SAMUEL HILL CALLED TO HELP ALLIES GET MUNITIONS TO RUSSIA

Now at or Near Vladivostok, When Problem of Transportation Needs Solution.

Seattle Wash. June 29.—Samuel Hill, son-in-law of the great empire builder, James J. Hill, recently deceased, has been called into the service of the allied powers in the hope of expediting the successful termination of the European war.

He is now at or near Vladivostok, charged with the duty of solving transportation problems at that point and relieving the congestion of military supplies needed by the Russians army at the front.

Mr. Hill sailed incognito from Victoria or Vancouver a fortnight ago. He bears the highest credentials and will have unlimited means at his command for road building and speedily dispatching munitions of war to the troops on the frontier.

The destination of Samuel Hill, who left Portland on the morning of June 12, is unknown to either J. H. Middleton, manager of the Home Telephone company, or J. C. Potter, auditor, according to statements made by them last night.

"Mr. Hill would tell no one where he was going," said Mr. Potter. "He left instructions to hold all mail for him, and I am inclined to doubt the story of his commission from the Russian government to handle the transportation of the trans-Siberian road."

Mr. Hill returned on June 11 from the funeral of his father-in-law, J. J. Hill, and left the following morning on the Shasta.
