

### GRAIN HANDLERS IN SYMPATHETIC STRIKE WITH LONGSHOREMEN

Force on Irving Dock Walks Out When Steamer Comes Alongside for Wheat Cargo.

### SACKS FOUND DAMAGED

Bottom Containers Ripped Open—Wax Measure Adopted for Support of Idle Men.

Grainhandlers were added to the list of strikers this morning when the steamer Beaver shifted to Irving dock to load a part cargo of grain for San Francisco delivery. Refusing to work with the non-union men employed by the San Francisco & Portland Steamship company to load the bottom sack on every row of recently trucked grain had been split from end to end, the grain spilling out the moment the truck was lifted from the floor. Beyond considerable delay while the bags were sewed up, no damage resulted. The unions have adopted tax measures for the strikers who are employed. From the wages of each man employed on fair boats during the strike \$1 a day is being taken for the common cause. Longshoremen had not been apprised of the action up to the time they received their money, and considerable dissatisfaction is said to have resulted among the lower-river workers.

### SYMPATHETIC STRIKE NEXT

Teamsters to Go Out and Firemen Consider Move.

San Francisco, July 7.—(U. P.)—Strong probability of the declaration of a sympathetic strike by the marine firemen, following the favorable vote on such action taken by the teamsters' union, loomed up today in waterfront circles. The firemen will vote next week on the request of the bay and river boat men, whose strike has been coincident with that of the stevedores. For a sympathetic walk-out it was on this proposition that the teamsters voted to strike, insofar as the river boats are concerned, if peace is not made by today in the waterfront. While they are under consideration by the waterfront workers' federation executive board a request from the longshoremen's local for sympathetic action. Were such action taken, it would affect many, if not all, of the 12 unions comprising the federation in addition to the longshoremen and the river men. That no definite move toward asking the individual unions to pass on the longshoremen's request will be made while the strike is in progress of settlement was the declaration made today by officials of the waterfront federation.

### POLICE INVESTIGATE PLOT

Dock Worker Declares He Was Offered Roll to Destroy Craft.

San Francisco, July 7.—(U. P.)—An alleged plot to destroy the steamer City of Topeka, owned by the Pacific Coast Steamship company, was divulged today when a syndicate of dock laborer, reported to the police, that he had been offered a large sum of money to place explosives on the steamer. Shurburn declared that on the night of July 1 he was approached by three men who told him they knew he was working on the docks and displayed a large roll of money. They offered to give it to him if he would place a "package" on the steamer. In the fight which ensued, when Shurburn refused the offer, he sustained a broken nose. The police are investigating.

### Changes and Charters.

San Francisco, July 7.—F. Plath has succeeded L. C. Hart in command of the steamer Arroyo. R. Bagott has replaced G. Harris as master of the steamer City of Puebla. James Bowen has replaced J. Farina in command of the steamer Arroyo. C. Eversen has been appointed master of the steamer Charles Nelson, relieving Captain J. Hansen. The Japanese steamer Yesan Maru will be laid on the berth for Vladivostok (September 5 loading) by Comyn, Mackall & Co.

### Japanese Adopt "Dollar."

San Francisco, July 7.—The Japanese government has granted permission to the Toyo Kisen Kaisha to revise its freight and passenger rates between Japan, San Francisco and South America, and to adopt the American system of computation, making the dollar instead of the English pound the basis of quotation.

### Nann Smith Reported Sold.

Marshallfield, Or., July 7.—It is stated here that a deal for the sale of the C. A. Smith steamer, Nann Smith, to Norwegian buyers has been closed. The vessel is now at San Francisco. No particulars are known here but it was stated the price was a half million. The boat cost about \$300,000 when new.

### Tacoma Strikers To Buy in Seattle To Spite Merchants

Tacoma, Wash., July 7.—(U. P.)—Seattle merchants today learned that a special committee under the authority of the Tacoma Central Labor Council has been organized for the purpose of laying a scheme of retaliation against the Tacoma Commercial club and Chamber of Commerce for its stand for an open shop in this city. The committee has taken steps toward engaging an inter-urban train once or twice a week, at the direction of the labor council, to take union men from Tacoma to Seattle to make their purchases. Seattle merchants "fair" to organized labor would grant a discount of 10 per cent on all goods, which taken in conjunction with reduced fares, would make shopping in Seattle advantageous to the Tacoma buyers, the union men declare. In a public announcement of its plan, the committee declared that 90 per cent of the Commercial club members are merchants and employers who endorse the Employers' association in importing outside labor to fill the jobs of Tacoma home owners and taxpayers.

### To Fish From Coos Bay.

Marshallfield, Or., July 7.—The gasolin schooner Seafarm of Seattle has been brought here from Bandon and will remain at this port. It has been purchased by Claud C. Thompson and others of this city and will be operated as a deep-sea fishing boat. It is the intention of the fishery which will be handled in the local markets. The boat is 45 feet long and the gross tonnage is 13. The boat was formerly engaged in fishing out of Puget sound ports.

### Temporary Injunction Given.

Seattle, July 7.—(U. P.)—On application of the Alaska Steamship company, Federal Judge Neter today signed a temporary restraining order directed against the International Longshoremen's association, enjoining them from interfering either with employees or property of the steamship company. The writ is made returnable Saturday, July 15, when the case will be tried on its merits.

### N. E. A. "Pissyfoots" WHEN VOTE IS TAKEN ON MILITARY TRAINING

Compulsion Neither Favored or Disapproved; Local Right in Matter Recognized.

### TRAINING CAMP ATTACKED

New Yorker Says Ones Like That Near New York Are Institutions of Intoxication and Prostitution.

New York, July 7.—(U. P.)—The National Education Association "pissyfoots" today when it came down to a vote on the question of military training in the schools. After picturesque and oftentimes lurid debate, the association finally adopted a resolution which, while neither favoring nor disapproving compulsory training, "recognizes the right of states and municipalities to order such training, and concludes: 'The organization believes that such training should be strictly educational in its aim and organization, and that the military end should not be permitted to pervert the educational purposes and practices of the school.'"

### Spalding's Adopted Son Killed in Action

Youth Was Lieutenant of Tenth Royal Inniskillen Fusiliers and Had Served With Distinction at Flanders. San Diego, Cal., July 7.—(U. P.)—Albert G. Spalding Jr., adopted son of the late A. G. Spalding, millionaire sporting goods manufacturer, was killed in action in Flanders July 1, according to word received here today. Young Spalding was a lieutenant in the Tenth Royal Inniskillen Fusiliers. He had served with distinction in the Flanders campaign and met his death in the first few hours of the great drive of the allies. Young Spalding's mother resides at Point Loma, but is visiting out of the city at present. Word of her son's death was sent to her by the British war office.

### Mexico Will Observe Argentine Birthday

Mexico City, July 7.—(U. P.)—General Carranza today decreed that Sunday, July 9, shall be observed as a national holiday, "in view of the proximity of the first centenary of the independence of the republic of Argentina." The holiday is declared, Carranza said, as proof of the sincere friendship of the Mexican people for the people of the South American republic.

One other resolution adopted provides for appointment of a committee of five to see President Wilson and urge appointment of a commission to devise means of taking the yoke off the neck of the farm woman, and to make rural homes more livable. ### NEW SCHEDULE FOR OREGON ELECTRIC GOES INTO EFFECT SUNDAY

Numerous Minor Changes Are Announced by Operating Department. A new train schedule will go into effect on the Oregon Electric Sunday, making numerous minor changes in the time of several trains between Portland and Salem and affecting time on the branch divisions. Train service between Portland and Forest Grove will be improved through the addition to the yard of an evening train from Forest Grove to Portland. This train, known as No. 46, and which has been operated on Saturday nights only, will be run daily. This train will leave Forest Grove at 4:45 p. m. and arrive Portland at 11 p. m. For some time there has been a need for a daily train to the metropolis later than the present arrangement, which has been Forest Grove to Portland at 7:40, and arrive Portland 9:05 p. m. On the main line between Portland and Salem and Eugene more important changes will be made. The Salem-Albany-Eugene Limited will leave 5 minutes later, at 8:30 a. m. The arriving time at up-valley towns will be the same as at present. Train No. 85, which heretofore has been operated out of Salem to Albany, Junction City and Eugene, leaving Salem at 7:10 a. m. and arrived Eugene at 8:20 a. m., has been annulled, and on the new card the corresponding train to be known as No. 1 will run through from Portland to Eugene on a corresponding schedule of time. This train will leave Portland at 6:30 a. m., West Woodburn 7:53 a. m., Salem 8:30 a. m., Albany 9:50 a. m., Junction City 10:27 a. m., arriving at Eugene 10:55 a. m. Salem-Eugene afternoon local, leaving Portland at 2:05 p. m., will arrive at Salem at 4:15, the time at intermediate stations where stops are made being a few minutes earlier. Train No. 60, from Corvallis, will arrive at Portland at 7:40, instead of 7:50 p. m., and trains 63 and 64, between Woodburn and Salem, and trains on the Corvallis and Woodburn branches, will be changed to make direct connections with the main line trains.

### Doctor Serving Time To Lose His License

State Board Expected to Bar Dr. E. Rae Norris, Now in Penitentiary, From Further Practising Profession. At the semi-annual meeting of the state board of medical examiners, which will be held this afternoon in the Medical building at the office of Dr. L. H. Hamilton, secretary, it is expected that the license of Dr. E. Rae Norris, formerly a practitioner in Wasco county, will be revoked on the grounds of unprofessional and dishonorable conduct. Dr. Norris is now serving a term of three to 20 years in the state penitentiary for a statutory crime committed against a girl in Wasco county. He was convicted in October, 1915. Deputy District Attorney Pierce will appear as counsel for the board.

### Johnson to Address State Progressives

Meeting Will Be Held at San Francisco to Perfect Plans for Support of Republican Campaign. Sacramento, July 7.—(U. P.)—Governor Johnson went to San Francisco today to speak at the statewide conference of Progressives to be held at the Palace hotel at 2 o'clock Saturday afternoon. The purpose of the gathering is to perfect future plans for Progressive action and to enable Progressives who expect to affiliate with the Republican party, collectively, and by organization, to consider participation in the approaching campaign. It is expected that those who expect to affiliate with the Democratic party within their party collectively and by organization, to act in like fashion.

### Search for Bandit Of Yosemite Is Vain

Reward of \$200 for Arrest of Man Who Robbed Five Stages Wednesday Is Offered by Stage Company. Fresno, Cal., July 7.—(U. P.)—Posses returned discouraged and weary today after vainly searching the hills near Yosemite valley for the bandit who robbed passengers of five stages Wednesday and escaped with \$400. All traces of the highwayman came to naught. Officers believe he made good his escape. A reward of \$200 for the man's arrest has been offered by the Yosemite Stage & Turnpike company. The smoothness with which the crime was committed makes Sheriff Lewis believe the road agent was the same man who held up many stages near Yosemite five years ago, terrorizing the district for weeks.
