Baldwin, daughter of "Lucky" Baldwin, today caused a furor in kennel circles here.

Mrs. Baldwin, who as owner of the famous Anokias kennels has put many thousands of dollars into pedigree dogs, is after the scalps of Jack Bardshaw, a well known handler, and Dr. George W. Clayton of Chicago, judge at the recent show at Oakland.

Mrs. Baldwin declares that B. A. Shaw "fixed" the decisions at the Oakland show so that A. B. Korbel's English bull dog, Country Model, was placed over her imported dog, Falls-White Knight. She plans to have the American Kennel club annul all of Clayton's decisions at the Oakland show as being plainly biased.

M'CAMANT IS TO BE NAMED A JUSTICE OF THE SUPREME COURT

Portland Man Said to Have Been "Slated" by Governor Withycombe.

JUDGE EAKIN MAY RETIRE

Record Shows That McCamant Has Consistently Opposed Enactment of So-Called Popular Laws.

Wallace McCamant of Portland will be appointed a justice of the supreme court of Oregon by Governor Withycombe upon the retirement of Justice Eakin. This is the information that comes by direct route from the governor's office.

Justice Eakin has been in poor health for some months and for a long time seldom has sat with the supreme court in its deliberations. It has been rumored for some time that he contemplated resignation in order that he might seek recuperation through travel and relief from the responsibility incident to his position upon the bench.

Mr. McCamant is one of the best known corporation lawyers of the state. He has consistently opposed the enactment of the so-called popular laws by the legislature and the people of Oregon, and the growth of the so-called Oregon system of government, such as the initiative and referendum, the direct primary law, the direct election of United States senators.

Mr. McCamant was the nominee of the assembly of 1916 for supreme judge and made the race for the nomination against Henry J. Bean. He was defeated by Bean because of his record as a reactionary and of his opposition to popular legislation.
