

CORPORATIONS GOING OUT OF BUSINESS ARE AVOIDING 1916 FEES

Those Leaving Oregon Filing Dissolution Papers Before July 1, When It Is Due.

Brown Print Co., Sellwood Laundry Are Among Portland Concerns to Take Out Papers.

Salem, Or., June 29.—Corporations that have decided to quit business in Oregon have been hurrying their certificates of dissolution here so that they will be filed by July 1 and so no annual license fee will become due. Wednesday was unusually heavy day, the following certificates being filed with Corporation Commissioner Schulderman:

The Dalles Brick & Tile company, The Dalles, Ore.; The Oregon Lumber company, Burns; Baker-Morrow company, Eugene; Hutchinson Side-Hill Ditch & Irrigation company, Union; Oregon Fruit Cleaner company, The Dalles; Brown Print company, Portland; Western Land company, Salem; Sellwood Wet Wash Laundry company, Portland; Jackson County Fair association, Medford; The Rogers Barber Shop, Portland; Imbler Warehouse company, Imbler; Estacada Fruit Growers' association, Estacada; The Portland Clay company, Portland; The Odd Fellows Hall Association of Albina, of Portland.

Articles of incorporation were filed by Douglas Ice & Storage company, H. Wollenberg, A. C. Seeley and W. H. Sykes, Roseburg, \$25,000; Crane Town-site company, J. L. D. Mortimer, P. S. Wettenthaler and B. L. Allen, Crane, \$50,000.

The National Fruit Cleaner company of The Dalles, successor to the Oregon Fruit Cleaner company, filed articles increasing capital stock from \$40,000 to \$250,000.

Salem, Or., June 29.—John H. Albert, Salem banker, received word Wednesday of the death of his brother, aged 66 years, at Columbus, Ohio.

Body on Vacant Lot.

Los Angeles, June 29.—(P. N. S.)—The body of a well dressed man with his throat cut was found on a vacant lot here yesterday. The absence of any weapons near the body leads the police to believe the man was murdered. The man had apparently been dead for more than a day.

Alumni Employment Bureau Successful

Ashland Association Formed to Find Work for School Students, Is Obtaining Satisfactory Results.

Ashland, Or., June 29.—An employment bureau established by the alumni association of the Ashland high school for the purpose of securing work for the boys and girls of Ashland high school, both during school months and summer vacation, is gaining very satisfactory results. Practically all of the boys of Ashland high school were enrolled in the bureau have secured employment and calls are coming in which cannot be filled. The positions from the ranks of the school boys range from dishwasher in a luncheon camp to private stenographer. With the approach of the fall term the employment bureau will attack the problem of a systematic canvass of the homes of Ashland to find homes for country boys and girls who are willing to work their way.

It Furnishes a Social Center Around Which All May Unite, Says E. F. Goodwin

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., June 29.—A wider use of the rural school houses was urged by the speakers before the second half of the Oregon educational conference, which opened at the university Wednesday. While lodges and other organizations often serve to divide a neighborhood, the school furnishes a social center around which every one may unite, declared E. F. Goodwin of Gresham, in pleading for a full utilization of school facilities. His views were supported by R. E. Winger of Gaston, K. R. Frazier of Everett, Wash., Daniel Hull of Grants Pass, A. T. Parks of Hermiston, and F. J. S. Toole of Oregon City, were among the other speakers at today's session.

Says Americans Shot For Disorderly Acts

General Calles of Sonora Announces Harke and Dickson Killed by Natives When Refusing to Stop Cutting Wires

Mexico City, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—General Calles of Sonora reported to the war department yesterday that J. P. Harke, A. P. Dickson and Morton Handy, Americans, in passing the Cienega Prieta ranch acted disorderly, firing rifles and trees. They were requested to desist. They refused and fighting between them and a few natives ensued. Harke and Dickson and two Mexicans were killed. Handy was arrested and imprisoned at Nazasari.

Postal Regulation Is Upheld by Senate

Washington, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—By a vote of 39 to 25, the senate has upheld a provision of the postal appropriation bill, which authorized the postmaster general to say whether magazines and newspapers shall be shipped by freight or mail. This vote marked the collapse of a strong fight against the regulation, which many publishers claimed placed an almost unlimited power of censorship in the hands of the postmaster general.

Arch of Welcome Is About Complete and Towns Are Putting on Gala Attire.

AUTO CLUB IS ORGANIZED

Big Parade Will Be Feature of the Affair; Speeches Will Be Followed By Street Dancing.

Seaside, Or., June 29.—The official opening of the highway between Astoria and Seaside takes place today. The arch of welcome is finished and Seaside is in gala attire, all stores being decorated.

The Auto club was formed in Astoria Friday night with 150 charter members. The president is Hiram Leinweber of Astoria; first vice-president, George Smith, Seaside; second vice-president, George Schmidt, Warren; other officials are: William Sherman, Astoria; Charles Higgins, Astoria; A. J. Gragg, Seaside; Mark Warren, Cannon Beach; George Hyland, Astoria; Charles Halderman, Astoria. The parade starts from Astoria at 1 p. m. and circles Gearhart. There they will be met by the Seaside contingency and escorted into Seaside, led by the independent band, to the arch, the automobiles dropping to one side. Mayor L. A. Paget will then turn the keys of the city over to Mayor Johnson. So far, 1,000,000 pounds of bacon and 600,000 pounds of corned beef have been ordered from local packing firms for the government for emergency delivery.

S.)—Rioting strike sympathizers yesterday afternoon attacked Webster Welbanks, prominent commission man, in lower Market street and, while crowds looked on, showered bricks on him as he was driving away from pier 30 with a load of bananas which his own union teamsters had refused to carry away because they were unloaded from the steamer Wilhelmina by non-union stevedores. Welbanks was struck a number of times. Kelley declared this afternoon, however, that further negotiations were probable.

Debate on the Tax Limitation in Sight

Secretary of State Taxpayers' League Stages Clash Between State Treasurer Kay and Oswald West.

Robert E. Smith, secretary of the State Taxpayers' league, is arranging a debate between Thomas B. Kay, state treasurer, and Oswald West, for the discussion of the proposed six per cent tax limitation amendment. Mr. Smith has written both Mr. Kay and Mr. West, asking if they will engage in debate before the Chamber of Commerce, and both have answered signifying their willingness to meet in joint discussion. Mr. Smith is now making arrangements for a convenient date at the Chamber of Commerce, when the two debaters may turn their verbal artillery loose in attack upon and defense of the proposed amendment.

Mr. Kay attacked the amendment before the Marion County Taxpayers' league Monday night, charging that if adopted in November it would hamper the present state administration for the reason that a six per cent increase in appropriations by the coming legislature will not take care of state expenses. This is denied by Mr. Smith, and in order that the question may be fully discussed by two men who are familiar with state governmental needs, he is staging the debate.
