

PLEAS OF GUILTY ARE MADE IN SUBORNATION AND PERJURY CASES

Edson K. Carr Admits He
Perjured Self in Damage
Case Before Judge McGinn

WOMAN IS YET TO PLEAD

Of Four Involved as Result of Women's Suit Two Pleaded Guilty; Woman's Husband to Plead.

Edson K. Carr pleaded guilty to a charge of perjury and Thomas S. Molesworth to a charge of subornation of perjury today before Judge McGinn. Mrs. Selma Wallace entered a plea of not guilty to a charge of subornation of perjury, and her husband, Clyde E. R. Wallace, will plead to a similar charge tomorrow morning and will immediately go to trial if his plea should be not guilty.

The cases grew out of testimony given by Carr in a suit for damages for personal injuries brought by Mrs. Wallace against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company. The accident occurred about a year ago at Eleventh and Hall streets. Mrs. Wallace fell as she alighted from a car. Carr testified at the trial in September that he saw the accident, and described it. A jury gave Mrs. Wallace a verdict for \$5000.

Later Carr confessed that he had given perjured testimony, as he had not witnessed the accident. Molesworth confessed that by arrangement with the Wallaces he induced Carr to give the perjured testimony.

The Wallaces live on a farm in Washington.

Sentence will not be passed on Carr and Molesworth until the cases against the Wallaces are disposed of.

ARE MUNICIPAL CASES CIVIL

Judge Morrow Suggests Appeals
Should Follow Civil Procedure.

Judge Morrow decided yesterday afternoon that Alden Labau was not a vagrant on February 28, when he was arrested by the police officers and charged with vagrancy. He was convicted in municipal court March 10, sentenced to 60 days in jail, and appealed. He was acquitted, Judge Morrow said, under the doctrine of reasonable doubt.

This case led Judge Morrow to comment on the question of whether municipal court cases are criminal cases. He said the supreme court has intimated that municipal court cases are civil cases, and, if that is true, he asks why they should be tried on appeal in the circuit courts without the litigants having to put up the regular jury fee. In all criminal cases the state pays for the jury; in civil cases the litigants pay a jury fee. Judge Morrow said no ruling has ever been made on the question.

MAN DENIED CLAIM WINNER

Jury Finds Man Hurt; Commission
Turned Him Down.

By appealing to the courts, John Edward Phillips, who was injured while employed by the Eastern & Western Lumber company, upset the decision of the state industrial accident commission in refusing to allow him compensation. A jury in Judge Gantenbein's court yesterday afternoon returned a verdict in favor of Phillips.

In the last two years the commission has decided 11,000 claims for compensation, and only six persons have appealed from the decision of the commission. Four out of the six times the commission was sustained by the courts. The appeal by Phillips is the first one ever to be tried before a jury in this state, as all the other appeals were settled by the court.

Phillips testified that his back was injured January 18 while driving a lumber truck. He worked for 33 days after the injury before he finally had to quit, he said, and then made claim for compensation.

When the claim was presented, physicians appointed to make an examination reported unfavorably on his claim. The commission decided that Phillips had not been injured, and that his trouble was due to rheumatism. His claim was denied.

With a verdict in his favor, Phillips, who has a wife and two children, will

be entitled, under the law, to \$50 a month for the first six months since he ceased work, and \$30 a month as long thereafter as he is disabled.

Commissioner Harvey Beckwith said he was in a quandary as to how to proceed, as it is up to the commission to determine when a man has recovered from an accident and his compensation should be discontinued. His pointed out that a board of physicians named by the commission, and the commission itself, have already decided that Phillips is not disabled as the result of injuries received in an accident, so he would learn how much longer the commission should continue to make payments to him.

Henry S. Westbrook was attorney for Phillips, and Assistant Attorney-General J. A. Benjamin represented the commission.

Bootlegging Case Dropped.

Solely on the ground that Judge McGinn, presiding over the criminal department of the circuit court, will not permit a conviction in a bootlegging case where the evidence has been obtained by "stool-pigeons," Deputy District Attorney Ryan today asked the court to dismiss the case against Henry Swanson. Judge McGinn readily ordered the case dismissed.

In view of the court's announced attitude on this question, it would be useless expense to go to trial, Ryan stated.

Swanson was convicted in municipal court of bootlegging and a fine of \$150 was imposed by Municipal Judge Longworth. Swanson appealed to the circuit court.

Held to Grand Jury.

John C. Dyer, who was returned from San Francisco yesterday afternoon by Deputy Sheriff Beckman, pleaded guilty in district court to a charge of forgery and a charge of larceny by embezzlement. He was bound over to the grand jury on the charge of forgery, Judge Bell holding the other charge until the grand jury acts on the more serious offense.

Dyer pleaded guilty to forging the name of Grace Adams to a check for \$76. The charge of larceny by embezzlement is based on transactions Dyer had with Otto Schulz, whereby Schulz came out loser by about \$26.

Divorces Are Granted.

Two divorces were granted yesterday, as follows: Doris Rhodes Paschal vs. Jack Paschal, married at Los Angeles in 1911, desertion; Hattie Townsend vs. C. A. Townsend, married at Independence, Or., in 1903, one daughter, cruelty; \$75 a month alimony.

Suit for divorce was filed by Susie Buckley against Carl Buckley, married in Newberg in 1910, one daughter, desertion.

Indictments Are Dismissed.

As John Christensen has been banished from the state for seven years, following his conviction for larceny from the Meier & Frank store, two other indictments against him for larceny from stores were dismissed by Judge McGinn yesterday afternoon upon motion of Deputy District Attorney Hindman.

Heavy Penalty Is Imposed.

Three months in jail and a \$250 fine was the sentence given Louis Selk by Judge Bean in federal court this morning. Louis was convicted of having opium in his possession, and his sentence is the first heavy one in the working out of the federal authorities' new policy of imprisonment for opium dealers.

Alleged Squatter Sued.

Civil action against Gust Hansen was instituted yesterday by Assistant Federal Attorney Rankin, acting for the United States on behalf of Sam Williams, an Indian. It is alleged that Hansen is squatting on Williams' homestead near The Dalles.

Meeting Is Called to Aid Battery A Boys

The men were believed to have escaped in an automobile which had been seen waiting for some time about three blocks from the jail.

The police are searching for three women who visited Ashbridge in the jail yesterday afternoon. One carried a package, which is believed to have contained a revolver. They are also thought to have arranged for the automobile.

BELIEVES RAILROADS WILL NOT ATTEMPT TO RESIST RULINGS

Only Recourse Would Be to
Apply for an Injunction,
Says C. W. Fulton.

TO ENHANCE LAND VALUE

Effect of Removing Rate Barrier to Be
Beneficial, Asserts Secretary
of Realty Board.

Since the Interstate Commerce commission announced yesterday its denial of the railroad's petition for a rehearing of the Astoria rate case, no move has been made by any of the carriers to prevent the order going into effect, as directed by the commission, September 15.

Ex-Senator Charles W. Fulton, who was interested for Astoria in the proceedings before the Interstate Commerce commission is convinced that the railroad will not and cannot resist the order.

"Their only recourse," he said "is to apply for an injunction, and they know well that the application would undoubtedly be futile, since the supreme court does not interfere in matters that lie within the discretion of the judgment of the commission."

No New Rate Ordered.

"If, to illustrate, the commission had ordered a new rate that might be so low as to be deemed confiscatory, the court could be prevailed upon to interfere. But in this case no new rate is ordered. The order grants to Astoria parity rates from the inland empire with Puget sound. In my opinion, there is nothing left for the railroad but to put in the parity rate."

In railroad circles the general opinion was that the carriers must decide in a series of conferences as to their traffic arrangements with the S. P. & S. railroad, which operates the only line to the mouth of the river.

Portland Can Act.

There is general agreement with the conclusion that nothing in the Astoria rate decision would deter Portland in seeking a lower rate, based on the fact that this city is 100 miles nearer the interior and is at the head of deep sea navigation.

Senator Fulton, for instance, repeated the opinion expressed by The Journal yesterday, that the portion of the commerce commission's order which speaks of Portland as a member of a Seattle-Tacoma-Portland-Astoria rate group and seeks to discourage Portland from seeking a lower rate has no relation to the fact basis upon which the Astoria rate case proper was decided, and that, therefore, action by Portland petitioning a lower rate will not in any way disturb Astoria's parity with Puget sound.

Satisfaction Is Felt.

Members of the Portland Realty board, the organization which by resolution induced the Portland Chamber of Commerce to express itself affirmatively on the Astoria rate case, express gratification because of the commerce commission's decision not to rehear the case.

"The effect of removing the rate barrier at the mouth of the river should enhance actual realty values in this district 50 per cent within the next three years, granted that times become normal," said Paul A. Cowgill, secretary of the Realty board.

Astoria's jubilation is joined with desire to cooperate with Portland in bringing to the Columbia river its fair share of commerce. A message from J. S. Delaney, president of the Astoria Chamber of Commerce, reads:

New Avenue Opened.

"The decision of the interstate commerce commission impelling the railroad to grant the mouth of the Columbia river parity rates with that of Puget sound opens a new avenue of commerce to the entire northwest. We join with your city in extending our congratulations for this great transportation victory. The freedom of the west inland Empire now extends to the open sea. Let us all work together for a greater industrial development in the northwest."

Italian Red Cross Society Organized

Confederated Societies in Movement—
Bazaar May Be Held October 12—
Will Solicit Funds.

A meeting of delegates from each of the eight Italian benevolent societies of this city was held Sunday for the purpose of devising ways and means of raising funds for the Italian Red Cross, which is now doing all the relief work throughout Italy under the supervision of the Italian government.

An organization to be known as the Confederated Italian Societies' Pro-Italian Red Cross was formed, and the following officers were elected: Albert B. Ferrara, president; Frank C. Pozzi and Mrs. Paul Cordano, vice-presidents; Rev. A. Balestra, secretary; Ciro Caruzzi, assistant secretary; Humbert Cereghini, treasurer.

The societies represented are: Mazzini Mutual Aid society; Cristoforo Colombo Benevolent society; Court Concordia, Foresters of America; Italia Grove No. 2, U. A. O. Druids; Nord Italia Grove No. 16, U. A. O. Druids; Margherita circle, U. A. O. D.; Bersagliere Mutual Aid society; Rivenditori Frutta ed Erbaggi.

A bazaar will be opened, probably Columbus day, October 12. Committees were appointed to solicit funds. Before closing the meeting a large sum was handed to the treasurer by the delegates present.

Mrs. Teetje Ohling, Oregon Pioneer, Dead

Well Known Resident of Linn County
Expires Suddenly, Aged 85—Leaves
Many Children.

Albany, Or., July 18.—Mrs. Teetje Ohling, pioneer resident of Linn county, was found dead in her bed here by her son, Helke Ohling, and grandson, Merrill Ohling. She was 85 years old. She was well and healthy up to the last, attending church Sunday morning. Mrs. Ohling was born in

East Frisian, Germany, December 8, 1830. She came to the States with her parents, settling at Freeport, Ill. On New Year's of 1854 she was married to Paul Ohling. With her husband and children, she moved to Oregon in 1870.

Mr. Ohling died several years ago, but she remained on the farm, superintending the operations up to a few years ago, when she moved to this city, and later resided with her son, R. K. Ohling.

She was a member of the United Presbyterian church. She is survived by one sister, Mrs. Albert Herren of Torrestown, Ill.; four sons, R. K. Ohling, Helke Ohling and Henry Ohling, of this city; Ebert Ohling of Willamette, and one daughter, Mrs. Julia Wallauer, of Portland. She also leaves 15 grandchildren and four great-grandchildren. The funeral services will be held Wednesday afternoon at the United Presbyterian church. Her four sons will be pallbearers.

CITY FOOTS BILL FOR MAN WHOSE WORK IS MOSTLY FOR COUNTY

It is said that a serious effort is to be made to have him returned and let the county employ its own man for the work.
