

"WASTE PAPER DAY" IS SET FOR TUESDAY BY THOSE IN CHARGE

Chance to Make Spending Money, Prevent Fires and Save Paper Is Provided.

HIGH PRICE IS PROMISED

Each of 40 Fire Stations Will Receive and Pay for Paper at Rate of \$7 Per Ton; \$8000 Provided.

Under the auspices of the fire prevention bureau of the Portland fire department, the Chamber of Commerce and the Women's Cooperative committee, next Tuesday has been designated as "waste paper day," when paper that ordinarily is burned as refuse will be gathered up and sold.

Jacob Kansler, secretary of the civic bureau of the chamber, today sent out letters to 400 addresses, representing the various public organizations—parent-teacher associations, women's clubs, fraternal and civic bodies—urging their cooperation. Arrangements have been made with a waste paper concern whereby \$7 per ton will be paid for paper, including old books, newspapers and magazines. This price is far in excess of normal prices caused by the general shortage in paper.

Each of the 40 fire stations will be headquarters for the sale of waste paper. Five Chief Bowls will be given \$2000 to expend and this will be distributed among the fire stations. The purchasing and weighing will be done by the firemen.

Two objects are to be accomplished by the one day campaign: First, from a fire preventive point of view, to rid the city of accumulations of inflammable material; second, from the general economic viewpoint, to turn waste into cash.

In addition, the accumulation of spending money by the boys and girls, who are expected to participate, will be a big feature.

In the circular announcing the paper day, Secretary Kansler and Fire Marshal Stevens say:

"Waste paper worth thousands of dollars is burned annually in Portland. Next Tuesday, let's call the 'first half' on this needless waste—take the money instead and:

(1) Start that savings account, or (2) Help the vacation camp fund for girls, or (3) Help the Boy Scout movement, or (4) Aid the philanthropic work of your church or club, etc.

"The paper in 20-pound bundles and

deliver to the captain of your nearest fire station.

"Please tell the boys and girls in your neighborhood of this opportunity to make a little 'pin money' and incidentally help the cause of 'fire prevention.'"

Mrs. G. J. Frankel, Mrs. Isaac Sweet, Mrs. R. D. Imman, Mrs. Lee Arnett and Mrs. John Toft, composing the women's cooperative committee, are supporting the campaign for the benefit of the city of girls who hope by the money they receive from gathering paper from attics and basements to earn their way to a summer camp at Sunset Beach.

It is pointed out that the Boy Scout movement will be helped, prospective Scouts being able to earn the money for their uniforms by the sale of paper.

Oakland, Cal., recently had a waste paper day. The price the children received there was but \$3.50 per ton. Since then, however, the price has advanced.

Two Boy Scouts on Hike of 120 Miles

Wasco, Or., July 19.—Lynde Smith and Clarence Yokum of Troop No. 1, boy scouts of Wasco, left here last night at midnight on a trial endurance hike to Portland, a distance of 120 miles. They expect to cover the distance by midnight Friday, averaging 50 miles for each 24 hours.

Stolen Horse Found.

Wasco, Or., July 20.—A horse stolen from the barn of Joe Miller, residing at the mouth of the Deschutes in Sherman county, on the night of July 8, was found in a pasture south of Moro yesterday by Sheriff J. C. McKean. A saddle, bridle and harness stolen with the animal were found in a wheat field nearby where they had been caught by the thief. No clue was found which could lead to the identification of the thief.

Wheat Shows Up Well.

Wasco, Or., July 20.—At this date indications are that the wheat crop in Sherman county will be greater according to acreage harvested than for the past eight years. Weeds in some places have materially reduced the yield. The cool weather has delayed the harvest season nearly 30 days.

Murder Suspect to Be Detained Here

Bennett Thompson, indicted by the Washington county grand jury for the murder of Mrs. Helen Jennings and Fred Ristman on May 15 near Tualatin, will be brought to Portland today by Sheriff Reeves of Washington county to be confined in the Multnomah county jail until the day of his trial, which has been set for September 8.

COMMISSION ASKED TO DELAY TIME IN THE SPOKANE CASE

Committee of Railroad Officials Have Submitted the Request, It Is Said.

SEPT. 1 WAS DATE SET

W. D. Skinner, Traffic Manager of North Bank, Receives Telegram From Washington Today.

W. D. Skinner, traffic manager of the North Bank road, received a telegram from Washington this afternoon to the effect that a committee of railroad officials had presented a plea to the interstate commerce commission to hold off for a time the effective date of the Spokane rate decision.

The committee represents all the transcontinental railroads affected by the decree. It is understood that the argument presented was that the commission make allowance for merchandise ordered under prevailing rates but on which delivery cannot be made until after the rates go into effect. This situation would mean heavy losses to consignees if goods are not purchased under delivery contract, or to the consignors if they are bought under delivery contract.

Unless the commission postpones the effective date, the new rate arrangement must go into effect September 1.

Liquor Shipments Delivered Too Soon

Roseburg Man Fined \$10 Because He Received Wet Goods Within 28 Days of Previous Shipment.

Roseburg, Or., July 20.—E. Brinkman of Wilbur, on Tuesday, was arraigned in the justice court here on a charge of having received more than the legal allowance of liquor. He entered a plea of guilty and was fined \$10 and costs.

County Will Appeal Case.

Roseburg, Or., July 20.—District Attorney George Neuner today received notice from Circuit Judge Skipworth of Eugene that a new trial had been denied in the case of R. M. Buttle against Douglas county for personal injury damages. Buttle recently obtained a judgment against the county for \$1200 damages. The district attorney announced today that the case would be appealed to the state supreme court.

Suicide's Dog Joins Master as Latter Requested in Note

"Toodles," the inseparable dog companion of Walter Vivian, ex-Portland fireman, who committed suicide last Monday night, has gone to join his master. The dog was chloroformed and his body placed in his master's lap in the burial casket today. Both are to be cremated this afternoon in accordance with a last request made by Vivian in a note found after his death. Funeral services are to be held from Knapp's undertaking parlors in Vancouver, Wash., and later at the Portland Crematorium.

New Building Is Planned at Ashland

Southern Oregon Chautauqua Association Hopes to Make Extensive Improvements.

Ashland, Or., July 20.—G. F. Billings, who for 22 years has been president of the Southern Oregon Chautauqua association, was superseded by C. W. Root at the election held at the close of the twenty-fourth annual assembly Tuesday. Mr. Billings was elected president emeritus and was paid a high tribute at the closing exercises. J. S. Smith was elected vice president, G. W. Eubanks treasurer, and the following directors: E. E. Bagley, E. D. Briggs, G. W. Trefern, H. L. Whitely and W. A. Patrick. A movement for a new building which will seat several thousand and cost in the neighborhood of \$15,000 has been instigated.
