PULPIT AND RELIGIOUS PRESS INTERESTED IN ADVERTISING QUESTION

Invitation to Join in World Conference at Philadelphia Raises the Question.

ETHICS ARE DISCUSSED

Some Declare Church Should Keep Clear of Advertising, While Others Claim It Does No Harm.

During the past week the conference of the Associated Advertising Clubs of the World was held in Philadelphia, and the churches of America were invited to take part in the church advertising conference. This invitation has brought forth quite a little comment, both from the pulpit and the religious press. Some believe that the church should employ every legitimate means within its reach, while others blieve that the church should keep itself "unspotted from the world.

It is interesting to note the siogan that the clubs have adopted, namely, "Truth," and also that they have called upon the church to come in and help them solve this problem which confronts them. This is not a sign that advertising is becoming religious, but when advertisers actually do put "truth" at the center of their work, they will not be so far from the "king-
