

ATTORNEY ARRESTED ON CHARGE OF USING MAILS TO DEFRAUD

William J. Prendergast Indicted by the Federal Grand Jury.

William J. Prendergast, 611 Lumbermen's building, an attorney specializing on collections, was arrested this morning by federal officers on a charge of using the mails to further a scheme to defraud. The charge was brought in a secret indictment returned by the federal grand jury last Saturday.

Mr. Prendergast has been practicing in Portland for several years, first in the old Merchants Trust building. His principal business was collecting, in reference to the alleged circumstances leading to Prendergast's indictment, a man named L. M. Hines came to Portland and commenced a credit rating guide published by the Merchants Trust company.

"In February, 1911," said Assistant District Attorney Rankin, "the circumstances leading to Prendergast's indictment, a man named L. M. Hines came to Portland and commenced a credit rating guide published by the Merchants Trust company, of which he was general manager. About 2000 of the guides were put out, and collections for them were placed with Mr. Prendergast. The Merchants Trust company was legitimate and doing a good business. It is claimed by many of the subscribers that they never heard anything more of these collections from Mr. Prendergast, although many collections were made. This brought the Merchants Trust company into disrepute in this section and L. M. Hines moved to Walla Walla, where he operated the company successfully."

In the contract for this book, according to Mr. Rankin, it was understood that the Merchants Trust company did not sell the book, but leased it for a period of 20 months, at a rate of \$20, and the book was to be returned upon request. The company having abandoned this field, never returned the books from subscribers. "After approximately two months had expired after the expiration of the contract between the Merchants Trust company and the subscribers," said Mr. Rankin, "Mr. Prendergast, upon printed forms, sent out demand for the rent of these books for a period of time dating between the expiration of their contract and on date of its demand upon them for rent past due. Some of them refused to pay, others paid."

Under the system adopted by Prendergast, as outlined by Mr. Rankin, demands would be sent to the subscribers and if they did not pay, other communications would be sent, many of them upon telegraph sheets of the various telegraph companies, and all threatened legal proceedings. This procedure, Mr. Rankin says, was adopted about October, 1915, but the postal authorities did not become cognizant of it until February of this year and their investigations covered about a month when the case was ready to go to the grand jury, which returned an indictment on July 1.

Farmhand Shortage Is Not Anticipated

Middle West Ready for Harvest Finds Militia Took Few Boys From Country and Situation Normal.

Chicago, July 6.—(U. P.)—The great grain states of the middle west prepared for the summer and autumn harvest today with no fear of a shortage of farm hands because of the militia mobilization. Reports from Kansas, Iowa, Nebraska and other states indicated that the harvest hand situation will be practically as in previous years. The militia of these states, it was said, are practically all from cities or towns and few "boys from the farm" have gone to the border.

U-Boat Sank French Ship on Its Way Back

Submarine That Visited Spain Reports Destruction of Armed Steamer Marcell and Capture of Her Guns.

Berlin, July 6.—(U. P.)—Sinking of a French destroyer in the North sea on July 3, was reported officially today by a statement of the German admiralty.

"The U-35, which carried to Carthage, Spain, an autograph letter from Emperor William to the king of Spain, has returned to its base. On the journey it sank the armed French steamship Marcell, capturing its guns."

AMERICANS ROUT 250 SAN DOMINGO REBELS, LOSING BUT ONE MAN

One Seriously, Seven Slightly Wounded; Rebels Lose 27 Dead, 5 Captured.

Washington, July 6.—(U. P.)—Routing 250 revolutionists, killing 27 and capturing 5, the American forces advancing on Santiago, San Domingo, last Saturday suffered casualties of one killed, one seriously wounded and seven slightly hurt.

The dead American was George Frazer, whose home was Canon City, Colo. Private J. E. Daley, Bookersville, Ky., was the seriously wounded man. Three slightly wounded were: R. D. Putnam, Jefferson, Va.; Corporal Oscar J. Johnson, La Crosse, Wis.; and G. E. Merriweather, Louisville, Ky., and Privates W. F. Johnson, Shelby, Mich.; C. Oates, Seattle, and E. R. Faine, Minneapolis.

The Americans under Colonel Pemberton engaged the rebels at Guayacanes. The rebels were entrenched in a strong concealed position and this prevented the Americans from using their artillery to the advantage. The enemy outposts opened fire but the Americans, though taken by surprise, made a sharp attack, soon driving out the dominicans in disorder.

"California for life for highway robbery and a accomplice in murder. He was paroled from Folsom in 1914, but shortly afterward was recommitted to San Quentin prison for highway robbery. Released in a few months, he next arrived at The Dalles, July 20, 1915, on a charge of robbery. He was accused of robbing a bank at Rogue River, after throwing ammonia in the cashier's face, and was also accused of robbing the station at Riddle."

He was brought to Portland and Bertillon measurements were taken. He was then removed to Granta Pass, but on August 15 he escaped from jail there, after he had been indicted. He escaped by overpowering the sheriff, when the latter took Hooper his dinner.

Hooper heard from at various places. He wrote a letter to the sheriff, apologizing for the harsh measures he had used, and also wrote to friends he made among the police officers here. These letters came from Minnesota, and it was thought that he had gone into Canada. He was arrested during the winter at Milwaukee, but released through the efforts of ex-Governor McGovern of Wisconsin.

Hooper's personal habits were exemplary. He did not drink, use tobacco and his language was clean. He had a falling for women, however, and had feminine acquaintances at every stopping place, the police say. He had a fondness for ice cream amounting almost to a mania and it was his sortle for ice cream from his hiding place at The Dalles that led to the arrest. Hooper was always heavily armed, a "two gun" man as the police would say, and he was known to be a dead shot. His boast, however, was that he had never killed a man, and in his robberies would never kill anyone.

BOAT IN MOBILE BAY SENDS WIRELESS TO NEW ORLEANS TODAY

Communication Cut for Day; City and Pensacola Damaged But Safe.

New Orleans, La., July 6.—(U. P.)—A wireless to the United Fruit company here this afternoon from one of its boats, now in Mobile bay, said the hurricane Wednesday and Thursday caused considerable property damage at Mobile. There was no loss of life, as far as could be learned. Pensacola, the radio said, was safe.

Two Cities Isolated.

Washington, July 6.—(U. P.)—Communication from Washington with Mobile and Pensacola has been completely cut off since 11 a. m. yesterday. The weather bureau admitted today. Shortly before that time a terrific 80-mile-an-hour gale was blowing.

Country Is Flooded.

New Orleans, La., July 6.—(U. P.)—All efforts to reach Mobile and Pensacola by wireless up to 10 o'clock this morning failed. Louisville & Nashville railroad officials reported the great portion of the country around Mobile flooded.

Damage Will Be Millions.

Birmingham, Ala., July 6.—(U. P.)—Millions of dollars of damage will be done by the cyclone which struck the Gulf region yesterday when the storms abated. No casualties have been reported as yet, but as Mobile and Pensacola, which have been cut off from communication since noon yesterday, suffered heavily, it may be that there was loss of life in either or both cities.

Ninety miles of telegraph poles were blown down between Birmingham and Mobile and 11 miles of the Louisville & Nashville line were washed out between Mobile and New Orleans.

It was announced by the railroad here today that the Louisville & Nashville line was wrecked near Sparto, Ala., and that both its engineer and fireman were injured.

During the progress of the storm the wind's velocity exceeded 100 miles an hour at various points.

Waterfront Washed Away.

Atlanta, Ga., July 6.—(U. P.)—Reports reached here this afternoon that the entire waterfront of Pensacola was washed away during yesterday's storm. It is believed that the damage is enormous.

Today the high water, swept inland by the cyclone, receding rapidly. Communications have been restored as far south as Flomaton, Ala., and it is expected that communication with Mobile will be established soon.

Artillery Is Needed.

The toll in the fighting south of the Somme last night was probably due to the necessity for further artillery preparation before the French resume their advance on Peronne. Since the French advance south of the river began last Saturday morning, General Foch's troops have taken the German second lines on a wide front, but now face a new and strong defensive position before Peronne.

With French troops now almost within the outskirts of Peronne, the German are reinforcing heavily, particularly on their right flank, southwest of the village. Southwest of Peronne there was heavy fighting yesterday, in which French cavalry took part and the famous French "cavalry" did terrible execution.

Cavalry Approaches Railway. One cavalry detachment breaking through a gap in the German second line, actually approached close to the Peronne-Chaumont railway, before being driven back by German fire.

So rapid was the French advance south of the Somme in the early stages of the fighting that German detachments were cut off during the night in some instances and surrounded before they knew they were under attack. A French company which cut off the avenues of retreat from one German trench found several of the occupants asleep in their dugouts.

Region Is Historic.

The region south of the Somme over which the French are now advancing is full of historical interest. In the village of Barleux, southwest of Peronne and in the line of advance, the Germans in 1870 installed artillery for the purpose of bombarding Peronne. The village was honored after the war with the decoration of the Legion of Honor for its heroic resistance to the Germans.

The town of Peronne was a strong fortress in the medieval ages. Charles the Simple was imprisoned and died there. Peronne surrendered to Wellington in 1815 and the Germans in January, 1871, after a most stubborn resistance.

Not Half Militia Has Reached Border Yet

Seventeen Days Have Elapsed Since Call Was Issued; Railroads Not Blamed.

San Antonio, Texas, July 6.—(U. P.)—The southern department of the army will not be divided into three sections as planned, at least for some time. It was intimated at department headquarters today. Reasons for the probable delay could not be ascertained.

All regimental commanders of the militia along the border have been ordered to get their men into condition for hard service as rapidly as possible.

Not half the militia of the country has reached the border, or has even started, although 17 days have elapsed since it was called out. Army officers here are not placing the blame on the railroads.

The Fourth Missouri infantry passed through here last night en route to Laredo. It is composed of companies from northern Missouri.

Rounding Out The New Circuit

Seattle, Wash., July 6.—(P. N. S.)—Completing final plans of the vaudeville circuit of 52 cities, John Cort, associated with William Morris and Oliver Morosco, is in the city today. Mr. Cort said that the final details were being worked out in scheduled manner, and that all plans were practically complete.

Drug Store Is Burned.

Morton, Wash., July 6.—Fire last night destroyed the McDermott Drug company store of Mineral, the stock and the Longmire restaurant. The fire started in the rear of the drug store. The cause is unknown. All was lost except the restaurant fixtures. The drug store was insured for \$3500.

TURKS TAKE PERSIAN CITY OF KERMANSHAH FROM THE RUSSIANS

Latter Put to Flight After Two-Day Battle, the Turks Announce.

London, July 6.—(U. P.)—The important Persian city of Kermanshah, won by the Russians in the floodtide on Mesopotamia last February, has been taken again by the Turks, according to an official statement received tonight from Constantinople.

The city fell and the Russians were put to flight toward the east after a two-days' battle, the Turkish war office announced. The fall of Kermanshah, central point on the trade routes of Persia, imperils the control of that nation gained by the Russians in their winter campaign. It lifts the menace of a Russian advance on Bagdad for the time at least.

It was from Kermanshah that a Russian cavalry squadron was able to form the first junction between Russians and British in Mesopotamia. High hopes had been held here that the great armies of the czar might send still further reinforcements to General Gorring's forces before Kut-el-Amara, Kermanshah, a town of 30,000, is 150 miles on an air line from Kut.

The Turkish offensive in Persia, which has been developing for weeks, offered the first serious menace to Kermanshah about 10 days ago. The Russians prepared for a stand well in front of the city, strongly fortified the town of Mahdeshat.

The Turkish advance developed into a pitched battle several days ago. Mahdeshat, which was a very strong position, was untenable by a successful encircling movement by the Turks, was left to a rear guard and the Russians took up a prepared line west of Kermanshah. At the end of the second day the Turks had carried this second line and pursued the Russians into Kermanshah. The Russian retreat continued beyond the city and Turkish detachments are in pursuit.

Merle Scott, February 27, 1913, they lived happily for more than a year and that on June 21 Charles Scott, at the Scott home at Scotts Mills, prevented the pair from living together and has done so ever since. She alleges also that the elder Scott asked her how much money she would accept to leave her husband, and that while Merle was in a Portland hospital she ordered the doctor not to let her visit him.

Prison Shoes Are Up for Discussion

State Penitentiary Can't Make Poor Product at Price for Which Good Product Might Be Purchased.

Salem, Or., July 6.—The state penitentiary is unable to make poor shoes at a price that will compare with what good shoes might be bought for, said Warden John W. Minto at Wednesday's meeting of the board of control. Warden Minto suggested that it might be profitable to quit trying to make shoes for the inmates of the various institutions. With more up-to-date equipment he believed it might be possible to turn out shoes in competition with outside firms. The board will look into the matter before deciding.

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AUSTRIAN LINE NORTH OF LEMBERG CUT BY ATTACK OF RUSSIANS

Railway Station of Mikuliczyn Taken, Cutting Off Austrian Supply Trains.

Petrograd, July 6.—(U. P.)—Russian troops have captured the village and railway station of Mikuliczyn, 35 miles south of the Stanislaw, thus cutting one of the main Austrian lines of communication north of Lemberg and the main railway over which General Bothner's Austro-German army received supplies. Capture of Mikuliczyn was officially announced today after an earlier bulletin had been issued, announcing the cutting of the railway. The war office announced that several other Austrian positions on the Russian left flank were captured, indicating that practically all of the southeastern corner of Galicia is now cleared of Austrian troops.

In the region of Koulkagaluk, enemy counter attacks in close formation were repulsed. One enemy detachment was allowed to approach to within 100 paces of the Russian positions before the Russians opened fire. The detachment was nearly annihilated. The Russians took 419 prisoners on this sector.

On the right bank of the Dniester the Austrians were routed, the czar's troops occupying that sector west of Issakovivitch, taking several hundred prisoners.

Heavy fighting continues east and south of Baranovitch, where the Russians are attacking the German center. One Russian division captured more than 1000 Germans. In the region of Verchitshokh the Russians have taken numerous prisoners, rifles and other material. On the Riga front a German first line trench was captured by the Russian left wing, which took prisoners and machine guns.

Tobias returned home yesterday after an absence of three weeks on a desert mining claim. During her husband's absence Mrs. Tobias became acquainted with Seiser on a street corner, when she asked him to direct her to a Broadway eat.

Mrs. Tobias told her husband of meeting Seiser and angry words followed. Yesterday afternoon Mrs. Tobias went down town and met Seiser.

Tobias had evidently followed her and created a scene on the street, compelling his wife to go home with him. Seiser called at the Tobias home several hours later and the two men grappled. During the fray that followed, Mrs. Tobias told the postmaster, a large caliber automatic revolver was seen first in the hands of one and then the other of the combatants. A shot rang out and Seiser fell with a 45 bullet through his head. He died a few minutes later. Tobias refused to make any statement.

All Refugees Out.

Washington, July 6.—(U. P.)—Admiral Winkler, commanding the Pacific fleet, today reported to the navy department that all Americans who wished to leave the west coast of Mexico were now en route to the United States, with the exception of a few from Guadalajara, who arrived at Manzanillo yesterday.

Los Angeles, July 6.—(U. P.)—Mrs. Thomas Tobias, 32, a mining engineer, is in jail today charged with suspicion of murder and Mrs. Nellie E. Tobias, his wife, is held at the receiving hospital as a witness following the killing of A. B. Seiser, assistant advertising manager of the Labor Press, at the Tobias home last night. Mrs. Tobias is in a hysterical condition.
