BILLS ARE BEING SETTLED

Work of Visiting Families Has Almost
Been Completed by the Patriotic
Women of Portland.

The work of visiting the families of enlisted men by the members of the patriotic committee of the Daughters of American Revolution is almost completed; some of the members of the committee have visited all the families assigned to them and reports will probably all be in by tomorrow. Many cases of great need are found, particularly among women with small children. Bills for food, clothing, medical attention, rent and fuel are daily being met by the committee and for this purpose additional subscriptions are eagerly solicited.

A feature of the work is the fact that every cent subscribed goes directly to the families needing assistance, none being absorbed for room rent, telephone, help or other usual expenses. Subscriptions are asked on a monthly basis for three months and checks must be made payable to D. A. R. Patriotic Trust Fund, 618 Journal building.

Austrian Cars Are Seized by Roumania

Railway Equipment Sent Into Roumania
During Russian Drive Confiscated; Export to Bulgaria Stopped.

London, July 5.—(I. N. S.)—The Roumanian government has seized 230 Austrian cars and six locomotives belonging to the Austro-Hungarian railways, which were sent into Roumania while the Russians were advancing in Bukovina, says a Reuters dispatch from Bucharest. All exportation to Bulgaria has been suspended.

Allied military experts have speculated upon the effect the victorious Russian drive upon the central powers would have upon Roumania. Openly covetous of Bukovina, Roumania has been the cynosure of the eyes of the world several times since the war's outbreak. It has been officially reported on more than one occasion that Roumania would cast her lot with the allies, in the hope of ultimately dominating the Balkans.

COUNTY WILL HIRE MEN TO BREAK ROCK AT THE KELLY BUTTE QUARRY

Only Few Prisoners Available
and Roadmaster Needs
Material for Roads.

SAVING IS POINTED OUT

About 35 Men Required to Work Plant
at Capacity—Prisoners Will Be
Sent Back to Jail Monday.

Employment of county and city prisoners at Kelly Butte rock quarry will be discontinued next Monday. The rock quarry will be operated to capacity by free labor employed by the county road department.

Order to this effect was made today by the county commissioners, the request of Roadmaster J. B. Yeom, because there are not enough county and city prisoners to keep a full crew at the quarry.

About 35 men are required to work the quarry at capacity. Yeom asked Sheriff Harburt if he could furnish that many prisoners. The sheriff said that the number of prisoners has dwindled until now he did not have 35 prisoners he could send to the quarry. At present there are 15 county and 2 city prisoners at the butte. All told, the sheriff said he has about 40 county prisoners, and five or six more could be sent to the butte, but the rest are not physically able to work. Employment of prisoners at Kelly Butte was placed in charge of the sheriff April 1.

As the macadamizing of county roads has been delayed by wet weather, the roadmaster expects to rush the work during the rest of the season. William Hatchel will be in charge of the quarry, 35 men will be employed at \$2.25 and \$2.50 a day, and it is expected that an average of 150 yards of crushed rock will be turned out daily. The county needs 30,000 yards of rock before the end of the season.

The prisoners were paid 15 cents a day, and four guards and a cook were employed at the butte. The rock is costing about 85 cents a yard. The roadmaster estimates it will cost, with free labor, 65 cents a yard. If there were enough prisoners to work the quarry at full capacity, the cost would be about 60 cents a yard, it is estimated.

SEVENTY MAZAMAS GO TO TOP OF HOOD THROUGH BAD STORM

Ascent Made From the North
Side Monday by Members
of Noted Society.

Seventy members of the Mazamas' Fourth of July party to Mount Hood succeeded in reaching the summit of that peak Monday under most unfavorable weather conditions.

The ascent was made from the north side with driving rain, sleet and snow successively sweeping the mountain. Nearly 80 persons started the climb, but were exhausted by the night when the elements failed. When within a few hundred feet of the top, the weather was so unsettled Monday morning that the climb was not started from Cloud Cap until nearly 6 o'clock. The mountain side was a mass of ice and steps had to be cut on all the snow fields. This was slow work and the summit was not reached until 4 o'clock in the afternoon. One of the climbers didn't return to Cloud Cap until late at night, and all were exhausted by the tremendous effort.

Mark Wygant, the guide on the north side of Hood, escorted the party to the top. In places he had to dig the cable out of six feet of snow and near the top had to place a new rope because the old climbing rope was too thin and possible. The stay on the summit was very brief because of the bitter cold. The ascent was made under most hazardous conditions, and the guides took every precaution to prevent an accident.

F. L. Maguire, 60 years old, was the eldest of the party to make the summit. Boy Scouts' Council May Be Established

Portland Business Men to Meet National Field Scout Commissioner H. D. Cross This Afternoon.

A meeting will be held this afternoon by a group of Portland business men to discuss with H. D. Cross, national field scout commissioner of the Boy Scouts of America, the feasibility of organizing a local council in Portland. They are being established in other coast cities and Mr. Cross will remain here 10 days to organize the local council should that course be decided upon at this afternoon's assembly.

In explaining the requirements for a local body, Mr. Cross said: "Funds must be collected to pay a trained expert, and between 50 and 150 men must volunteer to assist the boys in an advisory capacity."

"There are now 180,000 Boy Scouts in America, and 10,000 men who are leaders," continued Mr. Cross, "which gives you an idea of the size of the organization. There are 700 Boy Scouts in Portland and there should be at least 3000."

Villa Is Reported to Be South of Parral

El Paso, Texas, July 5.—(U. P.)—Unconfirmed rumors again report Pancho Villa found, today's report placing him in the Rosario neighborhood south of Parral.

A train carrying National Guard field hospital and signal corps from El Paso, commanded by Major General Fred J. Miller and a field hospital company from Philadelphia, under Major Keiser, arrived here today.

Arrangements for memorial services in honor of the American soldiers who fell at Carrizal, provide for the bodies to lie in state at Fort Bliss. It has not been decided whether to inter them in Arlington cemetery or send the bodies to relatives.

The special train taking undertakers to the battlefield is expected to return with the bodies Friday or Saturday.

MUNICIPAL GARBAGE AMENDMENT MAY YET BE SUBMITTED

Council Directs City Attorney
to Draw Proper Measure
for the Ballot.

PLAN DEFEATED BEFORE

Action Taken Upon Communication of
the Portland Parent-Teacher
Association.

A charter amendment providing for a system of municipal garbage collection will probably be submitted to the voters of Portland at the next city election.

Acting on a communication from the Portland Parent-Teacher association, the city council this morning directed the city attorney to prepare a proper amendment providing for both collection and incineration.

When drafted, the proposed amendment will be submitted to the council for its approval and then placed on the ballot, as authorization of collection of garbage by the municipality is a matter involving additional taxation. The voters turned down a similar measure at the last election.

Golf Offer Accepted.
An ordinance accepting the offer of the Ladd Estate company for use of a tract of land for a municipal golf course was adopted by the city council this morning without an emergency. Commissioner Daly cast the only dissenting vote. The ordinance was originally adopted with an emergency and then revoked. Without an emergency, the way is paved for invoking the referendum by that portion of the public opposed to the ordinance.

Examination to Be Held.
The municipal civil service board announces an examination for dock watchman, rank D, class 8, to be held at 9 a. m. Tuesday, July 18. The examination will be open to men between the ages of 21 and 50, and will be based on physical condition, personality and experience, penmanship and report writing. All applications must be filed by noon Saturday, July 15.

To Close Street.
Permission to close East Davis street, between East Thirty-ninth and East Forty-fifth streets, tomorrow, for children's parade, was granted by the council, on request of Mrs. James Forbes.

Passed by Council.
Commissioner Daly's ordinance providing for the construction, erection or maintenance of electric wires, cables and appliances over certain streets on the downtown east side, and regulating installation in underground conduits, was passed by the council.

Time Extension Granted.
The Portland & Oregon City Railway company was granted an extension of

36 months' time for the completion of its lines in this city, in an ordinance adopted by the council this morning. Under the extension, the road must be completed by November 9, 1917.

Pool Rooms Regulated.
By a vote of 4 to 1, Commissioner Dieck dissented, the city council passed an ordinance this morning licensing and regulating billiard and poolrooms. The ordinance prohibits the playing of cards in these establishments. Card rooms alone, however, are provided for.

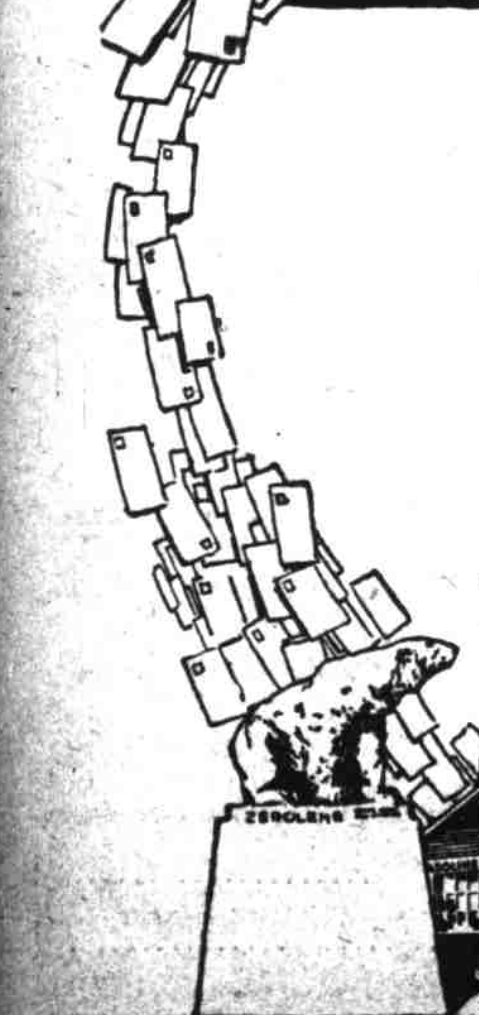
