

PRESIDENT WIRES HIS THANKS FOR SUPPORT OF FRANCIS J. HENEY

Says the Voters Will Not Lose Sight of Need of Keeping the Bosses in Retirement.

Los Angeles, July 6.—(P. N. S.)—Francis J. Heney, one of the leaders of the Progressive party in California, who recently pledged his support to President Wilson in the coming presidential election, received the following telegram from the president today:

"Honorable Francis J. Heney, Los Angeles, Cal.
"Your telegram of July 2, I need hardly say, gives me sincere satisfaction, not only because of the support so generously promised, but also because of the added emphasis it contributes to the real issues of the campaign and the objects which all true friends of popular government should keep most prominently in mind.

"I am glad you have given such prominence in your kind message to the question of the presidential primary. I have, of course, never lost sight of it even when many other matters of constructive legislation were pressing for early action.

"The delay in effecting legislation has been due to the many political difficulties which have disclosed themselves in the attempt to frame adequate and workable laws. I shall welcome your advice and assistance in surmounting these difficulties.

"Meantime the voters of the country are not likely to lose sight of the immediate necessity of seeing to it that those who have tried personally to conduct and control our choices of presidents and of policies should not again get command of either the executive or the legislative branches of the government. Expect Bitter Fight In Divorce Action

Mrs. Frank Pedro, Wife of Wealthy Sheepman of Pendleton, Starts Suit Involving Large Sum of Money.

Pendleton, Or., July 6.—What promises to be a bitterly contested divorce suit has been filed by Mrs. Frank Pedro, wife of a wealthy sheepman of this city. She asks for \$15,000 cash and alimony of \$100 a month as long as she is unmarried and \$50 a month for the support of a minor daughter, besides title to land in her name and \$1000 for suit money. She alleges cruel and inhuman treatment and cites a long list of wrongs from curses to threats to kill her.

P.)—Representative Baker of California has introduced a resolution appropriating \$2,500,000 for a national defense highway connecting Los Angeles with the California state highway at Redding, California.

IRRIGATION PERMITS INDICATE SMALL LAND OWNER IS IMPROVING

Rights Issued for Watering 7616 Acres of Ground in Oregon in the Last Quarter

Salem, July 6.—Permits for water for the irrigation of 7616 acres of land in Oregon have been issued by State Engineer John H. Lewis during the last quarter, besides permits for the storing of 1440 acre feet, 127 for the appropriation of water, six for the construction of reservoirs, and several for the development of small individual power plants.

"It is a notable fact," said Lewis, "that the permits issued during this quarter are for comparatively small appropriations of water, indicating that the development work going on along this line is being undertaken by the land owners themselves for the improvement of their farms.

The largest area covered by any of the permits was taken out by W. W. Brown of Crook county for irrigation of 266 acres of land, the water to be taken from Twelve Mile creek, Norcross creek and Long Hollow creek. Brown has previously taken out a number of permits for irrigation.

Other receivers of permits are R. W. Logan and J. H. Fox of La Grande, who have a permit to irrigate 220 acres in Malheur county from Corbett creek. They expect to build a reservoir for the storage of 658 acre feet.

Traffic Is Heavy

Salem, July 6.—Traffic over the state road through the Siskiyou mountains, between Oregon and California, is becoming heavy at this time of year and reports of a number of machines going into the ditch or off the grade have come in. During the month of June a total of 1705 vehicles of all kinds passed over the road, according to the records of the state highway department. Sunday traffic is the heaviest, the largest number in any one day being on Sunday, June 11, when 174 vehicles passed over the road.

Auto Company Incorporates

Salem, July 6.—The Overland-Pacific, Inc., an automobile company incorporated in Washington and headed by Seattle business men, Wednesday filed copies of their articles with the corporation commissioner and received permission to transact business in the state. Their general agent in Oregon is H. H. Eling of Portland.

Paper Says Kaiser Weeps Frequently

Intrigues Showing Unsatisfactory Conditions and Abandonment by Big Men Reported Cause of Tears.

Paris, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—The Kaiser has burst into tears several times recently, says the Petit Parisien. Intrigues, showing that things are not going well in Germany, are one cause of his grief, the newspaper asserts, and another is that the big men of the empire are showing a disposition to abandon him.

Report of Mexican Arrests Requested

Governor Johnson Wires District Attorney of Shasta County, at Request of Secretary of State Lansing.

Sacramento, Cal., July 6.—(P. N. S.)—Acting on the request of Secretary of State Lansing, Governor Johnson has telegraphed District Attorney O. M. Chenoweth of Shasta county at Redding, for a full report on the alleged arrest and jailing of Mexicans in Redding June 18.

A dispatch from Redding printed here says: "Twenty men were arrested in Redding June 18, for drunken and disorderly conduct. Six of them were Mexicans. All were released the next morning. Sixteen men were arrested June 25. Fourteen of them were Mexicans. All but two of the Mexicans were released next morning. These two a few days later pleaded guilty to disturbing the peace and are now serving 60 days in jail."

The two are declared by the authorities to have really been guilty of stabbing Americans and might have been charged with a grave offense than disturbing the peace.

Prohibitionists Take Camel as an Emblem

Group of Variety of Animals That Go Without Drink for Long Periods With "P. P." Forms Button.

Chicago, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—"A camel can go eight days without a drink, but who wants to be a camel?" Evidently the Prohibitionists do. At least, announcement has been made from the Prohibition party's headquarters here that the camel has been adopted as the 1916 emblem of the party.

The emblem consists of a group of small camels mounted on a gun metal button with the letters "P. P." for Prohibition party just below.

Anti-vaccinationists Active

Salem, July 6.—The petition of residents of Metolious for the submission of the question to remove the county seat of Jefferson county to Metolious was filed Wednesday, with 425 signatures. The petition is against the state constitution to prohibit compulsory vaccination or medical treatment was filed by Lora C. Little of Portland, with 25,128 names.

Grey to Be Elevated

London, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—Sir Edward Grey will shortly be elevated to the peerage, according to the Chronicle. He will retain the foreign secretaryship.

People of Stricken District Optimistic

Despite Ravages and Death Toll of Deluge at Demos Springs Residents Celebrated Fourth in Happy Spirits.

The Dalles, Or., July 6.—"Despite the fact that a cloudburst just swept this district, residents of Demos Springs celebrated the Fourth and received visitors in their town with happy faces and a spirit of optimism," said Professor J. B. Horner of Oregon Agricultural college, who has arrived here.

"Monday the town was draped in mourning for the death of four persons who were drowned in the deluge last Friday. Tuesday, the sombre colors were taken down and patriotic ones substituted. Recent flood did not seem to discourage the people although saddened by the death of neighbors, and they entered the spirit of the Independence day celebration with a patriotic enthusiasm."

LOYD GEORGE'S PLAN TO SETTLE HOME RULE QUESTION IS ADOPTED

Proposal Is Favored by Unanimous Decision of the English Cabinet.

London, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—It is understood that the cabinet has substantially adopted Lloyd George's proposals for the settlement of the Irish home rule question. As the decision was unanimous no ministerial resignations are now apprehended.

Lord Lansdowne and Walter Long, who hesitated to accept the suggested arrangement, have now come into line on the ground of imperial necessity. Sir Edward Carson, who had notified the government of the acceptance of the scheme by the Irish Unionists, and John Redmond, on his return from Ireland, officially announced his adherence to the Nationalists' proposals.

Plan Announced

Under Lloyd George's plan a home parliament will be immediately set up in Dublin for all of Ireland except six of the nine Ulster counties, the six to remain under British parliament till the end of the war.

Following are hitherto unpublished details of Lloyd George's scheme: A lord lieutenant will be appointed soon. This is essential, for it is the lord lieutenant who, under the act, appoints the Irish executive before the Irish parliament is constituted.

The Irish house of commons will be created by the transfer to the Irish parliament of the 78 members now sitting in the London for the 26 home rule counties.

Conference After War

Of these 78 members, 76 are nationalists or independents, and two are Unionists, Carson and J. H. Campbell. These 78 members will retain their seats at Westminster and the members representing the excluded Ulster counties also will meet and continue to sit at Westminster. The Unionist interests in the south and west of Ireland will be provided for by the nomination of their representatives of the Irish senate.

This temporary settlement is to continue one year after the termination of the war, after which the whole arrangement will come under the purview of a great imperial conference to be held to adjust the government of the empire.

Baker Man Had Much Liquor in His Trunk

Chief of Police Jackson Secured Baggage Check From C. W. Olds for Piece From Utah Containing Spirits.

Baker, Or., July 6.—Chief of Police Jackson started a roundup of bootleggers tonight, his first step being the arrest of Charles W. Olds. In the latter's room was found a suitcase with several quart bottles of whiskey and in his pocket a baggage check. Jackson went to the depot and secured the trunk the check called for, which had been shipped from West Weber, Utah. In the trunk was found 15 gallons of whiskey. Olds made no statement except to deny the booze found in his room was his.

Lieutenant Goodier Retired a Captain

Son of Judge Advocate of Western Department, Who Was Court Martialed for Inciting Insubordination in Army.

Washington, July 6.—(I. N. S.)—The war department has announced the retirement of Lieutenant Goodier with the rank of captain. Goodier is a son of Lieutenant Colonel Louis Goodier, judge advocate of the western department of the army, who was court martialed recently on charges of inciting insubordination among younger officers in connection with the conduct of the aviation school at San Diego.

Lieutenant Goodier was injured during an airplane flight and Colonel Goodier in letters in evidence at the court martial alleged that the incompetency of Captain Arthur Cowan at that time in charge of the aviation school, was primarily responsible for injuries sustained by his son and other aviators.

Clemency Is Urged For Iron Workers

Sentences Request Pardon for John Barry and Paul J. Morris Now Serving Sentences in Fort Leavenworth.

Washington, July 6.—(U. P.)—President Wilson today was urged to exercise clemency in the cases of John Barry and Paul J. Morris of St. Louis, convicted iron workers now serving sentences at Fort Leavenworth. Senators Stone and Reed, Speaker Clark and Congressman Igoe of Missouri, urged either state commutation or pardon for the men. Morris has one month to serve and Barry 13 months.

The Missouri delegation also recommended to the president the appointment of E. A. Sedgwick of St. Louis as a member of the court of claims.

Portland Teachers Return From Hawaii

Halle and Marjorie Samson Beach San Francisco After Year of Teaching Natives, Many Older and Larger.

San Francisco, July 6.—(P. N. S.)—The "midjet" schoolmams of Hawaii are in town. They are the Misses Halle and Marjorie Samson of Portland, who are Samsons only in intellect and spirits. Seventeen and eighteen years of age, respectively, they are said to be the youngest as well as the smallest school teachers that have ever gone to teach the natives of the islands the hows and whys of the three R's.

Having successfully accomplished this for one whole year, the two Samson sisters returned yesterday on the liner Matsushita for their summer's vacation, after which they will return to Hawaii.

Many of their scholars are older and at least twice the size of the "midjets," one of whom is just five feet and her sister five feet one inch high. The Misses Samson arrived in Portland yesterday and will spend the summer here.
