May Send Seven Corps. Opinion among German prisoners is that more still are coming from the western front, one stating that it is reported among the German troops that the Kaiser said recently he intended sending seven German corps to Kovel if necessary to retake Lutsk.

After two days spent on this from can state without reservation that I believe the Russians are engaged in the fiercest and most courageous fight of the entire war. They are hanging on to their hardly won positions often facing troops concentrated on strategic points of line which outnumber them sometimes three to one.

Along this front the Russians are holding their own against heavy odds, but certainly they are inflicting greater losses than they are receiving. Railways Help Germans.

Friday I spent at corps and divisional headquarters west of Kovel road, The forward units of this corps repre-sent the maximum point of our advance, and the Russians' most vital menace to the enemy is obvious from the number of Germans who are attacking here in dense masses, without so far seriously impairing the Russian esistance.

The situation is excellent now, but with the German system of railways behind the lines it is clear that the issue depends on the extent to which the Germans are able to drain the other fronts and keep sending fresh troops for concentration on this point. In the west it should never be forgotten that the Russians are holding lines nearly 1000 miles long, and it is always impossible for the Russians to effect concentration with the same speed as the Germans

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
