

WOMAN ATTEMPTS TO COMMIT SUICIDE BY SHOOTING HERSELF

Despondency Over Domestic Troubles Believed to Have Prompted Act to End Life.

RECOVERY IS EXPECTED

Mrs. Josephine Mills, Aged 26, Victim of Attempt Made Last Evening; Police Making an Investigation.

Worrying over domestic troubles, Mrs. Josephine Mills, 26 years old, attempted suicide by shooting in an apartment at 549 Taylor street about 11:15 last night.

The woman is at Good Samaritan hospital in a serious condition, but it is believed that she will recover. The bullet struck a rib and passed around the heart, coming out at the back. The bullet was found in her clothing. Mrs. N. P. Nelson, in whose apartment the shooting took place, and Richard Ferdinand Warren, a miner and friend of Mrs. Mills, were held by the police for investigation. Mrs. Nelson was in the room with Mrs. Mills when the shooting took place and Warren was in an adjoining room. According to the statement of Mrs. Nelson to Captain of Detectives But this morning, Mrs. Mills had been despondent all day.

Mrs. Mills had been worrying because of a quarrel with her mother, Mrs. G. Lowell, of 348 Main street, and she had become separated from a baby daughter.

"I'm going to end everything," she suddenly said, according to Mrs. Nelson, when a revolver fired the shot.

During the night at the hospital Mrs. Mills frequently exclaimed that she had been shot by Parslow, but this morning, when rational, she said she had shot herself.

Mrs. Mills has been separated from her husband for some time, and friends say she does not know his whereabouts.

The child, they say, was taken from her through court proceedings.

THOUSANDS REGISTER FOR LAND RIGHTS ON THE COLVILLE GRANT

Estimated That Fully 25,000 Persons Will Have Enrolled Names by Nightfall.

Spokane, Wash., July 6.—(P. N. S.)—It is estimated that 25,000 persons, representatives of all walks of life, will have registered by tonight for land on the Colville reservation, where, July 27, 350,000 acres of land will be opened for settlement.

There are six places of registration, viz., Spokane, Wenatchee, Colville, Republic, Wilbur and Omak. There were registered Wednesday, the opening day, 12,755 persons and there has been a continuous line of applicants since the opening hour. John McPaul, superintendent of allotments, expects over 100,000 applicants, and others have placed the estimated number of filings at 200,000.

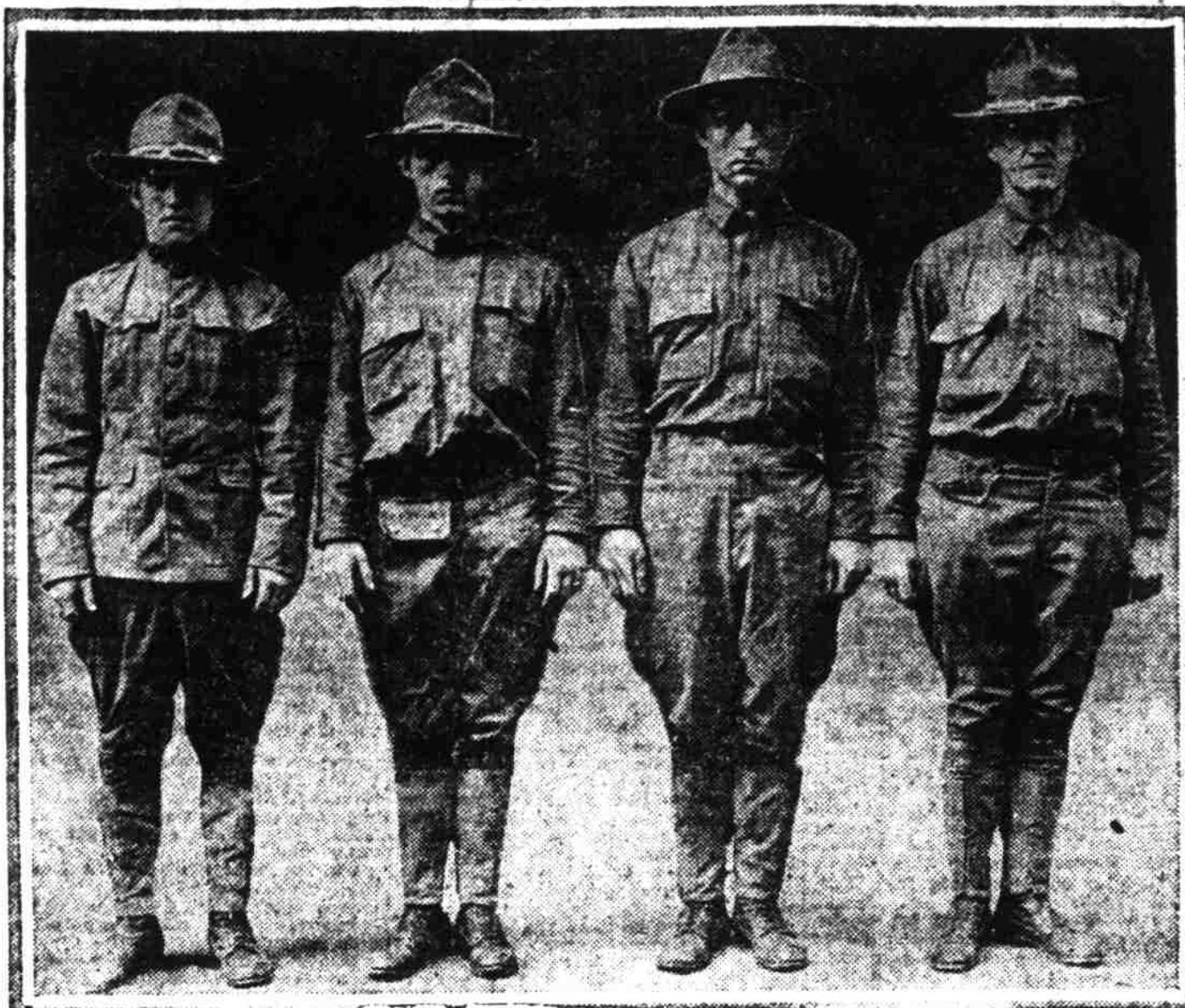

719 Signed Up for Volunteer Regiment

May Not Oust Mullan. Oregon City, Or., July 5.—Though the county court is in session it is not believed that it will oust S. L. Mullan, road supervisor for district No. 1, against whom a petition was filed recently charging him with using his office for political gain and other offenses of a similar nature. County Commissioner Matson said Wednesday that the case had not been settled, and it is known that the court is not eager to establish a precedent which might cause the filing of many petitions to oust road supervisors throughout the county. The hearing of Supervisor Mullan was held some time ago.

Given 90 Days in Jail. Ninety days in jail was the sentence imposed on Lloyd G. Hyatt, former postmaster at Telocaset, Or., who pleaded guilty to mishandling of government funds. Frank Beller of St. Johns, pleaded guilty to a charge of having mailed an obscene letter and was sentenced to 30 days.

CARE OF MOUTH IS URGED AS MEANS OF PREVENTING DISEASE

Astounding Facts Said to Have Been Discovered as Result of Medical Tests.

EXPERIMENTS ARE CITED

Dr. Thomas B. Hartzell of Minneapolis Delivers Lecture at North Pacific Dental College This Morning.

"Fifteen per cent of all people in hospitals are there because of heart, kidney and joint diseases, which had their center of infection in abscessed teeth," said Dr. Thomas B. Hartzell of Minneapolis in his lecture at the North Pacific Dental college this morning. "These could all have been prevented by proper care of the mouth."

"Until recently almost the entire attention of the dental profession was given over to operative dentistry, which has now become crystallized almost to perfection, but with the advance of science more time is being spent in study of those diseases which have their direct cause in mouth infections. These diseases are of many forms, the most prominent of which are those of the heart, kidney and joint."

Diseases Are Explained.

Explaining the manner in which diseases are transmitted from the mouth to other portions of the body, Dr. Hartzell continued: "If pyorrhea obtains long enough to produce an average depth of ulcerating surface of one quarter of an inch around each tooth, we have an ulcerating surface of 7 1/2 square inches. The pus and refuse from this infected surface passes into the blood stream and is carried to other organs of the body, where it causes many insidious ills."

In a series of experiments upon rabbits conducted at the University of Minnesota Dr. Hartzell found that pus taken from the gums and roots of teeth, when injected into rabbits, cause similar diseases to those suffered by the patient. The experiments consisted of 250 cases, and results showed the entire category of common diseases to be prevalent in the mouth. Similar experiments conducted by Drs. Rosenow and Klotz have produced the same results.

Virile Germs Found.

Citing the experiments of Dr. Moody of Chicago as proof, Dr. Hartzell went on to explain that "70 per cent of all refuse on the tooth surface consists of extremely virile germs." These germs when taken into the blood poison the entire system.

The one most prevalent is the straphylococcus which is the germ of acute abscesses. It is the direct cause of many of the diseases of the heart, kidney and joints, and their prevention would be an easy matter by prophylaxis.

Prevention rather than cure is becoming the watchword of the dental

and medical world, Dr. Hartzell explained. Dr. Hartzell's public lecture, which was scheduled to be given in the library this evening, has been postponed until 8 p. m. Friday.

COMMISSION BRINGS BODIES OF CARRIZAL HEROES BACK TO U. S.

heads of men in the crowds along the route of march were bared as the flag-draped caskets slowly passed. Negroes among the spectators openly sobbed.

Only One Body Identified.

D. Tucker of troop K, Tenth cavalry, was the only one of the seven negroes identified before noon. The others had no army identification tags, and the bodies, which had been stripped of clothing before burial, were almost unrecognizably decomposed.

Dug up from shallow graves at the scene of the Carrizal fight, the bodies were brought back to El Paso today by a commission of five Americans sent into Mexico for that purpose.

Scores who thronged the international line to do honor to the Carrizal heroes did not know that a switch engine which had crossed to the American side from Juarez, hauling an old boxcar, was bringing the bodies "home."

The nine caskets were placed in the freight car by the Carrizalista military authorities in Juarez and the car was sealed to prevent any demonstration. On the American side the caskets were placed aboard motor trucks and each draped with the national colors. Later a detachment of the Eighth cavalry was to escort the trucks to an undertaker's parlor to be prepared for burial.

Feeling at Carrizal Bitter.

The commission which returned

with the bodies reported anti-American feeling in the Carrizal district still very bitter.

The Carrizalista commander there would not allow the American dead to be brought into Carrizal. He placed an armed guard over the bodies and Carrizalista soldiers accompanied the commission on the special train to the border. The fate of the 14 American soldiers missing from the Carrizal fight is a mystery here. It is believed their bodies were either cremated by the Carrizalistas or were left lying in the desert, the prey of wolves. The bodies of Captain Boyd, Lieutenant Adair and several of the troops will be shipped to their homes for burial. Those unclaimed probably will be interred in Arlington cemetery, Washington, D. C.

Transportation Club To Install Officers

Special Program to Be Rendered at Meeting in Merchants' National Bank Building Tonight.

Newly elected officers of the Portland Transportation club will be inaugurated into office tonight at a dinner, to be held at the clubrooms in the Merchants' National bank building. The dinner will begin at 6:15.

The club is planning to go almost en masse on the excursion to the Tillamook beaches next Sunday.

Recruiting Going On.

The recruiting station at Clackamas is receiving enlistments right along for the Third Oregon, now at the front. Captain Williams is expecting to forward a special car of recruits to the different companies within the next few days. Nine were enlisted yesterday. There are still vacancies to be filled by 768 men in the Third Oregon.

CHILD DROWNS WHEN THROWN FROM BUGGY INTO SALMON CREEK

Five-Year-Old Son of Mr. and Mrs. W. Kicker of Glenwood Dies in Shallow Water

Vancouver, Wash., July 5.—Thrown from a buggy together with other occupants Henry Kicker, 5-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. William Kicker living at Glenwood, was drowned in Salmon creek Monday, and the body was not recovered until late Wednesday.

Mrs. Kicker, two children and a little nephew from Portland, had gone to a neighboring place to pick cherries for a Fourth of July luncheon. They had also planned to go to Manay to purchase some supplies and to avoid a detour of some two miles attempted to ford the creek, the water being about three feet deep. There is a considerable dropoff on either side of the ford and the horse was swept from its feet and the entire party was thrown into the stream.

Their cries for help attracted J. B. White, owner of the place where they attempted to ford the stream, and he rescued Mrs. Kicker and two of the children, and before he could reach Henry the lad had gone down for the last time.

The body is being held at Limber's undertaking parlors here pending the completion of funeral arrangements.

OFFICERS OF IDAHO MILITIA MAY HAVE TO FACE COURT-MARTIAL

Differences Regarding Matter of Promotion Gets Into Courts Through Lawsuit.

Boise, Idaho, July 6.—(P. N. S.)—Demand for court-martial of Colonel William H. Edelblute and Majors Harry T. Lewis, Clement Wilkins and De Witt C. Olson, on charges of conspiracy against their commander-in-chief and insubordination, will be made to President Wilson by Governor Alexander. It was semi-officially reported today. This action is a sequel to the filing

of proceedings in the supreme court by the three majors to prevent the mustering in of former Adjutant General P. H. Crow as lieutenant colonel of the regiment. Crow was appointed by the governor to fill a vacancy, and the action was brought under Idaho statutes, which provide for succession of officers in case of vacancies, according to rank.

Suit was brought just before the officers were mustered into the federal service.

Officers of the regiment are holding a conference today in an effort to adjust differences.
