The Freckled Nose. THE freckle season is at hand. In the lives of a percentage of women it is omnipresent. Others encounter it periodically. The summer months, however, produce more freckles than any other period of the year. This is due to the fact that when the weather is pleasant women are more inclined, consciously or unconsciously, to submit their complexions to the weather test.

Freckles, like gray hair, are sometimes admired, but their possessors never appear in the roles of admirers. Admiration is expressed by those blessed with clear complexions—and they never court even sun kisses.

In some instances freckles are entirely due to physical conditions. Physicians attribute them to various causes, but doctors seldom take a serious view of the little complexion disturbers. They are not considered

sufficiently serious to command the attention of the grave men of science, yet in feminine eyes a freckle looms as large as a mountain.

The rays of the sun and wind are the chief producers of freckles, no matter what their origin may be. If the sun's heat and the wind's burn merely raise the discolored pigments to the surface where they leave ugly little brown marks each is exerting an unwelcome influence upon the complexion. For this reason women who freckle easily must continually shelter and protect their cheeks when they spend much time outdoors.

It is not especially difficult to avoid the freckles that are due to the influence of the sun's rays and wind upon the skin. But in summertime there is certainly a great temptation to toss the hat aside when playing tennis or strolling and to discard the veil when motoring and facing cutting winds.

As freckles form under the outer skin, they are difficult to reach, and the longer they are neglected the more firmly they become imbedded. Freckles are little accumulations of pigments. It is hard to erase them at any time, but especially so when they become firmly attached.

I have seen girls to whom a freckle or so seemed quite becoming. It would be impossible, however, to convince any freckle-faced girl that such is the case, and freckles seldom travel alone, they invariably appear in large numbers.

The strong, healthy skins of women who are accustomed to outdoor life are not so readily blighted by freckles as those of women who coddle themselves all winter and then plunge into outdoor sports with the advent of warm weather. The neglected cheek also readily yields to the heat of the sun, and the air stings.

So many women are bothered by freckles that numerous remedies are offered. It is well to carry a lotion of this character when traveling, but it should also be available at all times. A very simple lotion consists of four ounces of lactic acid, two ounces of glycerin and one ounce of rose water. This can be applied several times daily, but only after the skin has been thoroughly cleansed. Pour into a saucer only such quantity as is needed for a single application and apply with a white rag, or preferably absorbent cotton.

Do not become panic-stricken when the first freckle appears. There are bigger annoyances than freckles. If a freckle seats itself upon your nose, it will assume the proportions of a mountain in your eyes. And if you do not at once attempt its removal, it will soon have the staying qualities of a mountain.
