

## INTERPRETATIONS OF ORDERS BY BOYD AND BY MOREY DIFFERED

Former Heard Words From Pershing, Latter Received His by Telegraph.

APPARENTLY WERE SAME

Survivor of Carrizal Battle Says Boyd Died Game Saying, "I Am Hit, Boys, Go On," as He Expired.

Columbus, N. M., June 29.—(I. N. S.)—Captain Boyd's interpretation of his orders was not the same as my interpretation of mine. Apparently we both had been instructed similarly by General Pershing. Boyd had received his in person from the general's own lips. Mine reached me in writing.

This is the telling point in the story of Carrizal. Boyd, commander of Troop K of the black Tenth cavalry, which figured in the disastrous ambush at Carrizal. The wounded officer arrived today on a train from General Pershing's headquarters on his way to El Paso.

The second big point in Captain Morey's narrative was this:

**Mexicans A Advantage.**

"We are up against it. The Mexicans can be polite to us and help us, or they can lure us with smiles to within point blank machine gun shooting distance, suddenly switch on wicked hostility and blow us to pieces. And under orders we have to take the punishment. They have the right of first crack at us. We must smile as we walk into their traps, not knowing what moment or from what direction they may attack with machine guns and ten times our numbers."

Captain Morey crossed his legs and talked to newspaper men and fellow officers. He had recovered his lost strength. The fire flamed once more in his blue eyes, gleaming out through his glasses. He pulled at his pipe and recalled again the scene at Carrizal where Captain Boyd and he had been ambushed with only 58 rifles working on their firing line against 800 Mexicans and a machine gun rattling from a few hundred yards away, and with 300 Mexican reinforcements awaiting in the rear to plunge into the uneven battle.

**Orders Were to Reconnoiter.**

"My orders were to reconnoiter the country close to Villa Ahumada. I was told there were something like 400 Mexican troops at Carrizal. My job was to find out how many and the disposition of the main forces in the vicinity, but to avoid a fight and not to fire unless fired upon with deliberate hostility. I understood that Captain Boyd's orders were similar. He had received them personally from General Pershing. Mine had been telegraphed to me at Ojo Frederico.

"As we approached Carrizal we noted the foot soldiers moving forward on the left and right with their rifles in their hands. Captain Boyd wanted to go through a corner of the town. A note came out from the commander of the garrison first stating that we could do so. When we had moved up within a very few hundred yards and point blank shooting distance, another note was sent out which told us we could go no farther.

**Mexicans Fired First.**

"This stopped us within short range for Mexican shooting. It left us on the dead level without shelter, at the mercy of the Mexican machine gun and hidden rifles which rimmed the fringing ditches, tree bases and fence posts in front of us.

"When the sudden zip and spit of their machine gun opened without warning, it was the signal for the whole line to burst into flame. Three hundred Mexican rifles vomited a leaden hail at us.

"I had feared just such a thing. But orders would not let us discharge a single gun until we had been fired upon with deliberate hostility. The first sign of that was when nearly 600 yards of Mexican battle line biased into us pointblank.

**Boyd Died Game.**

"You know the story of that fight by now. I cannot tell you much more

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that will be new. I know one thing, though. Just before Captain Boyd died on the field, he turned to his men and said something. I heard it. He was down, that's all. He was hit by a bullet through the lower part of his body. He was on his knees reeling a little. These were his last words:

"I am hit, boys; go on."

"Then he dropped."

"No man could show more bravery, Boyd knew he was apt to be fired upon when he started forward toward the town of Carrizal. He knew that his position in such event meant certain death. Boyd died game."

## GERMAN COMMERCIAL SUBMARINE REPORTED AT NEWPORT NEWS

Message Says Diver Has Cargo of Dyestuff Base and 4000 Pieces of Mail.

Norfolk, Va., June 29.—(I. N. S.)—Collector of the Port Norman Hamilton today denied reports that any German submarine has entered the harbor.

New York, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—It was reported in shipping circles here today that a German submarine, the largest ever built, has arrived at Newport News, with a cargo of dye stuff bases and 4,000 pieces of mail. The diver is said to have traveled mostly on the surface.

**Seven Hundred Recruits Wanted.**

The United States authorities have placed recruiting for the Third regiment, Oregon National Guard, in the hands of Captain Kenneth P. Williams and he will maintain headquarters in Clackamas. Before Oregon raises any more regiments, Captain Williams will recruit 700 men for the 3rd. There are about 650 to 700 men wanted.

## RUSSIANS ANNOUNCE TOTAL OF CAPTURES OF TEUTONS 200,000

British Attacks Are Becoming More Frequent, According to Berfin Dispatch.

BORELLI SPEECH THRILLS

New Italian Premier Promises Italians Will Meet Death or Constantly on the Offensive Against Enemy.

Petrograd, June 29.—(U. P.)—Russian troops captured 221 Austro-German officers and 10,285 men in yesterday's fighting. It was officially announced this afternoon. The number of prisoners taken since the Russian offensive began now totals more than 200,000.

Berlin, June 29.—(U. P.)—The repulse of British infantry attacks which are becoming more numerous was announced by the war office this afternoon. In several instances the attacks were preceded by gas attacks against the German lines.

London, June 29.—(U. P.)—Rome dispatches today reporting the maiden speech of the new Italian prime minister, Paolo Boselli, before the chamber of deputies, emphasizing the determination of the allies to wage an offensive war from now on.

Suggesting great significance in the present Italian offensive, Premier Boselli said amid cheers:

"Italy intends to continue the same policy as has been pursued by her allies. We intend from now on to intensify the war until the final and decisive victory."

On practically every front except Verdun and a small sector in Volhynia, allied armies are now on the offensive. The British war office gives few details of activities along the line from La Bassée to the Somme, but dispatches from British correspondents at the front report no interruption in the systematic bombardment of German trenches.

"The object of this artillery fire is a simply and terrible one," reported the correspondent at the front of the Chronicle.

"It is to kill Germans in large numbers and save British man-power as far as possible. The zone of shell fire has been very wide and far-reaching and a large number of important positions have been searched by high explosives and shrapnel."

The French official statement today announced that French troops were on the offensive last night in penetrating the German second line trenches, and that strong German attacks around Verdun were repulsed.

## RAIDS BY THE BRITISH ON GERMAN TRENCHES BECOME SYSTEMATIC

British Headquarters in France, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—Via London 29.—Cannonding of unusual violence with German trenches was reported today all along the British front and above the general roar of guns there were occasional outbursts of concentrated artillery from both sides of the trenches.

The British used gas and smoke to cover their trench raids at the Ypres salient. Many dead Germans who perished by gas were found in the Teutons' front trenches. The Germans retaliated with a terrific bombardment of the Canadians' positions on Observatory ridge and Sorrell hill.

The assaults which under cover of a heavy bombardment, the British can raid their enemies' trenches, inflict losses and bring in prisoners, has made it a systematic nightly business. The new system of wearing the Germans down is proceeding on a scale hitherto unattainable.

**Germans Are Repulsed.**

Paris, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—Unable to take the Teutons' concentrated fire of the French, the Germans were repulsed in a strong attack in the region of Thiaumont wood last night, today's communique announced.

Extemporizing continued on both sides of the Meuse, the Germans concentrating their fire on hill No. 304 and the Chenois woods.

At the northern end of the line, particularly between the La Bassée canal and Artois, the guns of the English troops are demolishing trench railways and ammunitions depots. The English are contenting themselves with small infantry rushes after the German trenches are battered to pieces. Critics here believe the English objective is the great German base at Lille.

"In the Champagne district in the direction of Turenne, west of Butte Despenille," the statement added, "a surprise attack emptied enemy trenches of the first line, our forces penetrating trenches of the second line, where we exploded many shells."

**Italians' Work Extolled.**

Rome, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—Military critics extol the splendid work of the Italian cavalry in the Trentino in harassing the Austrian rear guard, impeding its movements and capturing numerous guns and much war material. Their activity, say the critics, contributed greatly to the Austrian rout.

**Italian Deputy Killed.**

Rome, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—During yesterday's meeting of the chamber, President Macora announced the death of Deputy Count Captain Brandolini, who fell during the crossing of Posina Brook.

The chamber voted to hoist a flag over his seat for the balance of the session.

**Peace Communion Ordered.**

Rome, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—The pope has ordered a general communion of the children of the Catholic world on July 30, the anniversary of the commencement of the world war, for the imploring of peace.

**Film Companies Combine.**

New York, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—The Famous Players Film company and the Jesse E. Lasky Feature company have merged into one corporation with a capitalization of \$12,500,000. The new concern will hereafter be known as the Famous Players Lasky corporation.

**Germans Claim Repulses.**

Berlin, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—Repulse of all attacks by the British and French on the western front was claimed today in the official statement on the war. Heavy fighting at several

points was reported, but despite constant artillery fire the allies gained no ground.

The official statement records further Teuton successes against the Russians on the northern portion of the front. It asserts the important positions on the river Niemen have been stormed and captured by the German armies.

"Russian attacks," says the statement, "made with a number of companies against positions between Dubovka and Snorgone, to the east of Vilna, broke down under our attack of fire. To the southwest of Lyubatsa, a German detachment stored an enemy point of support east of the Niemen river, capturing two officers, 56 men, two machine guns and two mine throwers."

"The British front is unchanged," said the statement. "Gas attacks by hostile patrols and infantry detachments are becoming numerous but have everywhere been repulsed. The artillery fire of the enemy is violent."

On the French front there has been an increase in cannonading along the Aisne and the Champagne between Auberville and the Argonne forest where feeble attacks were repulsed."

**Italians Capture Towns.**

Rome, June 29.—(U. P.)—Italian troops have stormed Fort Mattasone in the Trentino zone and have captured the town of Pedocata, five miles north of Arlesio and the ridge of Monte Tappota. It was officially announced this afternoon. The Italian advance on the Posina line is being held up by Austrian artillery, due to the difficult nature of the ground.

**Austrians Raid Italian Coast.**

Berlin, June 29.—(I. N. S.)—Austro-Hungarian torpedo boats raided the east coast of Italy June 28, according to an official Austrian admiral's report received here today. The torpedo boats shelled a train and factory near Ciulanova and returned to their base safely.

An Austrian aerial squadron on June 24 bombed railroad stations and bridges at Pont di Pila and Porto Grado, also returning unharmed. An Italian aeroplane was shot down while attempting to bombard Trieste. One occupant was killed and the other captured.

**Bootlegger Gets Limit.**

Pendleton, Or., June 29.—The heaviest sentence meted out to a bootlegger this year was given to James Riley, who was convicted yesterday of selling an alcoholic mixture. He was fined \$100 and given 30 days in jail, the limit under the city ordinance.

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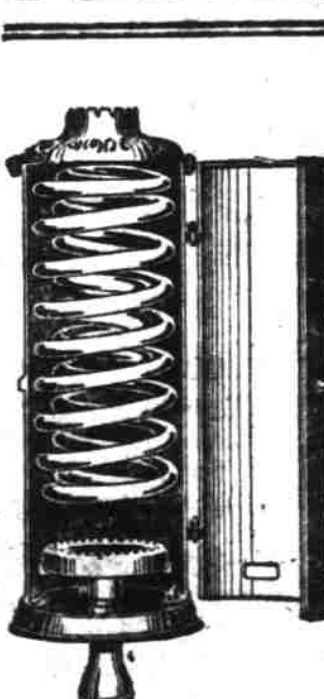
