

CONDON MAN SHOTS WIFE THEN ENDS OWN LIFE EARLY IN DAY

Coroner's Jury Decides That
Grider Committed Act Dur-
ing Temporary Insanity.

Condon, Or., June 30.—Wayne Grider shot and killed his wife and himself Thursday morning in his room in the First National Bank building in this city. It is said that Grider had been out of bed for some time and had breakfasted and several had seen Grider on the street before he committed the deed.

T. Womeldorf, who rooms in the same building, heard four shots and a few minutes later saw a man shoot a woman. He went to the rooms occupied by the Griders and found the doors locked and received no answer to his knocks. The circumstances alarmed him, and he immediately summoned Sheriff Little. They entered the rooms and found Mr. and Mrs. Grider both dead. Death had evidently been instantaneous in both cases.

Dr. Wilhelm and Acting Coroner Holien were called and a coroner's jury empaneled. The verdict was that Grider had killed his wife and himself in a fit of temporary insanity. Mrs. Grider had been shot four times with a .22 calibre automatic revolver and it is probable that Grider intended to end his life with the same weapon but one of the cartridges was stuck in the gun when found. It is supposed that he then went to the woodshed and got his Remington .30 calibre rifle as this is the weapon with which he killed himself and the revolver was found in the woodshed.

The news of the tragedy was a great shock to the people of this community. Mrs. Grider was the daughter of W. S. Myers, a pioneer of this county.

Trail Being Built in Eagle Creek Valley

Forest Service Has Crew of Sixteen
Men at Work Preparing Columbia
Gorge Park for Summer Visitors.

The forest service has a crew of 16 men building a new trail up the Eagle creek valley of the Columbia Gorge park. Besides building the trail, this crew will prepare a number of camp sites in order to make the recreational features of the region available for public use.

This Eagle creek project is the first of many development plans to be carried out for the park. The trail will follow the creek up into the Oregon national forest, and then on to Wahum lake. From the lake there is a trail down Herman creek to the Herman ranger station and the Columbia highway, thus completing a 25 mile loop. Parties wishing to make this loop trip can do so in two days, camping over night at Wahum lake. The Eagle creek work also contemplates other trails to points of scenic interest.

Petition Ready for Land and Loan Bill

Between 26,000 and 27,000 Signatures
Have Been Secured—Filing Today or
Tomorrow Promised by E. J. Stack.

E. J. Stack, secretary of the Central Labor council, announced to that body last night that he expected to file the initiative petition for the people's land and loan measure today or tomorrow with the secretary of state. It will have between 26,000 and 27,000 signatures. It was endorsed by the American Federation of Labor and was drawn up by a special committee of the Central Labor council last winter.

The measure proposes to take over into the public treasury the full annual rental value of land, and to exclude from taxation all forms of property created by labor, including improvements, personal property, livestock, land clearing values, money, notes and stocks of goods.

However, permission is given the people of any taxing subdivision of the state to levy taxes on such property as they may desire to tax.

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U. OF C. SESSION IS IN FAVOR OF STATE AID FOR SCHOOL DISTRICTS

General Tax to Assist in the
Poorer Communities Sug-
gested at the Conference.

University of Oregon, Eugene, June 30.—State aid for the school districts of Oregon was proposed at Thursday's session of the Oregon Educational conference.

At present, according to the principal speaker, C. E. Ferguson, of Eugene, Sherman county has only \$1300 of assessed wealth per pupil, while Coos county, the most wealthy in this respect, has \$2798. To equalize these differences so that every boy and girl will have similar advantages, he proposed that one fourth of the educational expense be raised by a state-wide taxation, relieving the poorer districts of an excessive burden. At

present only 6 per cent is secured outside of the county in which the school is located.

Careful supervision of rural teachers by grouping them in districts of 12 or 15 in accordance with the plan now in use in Polk county, and the placing of the supervisors under civil service, was declared for by M. S. Pittman of the Oregon Normal school.

Other speakers at today's session were, F. B. Hamlin of Roseburg, Raymond Baker of Coos county, D. W. Morton, dean of the school of commerce, and L. W. Turnbull of Bandon.

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LEBKNECHT IS GIVEN PRISON SENTENCE OF 30 MONTHS BY COURT

German Socialist Leader Con-
victed of Attempted High
Treason by Courtmartial.

Berlin, June 30.—Found guilty by secret courtmartial of attempted high treason, gross insubordination and resistance to authorities, Dr. Karl Liebknecht, Socialist leader, was sentenced to 30 months of penal servitude and to be dismissed from the army. The court-martial was the outcome of the May day peace disturbances in Berlin.

The lowest penalty was imposed, because the court decided the prisoner was guided by fanaticism rather than by reasonable sentiments.

Prior to the event which led to his arrest, Dr. Liebknecht had been expelled by the reichstag, of which he was a member, because of speeches

criticizing the government. An attempt was made to claim parliamentary immunity, but was lost. An appeal is possible.

The charge against Dr. Liebknecht included the allegation that he arranged the demonstration directed against the government.
