

SINNOTT MAKES EFFORT TO GET 40 PER CENT FOR OREGON PROJECTS

Bill Is Introduced Amending O.-C. Land Grant Measure of Reclamation Clause.

BELIEVED TO BE BURIED

Efforts of Representative to Have It Go Before Other Than Public Lands Committee Fails.

Washington, June 23.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL).—Representative Sinnott has introduced a bill amending the land grant measure to require 40 per cent of the proceeds applied to reclamation to be spent on Oregon projects. His endeavor to have it referred to some other than the public lands committee but the speaker insisted it should go to that committee where it will slumber indefinitely. Sinnott will introduce other bills amending the land grant act, one of the first being to allow homestead rights to timber purchasers.

Will Classify Grant.
Washington, June 23.—(U. P.).—Sharp, connected with the land office in Portland, is expected here today to confer with Commissioner Tallman concerning classification and other preliminary work on opening the land grant states a tentative map is being prepared as a basis for classification work which will start about July 1. In the meantime no rights can be acquired except mineral land entries, which can be made at once. All haste will be made in classifying the land and making the segregation to show the land on which taxes will be advanced. It appears probable the lands will not be opened to entry or the timber offered for sale during the present year.

Expect Astoria Ruling.
Washington, June 23.—A ruling on the rehearing of the Astoria rate case is probable early in July. The commission is usually seeking to close up important pending matters by that time. There is no definite information, however.

Mexican Killed in California Race Riot

Needles, Cal., Scene of Clash That Results Fatally to One and Wounding of Others—More Trouble Is Feared.

Needles, Cal., June 23.—(U. P.).—One Mexican is dead here today, one other seriously wounded from a gunshot and several others slightly hurt as a result of a clash between whites and Mexicans here.

The Mexicans greatly outnumbered the American population. All saloons have been closed to Mexicans, and deputies this afternoon arrived from San Bernardino and Redlands to reinforce officers here. Bitter feeling between the factions may smolder into a flame at any time, it was indicated.

Another Pioneer Dies.

John Day, Or., June 23.—In the death of Robert Officer, which occurred here early Sunday morning, Grant county lost one of its few remaining pioneers. Mr. Officer was born in Jackson county, Missouri, March 2, 1837, and was 79 years old. He had been a resident of Oregon for more than three score years, having crossed the plains in 1846.

San Jose People Join Big Demonstration

Thousands Parade With Flags Singing "America" on Word of the Death of American Troopers in Mexico.
San Jose, Cal., June 23.—(P. N. S.).—In a patriotic demonstration absolutely unique in the history of the city, San Jose shut up shops and schools yesterday while thousands of people marched through the streets for hours, carrying flags and singing "America" and "The Star Spangled Banner." The call for the parade was issued Wednesday night upon receipt of news of the death of troopers of the Tenth cavalry in Mexico, and the overwhelming response thrilled thousands who packed the streets and cheered themselves hoarse at the sight of the army's khaki.

"BUFFALO" VERNON AT PHILOMATH ROUND-UP "ROPES" HIGH HONORS

Sustains Reputation as the Champion Steer Bull-Dogger; Albany People Present.

Philomath, Or., June 23.—"Buff" Vernon has sustained his reputation as champion steer bull-dogger of the world. He was the big star at the opening day of the Second Annual Cowman's Carnival and Round-up. He won the roping contest, roping, throwing and hog-tying his steer in 31 seconds.

He won the steer bull-dogging event in 52 seconds after a hard fight with the animal, and the ease and grace with which he handled the larriat was a revelation to most of the 3000 present. Others who shone brightly were "Broncho" Hob Hall, whose act of bull-dogging a steer from an auto was a thrilling feature. R. P. McClelland, who won second in the roping contest, and Buck Foster and Joe Widenour.

Damage Suit Is Lost By North Bend Man

J. T. McGuire, Postmaster, Must Pay Miss Amelia Volz \$350 for Alleged Damaging Statements Made by Him.
Marshfield, Or., June 23.—A jury in the circuit court awarded to Miss Amelia Volz damages in the sum of \$350 against J. T. McGuire, postmaster of North Bend. It was alleged that McGuire made damaging statements against Miss Volz after she had quit the employ of the postoffice. Another suit charging McGuire with assault, was dismissed.

Timber Sale Advertised.
Hood River, Or., June 23.—The government has advertised the sale of 4,000,000 feet of fir timber in Hood River county and has informed bidders that no bid for less than \$1.15 per thousand feet board measure will be accepted. The county will receive 25 per cent of the proceeds of the sale.

AUTHORITY IS GRANTED TO ORGANIZE FOUR ADDITIONAL COMPANIES

Marshfield to Have One, Location of Other Three to Be Determined.

Orders were received yesterday by Adjutant General White, authorizing the organization of four additional companies of coast artillery, raising the number to twelve, full regimental strength.

Shortly after orders for mobilization of the Oregon national guard were received by General White, the coast artillery was placed at the disposal of the war department as infantry. Wednesday the offer was again wired, and yesterday a dispatch from Brigadier General A. L. Mills, chief of the militia bureau at Washington, D. C., carried the desired authority to form the four companies.

Were Old Fourth Regiment.
Before they assumed the duties of the coast artillery, which was several years ago, the companies composed the old Fourth regiment of infantry. Acting on the advice of the chief of the militia bureau, General White wired Captain Walter C. Hinman at Marshfield, giving him authority to recruit for one of the new companies. So far this is the only town receiving the commission, and where the other three will be established is uncertain. General White stated last night that wherever they go, it will not be one of the towns where any of the eight are located.

President Strahorn Gives Views on Road

Cost of Proposed Line From Yakima Country to Columbia River Is Estimated as \$50,000 a Mile.

Asked what he thought of the proposed railroad connection between the Yakima country and the Columbia river, Robert E. Strahorn, president of the Oregon, California & Eastern Railway company, said: "Aside from my conviction that it would be a great boon to the intermediate country, I do not believe it is entirely proper for me to say what I think of it."

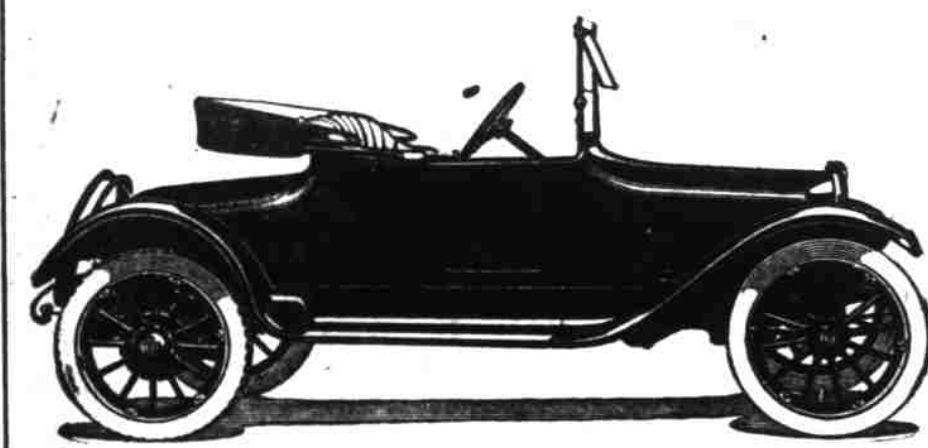
