BEAVERS TAKE GAME WITH HOUCK PITCHING; LOSE WITH SOTHORON

Divide Their Sunday Double-header at San Francisco Even Up With the Seals.

C. BROWN IS DELIVERER

Seals Hit Sotheron Hard in Two Innings, First and Fifth, in the Afternoon Game.

San Francisco, July 10.—(I. N. S.)—San Francisco, being now regarded as one large, collective fan, takes off its hat and makes profound obeisance to Curley Brown.

For Curley, having outfielded to our profound satisfaction all week and having also whacked numerous base hits that figured in the making of runs, went back to his regular job of pitching yesterday afternoon and tried the Seals into victory. He had one bad inning, but in eight innings he pitched about this one game, but victory for the Seals, with 176 out of eight contacts.

The score was 7 to 3, which on the face of it bears testimony to the efficient labors of Curley's supporting cast, in the morning game at Oakland a couple of thousand fans saw Byron Houck shut the Seals out. "Skeeter" Panning was hit rather freely, Portland winning, 3 to 0.

Sotheron Couldn't Stop 'Em. Allen Sotheron was picked for a trimming in the first inning, and while his team-mates subsequently gave him a one-run lead, he could not stop the Seals when they started batting in earnest.

With two out in the first, Rodgers got to Brown for a two-bagger. But he died on second when "Chick" Autrey made a great running catch of Nixon's high fly. "Chick" had his stomach up against the rail between the grandstand and the right-field bleachers when he took the ball.

Sotheron disposed of Autrey and Schaller on flies. Then Ping Bodie sent a two-bagger crashing against the center-field fence. Downs and Dalton walked, hitting the sacks.

Brown Bats Ball. Enter upon the scene the hero of the day, Curley Brown, who promptly duplicated Bodie's feat, bouncing the ball from the bleachers, striking two bases and sending Bodie and Downs across the plate. Jones walked, and again the bases were full. But Clarence Brooks was out on a pretty running catch by Hill, and the inning was over.

The fourth was the frame in which Brown had his troubles. Bill Rodgers led off by beating out a hit to Shortstop Bodie. Nixon walked to first, and Downs and Stumpf walked. Then came Jack Roche with a two-bagger to right field, scoring Rodgers and sending Bodie to second. Stumpf walked, Stumpf with a sacrifice fly to Dalton, Roche taking third. Ward singled to left, scoring Roche. Sotheron popped out to Jones, and the inning was over with the Beavers in the lead, 3 to 2.

Dennis Wille, the Beaver centerfielder, won the morning game for his club in the third inning, when he pitched runners on the bases, he smashed out a two-base hit and scored them both. In the sixth inning Houck Vaughn led with a two-bagger and a sacrifice fly, trying to take an extra base. Then Bill Southworth tripled to centerfield, and Bill Rodgers brought him home with a single. Houck kept him home with the ball, but the crowd was a whole game, but five assists being credited to the Beavers. Houck gave one walk, the only one issued in the game.
