HAGERMAN UNABLE TO STOP ASSAULTS UPON HIM BY SEAL HITTERS

Beavers Make Two Runs in First and Then Quit for the Entire Afternoon.

SEALS GET 5, BEAVERS 2

Spider Baum Does Some Good Work With His Strong Arm and His Trusty Bat.

San Francisco, July 7.—The Beavers scored twice in the very first inning yesterday and the Seals came back with enough to even up things. Jones walked and Willie forced at second by Sepulveda. Dalton scoring. Then Baum smashed a two bagger to deep left field and by the time it was home-ward bound, Honk was safe at second and Don Louis was over the plate.

Schaller Ends the Inning. Chick Autrey followed with a long single to right, Baum moving up to third and Chick taking second on the throw-in. Schaller ended the inning with a grounder to Stumpf.

In the ninth, with two out, Baum walked Roche, batting for Hagerman, and Willie hit Vaughn wound up the game with a grounder to Downs, forcing Roche at second. The score: PORTLAND.
