

SENATOR WALSH MAY GET HUGHES' SEAT ON U. S. SUPREME BENCH

President Wilson Said to Have Montana Man Under Consideration for Place.

KNOWN AS ABLE LAWYER

Probability of Appointment May Keep Him Off the Democratic National Executive Committee.

Washington, July 5.—(I. N. S.)—President Wilson has under consideration the appointment of United States Senator Thomas J. Walsh of Montana for associate justice of the supreme court to succeed Charles E. Hughes. This was made known today when it was stated by one of the president's political advisors that Senator Walsh had been tentatively selected for membership on the Democratic national executive committee, but that in view of the possibility of his being named for the supreme court position, National Chairman McCormick probably would select another in his place.

Senator Walsh called on Mr. McCormick today and discussed politics. He said every report from Montana indicated that it would be strictly for President Wilson. Montana, he declared, may safely be counted in the Democratic column.

California Winery Is Destroyed by Blaze

Loss Over \$500,000, Though No Wine in Buildings—Investigation Into Cause of Conflagration Is Started.

Ontario, Cal., July 5.—(P. N. S.)—An investigation to determine the origin of the fire that swept the winery of the Italian Vineyard company plant Monday night, with a loss of more than \$500,000, was started today. Two large buildings, housing the fermenting department, were completely destroyed and all of the plant's expensive machinery ruined. All of the 196 large redwood tanks, used for storing wine, were also destroyed. There was practically no wine in the buildings, as last year's supply had been disposed of and arrangements made to begin this season's work.

Funds for Columbia Soon to Be Secured

Conference Agreement on the Rivers and Harbors Bill Will Permit Continuation of Columbia River Work.

Washington, July 5.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL.)—A conference agreement on the river and harbors bill will make funds available in a few days for continuing the Columbia river work. Appropriations for Oregon waterways are unchanged. New surveys in the northwest added by the senate were allowed except one for the ship channel connecting the Columbia river with Puget Sound. Surveys include those for Umpqua, Yaquina and Youngs bays and the Columbia river from Snake to Priest Rapids, Willapa river and harbor, Wash., are allowed \$247,000.

J. A. Zimmerman Dies.

Albany, Or., July 5.—J. A. Zimmerman, aged 88 years, died at his home at 729 East Seventh street in this city Sunday night. He had been a resident of Linn county for the last 36 years. He was born in Saxony, Germany, in March, 1828, and came to America with his parents in 1837, locating near Pittsburg, Pa. His wife died seven years ago. He is survived by the following children: Henry and Edward Zimmerman, of Shedd; A. F. Zimmerman, of Vancouver, Wash.; Mrs. C. Morford and Mrs. Wm. Scupp, of near Pittsburg, Pa.; Mrs. Bertha Allen, Miss Emily Zimmerman and Mrs. Henry Hector, of North Albany. Funeral services will be held this afternoon at the German Lutheran church.

No War With Mexico, Says Champ Clark

"I don't believe there will be any war," he said. "When one fellow says there will be war and another says there won't be war, it is up to the fellow who says there will be war to prove it."

Decrease in Auto Accidents Reported

Cases Handled by Public Safety Commission Fall From 758 to 444 During Month of June.

Not one person was killed in Portland in traffic accidents in June and only 31 were injured, according to the report compiled yesterday by H. P. Coffin, chairman of the public safety commission. Cases handled by the commission in the month fell off 308 from the cases handled in May, 752 being the number for May and 444 for June.

Aberdeen, Wash., July 5.—Five thousand men and women participated in a preparedness parade yesterday, which was the big feature of the annual splash. Every organization on Gray's Harbor was represented and many splendid floats were included.

Thousands March at Eureka.

Eureka, Cal., July 5.—(U. P.)—Several thousand men, women and children representing fraternal lodges, schools, public organizations and business houses, as well as hundreds of private citizens, marched yesterday in a patriotic independence day and preparedness parade. The procession was the second day feature of the sweet pea carnival, which has attracted thousands of visitors. After the pageant many of the marchers proceeded to a grove where the municipal picnic took place in the afternoon.

Big Parade at San Diego.

San Diego, Cal., July 5.—(P. N. S.)—With fully 15,000 civilians, men and women, marching on foot, San Diego's preparedness parade was held yesterday, beginning at 9:30 o'clock. The marchers assembled at the foot of Broadway and marched thence to the exposition grounds. Seldom have the people of this city been stirred to such enthusiastic outbursts of applause as the parade brought forth today.

Per capita, the parade is the largest held in the United States, it being estimated that one out of every six persons in the city was in line.
