

PRUSSIAN MILITARISM MUST BE WIPED OUT, SAYS GREAT RUSSIAN

"Pillar of Triple Entente"
Says Peace Talk Is Futile
Until Teutons Submit.

ALLIES GROW STRONGER

Germany Is Declared by Minister
Sazonoff to Have Lost but
Entente Has Not Yet Won.

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Petrograd, June 23.—(U. P.)—Peace must come only when allied soil is swept clean of the enemy and Prussian militarism forever crushed, S. D. Sazonoff, Russian minister of foreign affairs, sometimes called "The Pillar of the Triple Entente," said in an exclusive interview today. Minister Sazonoff had just returned from the Russian front. In a private audience he outlined Russian attitude toward the peace talk current in neutral countries, especially in America. "Germany," said the foreign minister, "set upon us without warning. Now, having signally failed to beat Europe into submission and finding her intended victims getting the upper hand, she covers her face with the mask of piety and endeavors to throw upon the allies the blame for making the war. Such a procedure is an open avowal of her own weakness and an attempt to hide her own unenviable situation—a fact which I believe the world will soon realize, if it doesn't already."

Peace Talk Now Futile.

"Peace talk now is doubly futile. Germany assuredly has not won the war. Hence, she is not in a position to say anything. We cannot say yes that we are the victors, so peace suggestions are unfriendly to us."

"German power is clearly waning. The strength of the allies increasing, as is proved by the daily events in the fighting at Verdun and in the advance of the Russian front, as well as by success of the allies in the Skagerak naval battle and the victories in Asia Minor."

Militarism Is Enemy.

"Prussia set out to impose her destiny. It was willed that the allies should defend the other. We are faithful to the trust. We are mutually pledged to do that. We were never so united as now and never so strong. We wish peace as ardently as anyone, but it must be the right sort. Peace must be permanent which means that Prussian militarism must go. After all it is this militarism we are combating rather than Germany."

Minister Sazonoff was asked about commercial relations between Russia and the United States. "I see no real obstacle in the way of the closest commercial relations between Russia and America," he replied. "The idea has my hearty support. I quite share your able aim."

Polish Situation Discussed.

Discussing the Polish situation the foreign minister said he greatly appreciated America's general steps to feed the unfortunate people of Poland. "The population there is badly treated by the enemy," he added. "They continue to increase the number of prisoners, thus increasing the hunger and suffering. Russia already has shown her appreciation of endeavor to relieve Poland by permitting food to enter the country, despite the fact that Germany might take advantage of the situation to divert part of the supplies to her own use. I regret deeply that Germany has refused to agree not to remove foodstuffs already in Poland. This renders it difficult to admit new American supplies."

"Your excellency has just returned from the front; what is your impression?" he was asked.

"The spirit of the army is excellent," he replied, "and the troops are thoroughly confident of their success. I return immensely pleased."

SMASHING ATTACKS ON WEST FRONT EXPECTED TO COVER WITHDRAWAL

London, June 23.—(U. P.)—Smashing German attacks on the British and Belgian positions, as well as at Verdun in the Champagne, are expected hourly by British military critics as a counter to the Russian advance.

Germany, according to secret advice from the northern section of the French front, is drawing heavily on her reserves in France and Belgium to reinforce the armies of Field Marshal von Hindenburg and General von Bothmer, which are attacking the Russians from the Divina to the Pripiet marshes. It has always been the German plan to cover any weakening of their line by the immediate initiation of an offensive and it is believed certain that heavy attacks on the British will follow the known diversion of big military units from the French to the Russian front.

All information reaching London today from the Russian front was to the effect that the Germans are still hammering heavily against the armies of General Brusiloff. For the present, no attempt is being made to stem the tide of Russian advance in the south, and the Germans seem to be allowing the army of General Pflanzer to take care of itself in Bukovina, where the Russians are reported still pushing on in a wide front, after their capture of Radatz yesterday.

Little news has come through of the activities of the Russians in northern Galicia, but unverified reports that the Austrians have arranged for the evacuation of Lemberg point to an extension of the Russian controlled terrain in that region. It is now believed that the Russians in the north will simply try to check any offensive by Von Hindenburg, and that their principal efforts will be made on the southern portion of their line of advance.

2 Killed, 6 Fatally Injured in Collision

Freight Car Strikes Crowded Passenger Car on Electric Line Near Newcastle, Pa., during Heavy Fog.

Newcastle, Pa., June 23.—(U. P.)—Two persons were killed and six probably fatally injured when a freight car on the Harmony electric line struck a passenger car, crowded with workers during a heavy fog at North Sewickley stop, near here, today. Two of the six seriously injured have both legs cut off and little hope is held for their recovery.

ATTORNEYS BUCKLE DOWN TO WORK ON THE MARBLEHEAD

HANDS ARE BLISTERED

Men Are Taught How to Handle Ship's Cutters and How the Small Boats; Much Enthusiasm.

If there are those in Portland who think that the lawyers are unpatriotic they should go down to the cruiser Marblehead early Wednesday night and watch the members of the lawyers' auxiliary of the Oregon naval militia in action.

There are about 60 of them in this organization, which includes some of Portland's most prominent attorneys, and they are not afraid to work and take orders.

The lawyers' auxiliary participated in a boat drill on the river last night and even though there were many blistered palms after nearly an hour's rowing in the big cutters the men were as much enthused with the drill as they were before they began.

Some people might think that these lawyers were members of the organization for personal glory, but that is far from being the case, if their actions can be taken to mean anything. They are there in the interests of preparedness and want to do their share in case of war.

The members are not boys, either. They are men of mature age and some of them are getting along in years. Their age does not deter them from taking an active part in the work, however.

Last night they were taught how to handle the ship's cutters, how to row the boats and what to do when they were ordered into a boat. The drills took place on the Willamette river between the Hawthorne bridge and Ross Island.

Canada Puts Ban On Teuton Visitors

Native of Central European Countries
Naturalized in United States Not
Barred If They Carry Their Papers.

Washington, June 23.—(U. P.)—The Canadian government has placed a ban on citizens of Germany, Austria-Hungary, Turkey and Bulgaria traveling in Canada. A statement from the Canadian superintendent of immigration says:

"Persons born in Germany, Austria-Hungary, Bulgaria or Turkey and who still remain citizens of one or the other of these countries, should not visit Canada at this time."

"Persons born in one or the other of the countries named, but who have been naturalized in the United States, may visit Canada, but they should carry their United States naturalization papers."

Would Provide for Soldiers' Families

Chairman Hay of House Military Committee Proposes Appropriation to Aid Those Dependent on Guardians.

Washington, June 23.—(U. P.)—Chairman Hay of the house military committee yesterday announced he will offer a committee amendment to the army appropriation bill to appropriate \$500,000 for the support of families of national guardians who have been drafted into the service. The amendment provides that the family of each enlisted man shall be entitled to an allowance of \$50 a month while the head of that family is serving. It is further provided that the word "family" shall include dependent mothers and sisters, as well

as brothers under the age of 14 years. The offering of such an amendment by the chairman of the military affairs committee practically insures its adoption as a part of the army bill. Mr. Hay said that if \$500,000 is not sufficient, a larger sum will be proposed.
