

CURE ANNOUNCED FOR INFANTILE PARALYSIS BY GREAT INSTITUTE

Dr. Meltzer of Rockefeller Institute Says Adrenalin Will Prevent Lesions.

NEW YORK CASES SPREAD

There Were 31 Deaths and 100 New Cases of Dread Disease in Greater New York in Past 24 Hours.

Adrenalin is Cure. New York, N. Y., July 14.—(I. N. S.)—Dr. Meltzer of the Rockefeller Institute, Dr. Meltzer asserts that the injection of adrenalin will prevent spinal lesions which are the cause of paralysis and death to those infants stricken with the malady. He is experimenting with adrenalin to ascertain whether it can be used as a vaccine to prevent infection.

New York, July 14.—(I. N. S.)—Thirty-one more victims were claimed by the infantile paralysis epidemic in greater New York during the 24 hours ending at 10 a. m. today. One hundred and sixty new cases were reported during the same period.

Although the weather was somewhat cooler than during the preceding 24 hour period, marked increase, both in deaths and new cases was registered.

Sixteen of the 31 deaths and 120 of the 160 new cases occurred in Brooklyn.

The health department today announced that sufficient physicians had been secured to thoroughly canvass all parts of the city, insuring speedy attention in suspected cases.

Seattle Examines Children. Seattle, Wash., July 14.—(P. N. S.)—On the first train to arrive in Seattle today from the east, 15 small children were examined for traces of infantile paralysis. Dr. C. R. Rorabaugh, assisted by two nurses, made the examinations.

All children passed the examination favorably.

Those whose temperatures showed a slight increase were given the reflex test of the knee.

By tapping the knee, after the child is seated, it is possible to determine if infantile paralysis has set in.

Washington's only present known case of infantile paralysis, that of Elizabeth Delight, two and a half years old, is today so materially improved that attending physicians declare she will soon be well.

The case was discovered at Auburn, near Tacoma. Dr. William H. Brandt is attending her. Her father, J. D. Dalglity, is an engineer of the Northern Pacific Railway company.

She was taken ill on June 24.

Memphis Reports Cases. Memphis, Tenn., July 14.—(I. N. S.)—Fifteen cases of infantile paralysis in Dyer county were reported today, 7 in Crockett county, and 10 in scattered localities.

The authorities are bending every effort toward enforcing strict sanitary regulations in the hope of checking the epidemic.

Theatre Managers Meet. San Francisco, July 14.—(P. N. S.)—A meeting of theatre managers was called here today to consider precau-

tions to prevent infantile paralysis becoming epidemic here.

Similar action has already been taken by the moving-picture house proprietors, under the direction of the board of health.

Seven Die in Tennessee. Alamo, Tenn., July 14.—(I. N. S.)—Two deaths from infantile paralysis were reported here today, making a total of seven since the disease first manifested itself in this locality. Six new cases also were reported.

36 Cases in Illinois. Chicago, July 14.—(U. P.)—There are only 36 cases of infantile paralysis in the state of Illinois, including Chicago, Dr. C. St. Clair Drake, secretary of the state board of health, announced here this afternoon in stating the situation in Illinois is far from alarming.

Ten of the cases are in Chicago. Drake said. Four each are at Belleville and East St. Louis; two each at Standard, Dixon, Blue Island and Virgil, and one each at Streator, Gibson City, Marion, Quincy, Eureka, Freeport, Dalton City, Kankakee, Cherry and Oregon. All of these are under quarantine.

In addition, Dr. Drake said there are three "suspected" cases, one each at Danville, Belleville and Simpson.

FRENCH CELEBRATING BASTILLE DAY, GAIETY FIRST SINCE THE WAR

speech which was part of the national holiday celebration.

"Fighting for Life." "We are fighting not for honor alone—but for life," said Poincaré.

"To be or not to be—that is the problem imposed by Germany on the great European nations."

"We are seeking entire restitution of our invaded provinces and of those seized 45 years ago, for reparation for the violation of rights at the expense of France and her allies, and for a guarantee necessary to a definite safeguard of our national independence."

"The central empire can be under no delusion as to reducing the allies to a confession of defeat and of winning a peace which for Prussian militarism would be only a cloak to hide preparations for new aggressions."

Geography Not Important. "They know well that the seas are closed to them, that they have lost their colonies and they know equally well that the allies rely less on the geographical positions of their trenches than on the condition of their troops and the moral strength of their people and their armies."

The usual crowds visited the Place de la Bastille, where guides pointed out the spot where the famous old prison stood before it was stormed by the Parisian populace July 14, 1779.

Bastille day was observed in the trenches from the English channel to Switzerland. Every soldier in the Belgian and French armies received increased rations for the day and a bottle of champagne.

Soldiers Are Cheered. In addition to the regular rations, the soldiers received 100 grammes of ham, 125 grammes of preserves, green vegetables and biscuits. To every four soldiers went one cigar, the donors calculating that about that percentage of the men preferred cigars to cigarettes.

The colonials and Mohammedan troops, who do not eat meat, received seven cents in money instead of the ham and additional supplies of coffee and sugar instead of champagne. Each colonial soldier was given two packages of Algerian cigarettes instead of a cigar.

Ten Will Represent Tacoma. Tacoma, Wash., July 14.—(P. N. S.)—Ten Tacoma suffragists, members of Susan B. Anthony chapter of the National Council of Women Voters, will leave July 23 to attend the annual convention of the national council at Cheyenne, Wyo., July 26-29.

BOND BUYERS MAKE GOOD BIDS FOR ISSUE IF ALBANY WILL VOTE

Two Portland Bank Representatives Offer to Pay Cost of Special Election.

COUNCIL WILL CONSIDER

Contracts for Sewer Improvements Are Let—City Treasurer Presents Quarterly Report.

Albany, Or., July 13.—A commonplace meeting of the Albany City council was convened last evening when Carl S. Kelly, representing the Lumbermen's Trust Co., and Burton C. Haines, representing Clark, Kendall & Co., both of Portland, appeared with propositions to buy a bond issue of \$87,710.67 to float that amount of outstanding warrants.

Both offered to pay the costs for a special election to procure the necessary charter amendment, furnish ballots, blank bonds, legal advice and pay in addition a small premium on five per cent bonds. The council voted to make the matter a special order for Thursday evening, when the offers of both firms were to be received in sealed form.

Besides authorizing the construction of two more lateral sewers in the east end of the city bids were awarded to W. B. Weaver for constructing two other sewers, 678 and 320 feet long respectively, to cost \$394 and \$144 each.

The quarterly reports of City Treasurer H. H. Crockett and City Recorder L. G. Lewelling were read, showing receipts amounting to \$37,143 for the quarter, and \$20,305 in disbursements and invested in warrants, with a cash balance of \$16,835. The current expense for the quarter was \$11,848.

The city debt is as follows: Bonds due and outstanding warrants, \$319,630; available cash, \$16,835; amount sinking funds invested, \$6935; unpaid paving assessments, \$122,608. The net indebtedness of the city is \$172,903.

Odd Fellows Install Officers. Albany, Or., July 14.—The local lodge of Odd Fellows installed officers last night and presented jewels to Past Grand Masters J. K. Weatherford and T. J. Sikes. Grand Master of Oregon H. S. Westbrook made the presentation speech. The following officers were installed: N. E. Hoover, noble grand; J. F. Mitts, vice noble; and among the appointive officers, E. S. Geer, warden; E. A. Hudson, conductor; and Theodore Hofflich, chaplain. Victor Oliver, financial secretary, and A. C. Baker, recording secretary, hold over in their offices. District Deputy Victor Oliver conducted the installation.

Girl to Be Placed in Home. Albany, Or., July 14.—Juvenile Judge D. B. McKnight has ordered Zella Fry, 15 years old, taken from her mother and placed in the Louise home in Portland. Mrs. Upton, of the home, left for Portland with the girl last night. John Fry, father of the girl, who divorced his wife several years ago, was present and favored the order.

Mrs. Minert Secures Decree. Albany, July 14.—Circuit Court Judge William Galloway has granted a decree of divorce to Sophie Minert from Claus Minert. They were married 31 years ago and have four children, the eldest of which is 30 years and the youngest 23 years old.

Shipments Show Increase. Albany, Or., July 14.—There were 507 shipments of liquor received in Linn county in June. Albany received 254 and Lebanon 70 of the shipments for drinking purposes. There has been a steady increase in the number of shipments since the first of the year, beginning with 55 in January.

Postal Receipts Increase. Albany, Or., July 14.—Postal receipts for Albany for the quarter ending June 30 were \$4566.67. For the same period last year the receipts were \$4813. This is a gain of \$246.67, or more than 13 per cent over the second quarter of 1915.

Hughes to Begin His Campaign August 7. Bridgehampton, N. Y., July 14.—(I. N. S.)—Charles E. Hughes will begin his presidential campaign speech-making tour August 7, with a speech at Detroit.

From there he will go to Chicago and St. Paul, working his way west by Pacific coast with a program of 10 or so speeches in the larger cities of the west.

The candidate plans to return east in time to speak in Maine before the September elections.

Two Are Killed in Acetylene Flareup. Gas Tank Explodes in San Francisco Factory, Instantly Killing Two Workmen, Fatally Injuring Third.

San Francisco, July 14.—(P. N. S.)—Two men were killed and a third probably fatally injured here this afternoon when an acetylene gas tank exploded at the plant of the California Artistic Metal & Wire company.

The dead men, Samuel Greenburg and Michael Siegel, were blown for many yards and terribly mangled. Samuel Voss was the man fatally hurt.

Three Injured When Auto Hits Woodpile. Motor Truck Steering Gear Breaks on Hill, Occupants Being Thrown to Pavement by Impact.

Three men were injured early this afternoon when the steering gear of an Oregon Box & Manufacturing company motor truck broke on a down grade on Hood street, causing the vehicle to crash into a wood pile.

J. S. Cheek of the Leeds apartments, John Javon of 78 Tacoma avenue and C. Schwerdtman of H. Brannan street, were thrown off the truck. They were thrown off by the impact and taken to Good Samaritan hospital. Schwerdtman is worst injured, with a bad cut on the arm.

Pastor's Aide Quits, Goes to the Border

R. E. Randall Resigns as Assistant and Will Direct Y. M. C. A. Work Among the Soldiers.

R. E. Randall, for the last year pastor's assistant at the First Presbyterian church, resigned his position today and goes tonight to the border to direct Y. M. C. A. association work among the Oregon troops along the California border line.

He is undertaking the work under the auspices of the state organization of the Y. M. C. A., which decided to send him south, a special meeting held this afternoon. His duties will include social service work and the establishment of reading rooms, etc.

As pastor's assistant, Mr. Randall made many friends in Portland, and there is general regret that his work calls for his departure. He came to Portland about three and a half years ago from Canada as a religious and social worker for the Y. M. C. A., and about a year ago became assistant to Dr. Boyd at the church.

VILLA DEMANDS THAT CHIHUAHUA BE GIVEN OVER TO HIS FORCES

Trevino and His Staff Are Threatened With Death if Demand Is Refused.

El Paso, Texas, July 14.—(U. P.)—Villa has demanded the surrender of Chihuahua City, according to a well founded, but unofficial report here today.

General George Bell Jr., commander at Fort Bliss, stated he received reliable information of the defection of General Trevino, commandant in Chihuahua City, from the Carranza government.

Bell had also heard the reports of Villa's demand for the surrender of Chihuahua City, but had not received confirmation.

Villa is said to have informed Trevino that if the city was not turned over to the Villistas they would advance against the capital with their entire army. Villa threatened Trevino and all his officers with death in case of capture, according to the rumor.

Supplies Sent Americans. General Bell would not discuss the possibility that Trevino's reported defection meant the surrender of Chihuahua City to Villa.

Trevino today revoked his orders to detain railroad shipments of supplies through Juárez to the American border in Mexico. A train of 31 cars of provisions was allowed to go to Colonia Dublan. Trevino gave no explanation of his previous orders which led to the charges that his policy was in keeping with the new Villista movement to bring on war with the United States and overthrow Carranza in northern Mexico.

Fifty Thousand Guardsmen Ready. This is the "grave" news declared on the beat authority to have been transmitted to Washington and reflected in the large concentration of militia here. With the arrival of 500 Massachusetts militia recruits from Framingham today, there were 24,990 National Guardsmen in the El Paso district. Other state contingents ordered to El Paso will bring the total to 50,000, it is believed.

Government agents have been instructed from Washington to be on the lookout against aid going to Villa from the United States. Former Villista units are under surveillance. Steps have been taken to prevent smuggling of arms and ammunition across the Big Bend border. General Bell said today more militia probably would be moved there shortly.

WOMAN MEETS DEATH WHEN MACHINE RUNS OFF STEEP HIGHWAY

Mrs. W. H. Myers, of Portland, Crushed Under Car Near Oregon City.

Oregon City, Or., July 14.—Mrs. W. H. Myers, aged 40, wife of a cooper residing at 3001 Sixty-second avenue, S. E., Portland, was killed about 7 o'clock last night when an automobile in which she was riding, driven by Mrs. F. W. Orpin, of Glen Harbor station, near Portland, wife of a railway engineer, ran off the highway into a ravine on the Oregon City Parkplace road, near the point where it crosses the southern Pacific railway tracks. Mrs. Myers' head was caught between the overturned auto and a fence post and she was choked to death.

Driver's Mother Hurt. Mrs. W. J. Kent, mother of Mrs. Orpin, suffered cuts and bruises about the head and was taken to a hospital in Oregon City. The other occupants of the machine were Mr. and Mrs. R. A. Wells, of Oregon City, and their two children, aged 4 and 6. They suffered only minor injuries.

The accident happened while Mrs. Orpin was conveying her friends from Oregon City to Chautauqua park at Gladstone and was due to the failure of the automobile to respond to the wheel. Mrs. Orpin and Mr. Wells state, a burst in the engine, traveling at about eight miles an hour, ran off the road at the top of a hill despite Mrs. Orpin's frantic efforts to control it and ended up at the bottom of the ravine about 70 feet from the point where it took the plunge. All members of the party were pinned beneath it.

Car Was Old One. Mr. and Mrs. Orpin had been attending the Chautauqua and the latter went to Oregon City to bring a load of friends back to the park, where they were to rejoin Mr. Orpin. The automobile is an old one, and this is believed to account for the fact that the steering apparatus stuck.

ORPET CASE MAY GO TO THE JURY BEFORE NIGHT; QUICK VERDICT

If Attorneys Can Complete Arguments Verdict Before Saturday Night Expected.

DEATH PENALTY AVOIDED

State Wants Conviction but Not Death of Orpet, Says Prosecutor—Wilkinson Closes for the Defense.

Waukegan, Ill., July 14.—(I. N. S.)—Attorney James H. Wilkerson finished his closing plea for the defense in the trial of Will H. Orpet, charged with the murder of Marian Lambert, this afternoon at 2:15 o'clock.

Special Prosecutor David Joslyn immediately began the state's final plea, and it was deemed possible that the case might go to the jury before night. In that event a verdict will probably be rendered before tomorrow night.

Although the issues of the case are by no means clear-cut, there have been no startling developments in the course of the trial, and the jurors, so far as real evidence goes, virtually have had more than a week in which to make up their minds.

In contrast to Attorney Ralph Potter, whose speech of yesterday was filled with bitter invective, sarcastic insinuations and direct abuse of the prosecution, Wilkerson spoke quietly, suavely, albeit, ironically and contemptuously.

"I would not believe in convicting a dog, much less a human, on the evidence which the state has submitted," Wilkerson declared at one point in his speech. "Their entire case is built on presumption, inference and innuendo and they want you gentlemen to convict Orpet on wild theories, opinions, deductions and guesses, not one of which is susceptible of proof."

"We, on the other hand, have definitely established that there was nothing concerning the death of Marian Lambert in any way inconsistent with the story related by Orpet. And when consideration of the case is undertaken on the basis of undisputed facts, there can be but one answer—Orpet is innocent."

Not to Ask Death Penalty. Wilkerson's closing plea was to be dramatic. State's Attorney Dady announced definitely that the state will not demand the death penalty.

"All we want is a conviction," he declared. The state was ready today in event of Orpet's acquittal on the murder charge to ask several indictments for perjury in connection with the case. One witness, Mrs. Edwin Taylor, at whose home in Madison, Wis., Orpet roomed, has already been summoned before the October grand jury to testify in this connection.

Private Bolton of Third Saves Horses. Coolness and Nerve of Sentry Drives Off Three Horse Thieves Who Had Pressed Pistol to His Stomach.

San Diego, Cal., July 14.—(U. P.)—The coolness and nerve of Henry D. Bolton of Oregon City, a sentry of the Third Oregon Infantry, is responsible for the presence here today of a number of officers' mounts in the corral of one of the troop camps at the border, near this city. The sentry drove off the three horse thieves after they had surprised him with a pistol jammed in his stomach.

The two remaining members of the party unthundered several horses and prepared to lead them away. Watching his assailant, the sentry seized a moment when the man was looking toward his companions with the horses, knocked his gun away and jumped behind a bush, where he hid. The thieves fired with his automatic pistol.

Whether the shot took effect could not be learned, but the three bandits abandoned the horses and made a way through the brush in the darkness.

Lawyers to Board Marblehead Tonight. Legal Rights to "Bought In" With Others While on the Training Cruise on the Pacific.

The Lawyers' Auxiliary to the Oregon Naval Militia will go aboard the cruiser Marblehead tonight with the rest of the Oregon "Jackies." Sunday night will be spent in Astoria harbor and the motion of the ship will be more pronounced than on the peaceful flow of the Willamette. Also the smell of the sea will begin to search out the frill stomachs and give them premonitions of coming troublesome times on the morrow.

The lawyers are going to rough it with the rest, and their duties will include shoveling coal, washing down decks, manning guns, carrying ammunition, and in other ways taking the instructions that the members of the O. N. M. are given.

TRADE RELATIONSHIPS WITH SOUTH AMERICA ARE URGED BY SWEET

Assistant Secretary of Commerce Says "Inside Track" Should Be Gained at Once.

Urging that the United States plan at once to establish trade relations with South America, Edwin F. Sweet, assistant secretary of commerce, today addressed a group of Portland business men at luncheon at the Chamber of Commerce. He declared that the end of the war will find the nations arrayed commercially almost as they are now arrayed belligerently.

"America will trade with all the nations at war," he said. "Russia will align with us, buying goods she formerly looked to Germany for. We will have the field in China. We will have continental Europe."

The much-dreaded competition of "cheap labor" in Europe, Mr. Sweet treated largely as a bugaboo. To disprove the danger he read a long list of articles found by one of the commercial attaches of the department in a little town of Argentina, one of the provinces formerly included in patagonia. In that remote corner of the world, without any special encouragement or trade missionary work, American goods are standard.

"It is foolish to say we cannot trade in South America," he declared. "We can. The range between the worst and the best grades of manufactured articles is very wide. To say we cannot compete with Europe is childish."

He urged, however, that the manufacturing establishments of this country begin now vigorously to establish those relations, so that they will have the "inside track" when the war is over.

W. F. Woodward presided, introducing Mr. Sweet.

HURRICANE SWEEPS SOUTH ATLANTIC LINE; TWO MEN ARE KILLED

Great Damage to Property by Wind and Sea Reported From Charleston.

Savannah, Ga., July 14.—(I. N. S.)—Two men killed and enormous property damage at Charleston resulted from the hurricane which last night and today swept the South Atlantic coast.

Telephone advices from Charleston stated that the entire waterfront was inundated, the 60 mile an hour wind last night piling up great masses of water from the harbor. At 10 o'clock today the wind had dropped somewhat, but was still blowing strong.

Streetcar service was disrupted entirely, the wind playing havoc with poles and wires. Only one telephone wire was in operation this morning, and that only for a brief moment or two.

Savannah and other Georgia points are suffering little.

Collier Hector Damaged. Washington, July 14.—(I. N. S.)—The collier Hector today wirelessly reported that it had been damaged by gales off the coast of South Carolina and was creeping toward Charleston.

Steamer Alamo picked up the Hector's distress signals when 40 miles away and went to her assistance.

Great Heat in Philadelphia. Philadelphia, Pa., July 14.—(I. N. S.)—Five deaths resulted from the heat here today. The thermometer registered only 78, but excessive humidity made conditions almost unbearable. Scores of prostrations were reported from every section, and out of door work was almost at a standstill.

Since July 3, the first day of excessive heat during the present spell, 20 deaths from heat have occurred.

Fishing Party Missing. Augusta, Ga., July 14.—(I. N. S.)—Major Hyde of Charleston and a party of friends, who left on a fishing trip up the coast yesterday, are missing. It is feared have perished in the gales which last night and today swept the south Atlantic coast.

Mrs. A. W. Pettit and a party of friends, who were off the coast in a motor boat, also are missing.

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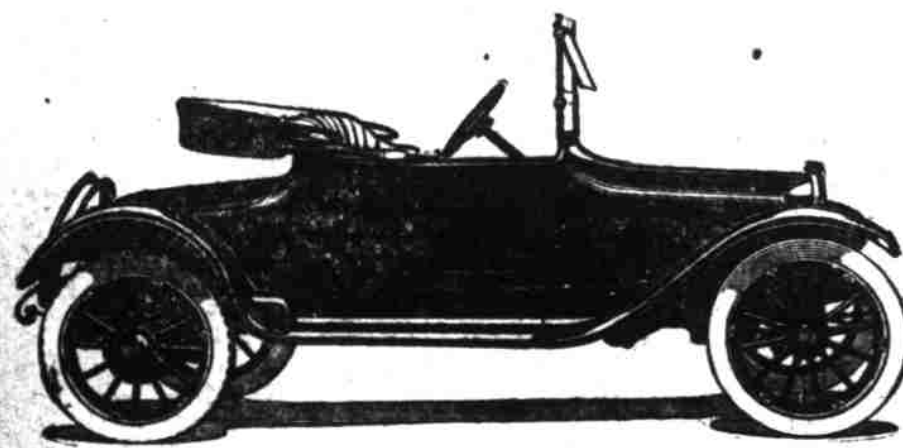
