Portland Women," and asked the "100,-000 Portland women" if they were going to allow the city commissioners to "secretly legislate away their lib-

The men arrested were John LeGath, aged 28; William LaBrance, 19 years; Gus Huble, 23 years, and George Mayers, 32 years. They had about 4000 of the leaflets, but refused to tell where he had gotten them. The

men were taken directly before Mu-nicipal Judge Langguth.

Judge Langguth warned them of the statute prohibiting the distribution of circulars without a license, and they were released.
