

STRONG ADDRESS ON AMERICANISM GIVEN AT CHAUTAUQUA PARK

Speaker Declares We Should Stand Behind President and Flag at All Times.

Oregon City, Or., July 13.—Enthusiasm was at a high pitch yesterday at Chautauqua park. Gladstone, and from early morning until late at night. The auditorium was filled, first to hear Dr. Sutcliffe give his hourly lecture, again during the Forum hour when Rev. C. E. Cline was the principal speaker and a third time in the afternoon, when Kekuku's Hawaiians appeared in their first concert. This was followed by a concert by the Veteran Male quartet of Portland. In the evening the Hawaiians appeared in a two hour program called "An Evening in Hawaii."

Cline Talks Americanism.
Dr. C. E. Cline emphasized Americanism and said that though he might not always agree with the policies of President Wilson as true Americans he should stand behind him. Pointing to a large American flag draped behind the platform Dr. Cline said that we should stand behind our flag, right or wrong. The speaker extolled the public school system of the United States and said that the schools should be non-sectarian and no money should be voted for the support of sectarian schools.

The present primary election system is not a true representative form of government, he said. Defects in the primary laws will have to be remedied some time.

America Like Grist Mill.

The speaker referred to our government as a large mill, similar to those used years ago to clean wheat. In this mill, he said, are put the German, Englishman, Frenchman, Italian and other persons from foreign countries. The mill begins to grind and the grist is the true American. Care should be taken, he declared, to see that the product of the mill is the true American and not the hyphenated American.

Dr. Henry Clay Kline of Nashville, Tenn., was the Forum hour speaker today at 11 o'clock. He had selected as his subject "An Eagle Feather."

At 2 o'clock this afternoon Dr. Ellis Purlee will deliver a popular lecture. Dr. Purlee is in charge of the Chautauqua's afternoon programs, and is known from coast to coast as a splendid speaker. His lecture will be preceded by a program furnished by the Comus Players.

Oregon Graduates in Company.
Two graduates of the University of Oregon will portray the principal parts in the offerings of Comus Players. This organization will appear in the auditorium at 7:30 p. m., first presenting scenes from Shakespeare and then appearing in "Carson of the North Woods."

No time for the election has been set and no candidates to be voted upon in Myers' place have been named.

New Road Nearly Ready.

Lapine, July 13.—The new road for Lapine to Newberry Crater from Lapine will be ready for use in another week. This route, via the Uhlman and Erb ranches, decreases the grade and the distance considerably, and no sharp pitch or gullies are on the road, as there are on the old Paulina creek road.

Veteran Navigator Says Site Is Ideal

Captain S. V. Winslow Considers That Priest Rapids Are Most Desirable in the West for Nitrate Production.

Kennecott, Wash., July 13.—With the government considering Priest Rapids, in the Columbia river, 10 miles above here, as one of the possible sites for the location of the nitrate factory to be built by the government, and the possibility that that place will be chosen, power development enthusiasts in this section are jubilant.

It is pointed out that Priest Rapids possesses unlimited potential power, that both rail and river transportation facilities are good and that it is located near great agricultural producing sections.

Captain S. V. Winslow, who has navigated the Columbia and Snake rivers for years, and who is an ardent advocate for the development of Columbia and Snake power, says that there is no place in the west more ideally adapted for the location of a nitrate plant than at Priest Rapids.
