

PRIMARY CANDIDATES TELL HOW MUCH THEY SPENT IN CAMPAIGN

Total Expenditures of All the
Seekers for All Offices
Amounted to \$56,942.95.

REPORTS ARE NOW ON FILE

Moore, Unsuccessful for Secretary of
State, Expended More Than Olcott
Who Won the Nomination.

Salem, Or., June 24.—Total expenditures of all candidates for all offices in the May primary election reached \$56,942.95.

In behalf of the candidacy of Albert B. Cummings of Iowa, for the Republican nomination for president, George C. Howard of Multnomah county, spent \$656.40, according to the expense list made public at the office of Secretary of State Olcott Friday evening. In behalf of Theodore E. Burton of Ohio, candidate for president, O. C. Bortzmeier of Multnomah county, spent \$489.56. Charles E. Lockwood's expenses as a presidential candidate totaled only 10 cents.

For representative in congress, Third district, H. W. Littlefield leads the list with \$1021.50 spent personally and \$1,992.51 spent through L. E. Sauve, treasurer of Littlefield for Congress Fund. Expenses of other congressional candidates were as follows:

A. W. Lafferty, \$416; C. N. McArthur, \$674.44; E. W. Hoyt, in behalf of McArthur, \$1,729.95; H. S. McCutchen, chairman and treasurer of McArthur campaign committee, in behalf of McArthur, \$125; John A. Jeffrey, Democratic, \$40.

Looser Spends More.
Charles B. Moore, candidate for secretary of state, spent considerably more than his successful opponent, Ben W. Olcott, the list being as follows: Charles B. Moore, \$881.07; M. J. Chobness, in behalf of Moore, \$1,023.85; Ben W. Olcott, \$51.34; George E. Waters, in behalf of Olcott, \$49.65.

Candidates for justice of the supreme court were conservative in their expenditures, having no opposition. Justice Burnett spent \$51.34 and Chief Justice Moore \$43.32.

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Delegates Were Economical.
None of the candidates for delegates spent more than \$100 in the Second district. Will R. King leading with \$99.94. Those spending over \$100 in the Third district were Fred A. Jacobs, Republican, \$100.93; David E. Loggren, Republican, \$109.70; Thomas Mannix, Republican, \$106.75; and George A. Lovejoy, Democrat, \$218.75.

John D. Mickle, Republican, unopposed for dairy and food commissioner, spent \$100.

Candidates for public service commissioner spent the following sums: Eastern district, H. H. Corey, \$176.31; James M. Kyle, \$590.83; J. W. McCulloch, \$577.30; Robert Service, \$292.55; Ed Wright, \$453.79.

Western district—Buchtel, \$555.56; Campbell, \$339.65.

John C. McCue spent \$537.87 in his own behalf as a candidate for the Republican nomination for district attorney of Multnomah county and, in addition, the McCue campaign committee spent \$557.10 and Burge E. Leonard \$100. Walter Evans, McCue's opponent, spent \$422.25.

Week's Accidents Reported.

Salem, Or., June 23.—Two hundred and eighty accidents, three of which were fatal, were reported to the state industrial accident commission during the week ending Thursday, the fatalities being as follows: Ed Kelly, Skamokawa, Wash., and E. J. Lyster, Bay City, Michigan, and J. A. Simpson, Buxton, quarry. The total number reported, 219, were subject to the workmen's compensation act. The number of accidents by industry follows: Sawmill 92, logging 47, construction 21, R. R. operation 14, paper mill 14, meat packing 10, light and power 11, iron and steel works 14, transportation 6, machine shop 7, mining 4, sand and gravel 13, fuel company 2, farming 2, creamery 3, passenger 3, bakery 4, cannery 3, varnish manufacturing 2, cooperage 2, telephone and telegraph company 2, quarry 2 and for the following one each: Plumbing, refinery, tank and pipe, milling, furniture manufacturing, stone works, condensary, dredging, brick and tile, glove manufacturing, woolen mills, grocery store.

Progressive Banner Floats Over Fulton-Williams Fort

The Two Leaders "Point With Pride" to the Echoes of the Past,
Shouting the Battle Cry, "The Old Guard Is Dead,
Let's Let the People Rule."

Some of those progressives who fought under the banner of Roosevelt in 1912, and are veterans of the various other campaigns prior and subsequent to that time in which the progressive legislation and principles were at issue, have been urking enough to cavil at the paucity of progressive leadership worn home from Chicago by National Committeeman Ralph E. Williams and Senator Charles W. Fulton. They are super-critical enough to say that the uniforms do not fit and have been doctored to warm the breast of political expediency rather than to cover hearts inflamed with the clear and undying fire of the progressive cause.

But on the other hand there are those who, looking back over the past and the political records of Mr. Williams and of Senator Fulton, can find a fertile field of progressive endeavor from which to cultivate pregnant hopes for the future.

For instance, these hopeful men can remember the senatorial campaign of 1908 when Senator Fulton in his key-note speech at Corvallis took his position firmly and in the face of certain stand-pat disapproval upon the advanced progressive ground that the direct election of United States senators was contrary to the principles of representative and constitutional government, that Statement One was a reactionary makeshift, contrary to all accepted precedent and that he would sacrifice his office rather than fight shoulder to shoulder with the reactionaries of the state under such a heretical flag.

Then again it is remembered how Senator Fulton, Committeeman Williams, Ormsby McHarg, the Oregonian, and all those other tried and true progressives, like the heroic Light Bri-

gade at the battle of Balaklava, made their historic charge against the legislature of 1907 and went down to glorious defeat in their effort to force the stand-pat reactionaries of the house and senate to repudiate their foolish Statement One pledges and get back into the progressive column by refusing to ratify the popular vote given George E. Chamberlain.

Then also it is well remembered how valiantly Mr. Williams and Senator Fulton fought for the great progressive movement which culminated in the assembly of 1910 when Jay Bowdman was nominated for governor, and which had as its cardinal virtue the progressive principle that the progressive leaders of the state should select the candidate for governor rather than the reactionary voters.

Marching forward a couple of years it is also remembered how Mr. Williams fought under the progressive banner at the Chicago convention of 1912, which steam-rolled that arch-stand-patter Theodore Roosevelt and his "old guard" delegates out of the Republican national convention, and nominated the well known progressive, W. H. Taft, for president.

And further, but not finally, can be cited the eloquent and progressive appeals made by Senator Fulton at the recent land grant conference where he urged that the Southern Pacific should not be robbed of its birthright by an unfeeling and stand pat congress in the disposition of the grant lands.

Taking it all in all it would seem to be excessively hypercritical for any one to suggest that Ralph E. Williams and C. W. Fulton have not been in the past, and are not now, really and truly simon pure disciples of 18 carat progressiveness.

"We believe that the only useful purposes which could be served by its inquiry is a consideration of the propriety of the methods now in use for the appointment and discharge of teachers, whether prescribed by law or otherwise, and propose to limit its investigation to that point as far as possible, excluding personalities, and especially excluding attacks upon the motives of the school board and of the defendant or complaints in the Kerchen case."
