CORONER'S JURY SAYS BRAKEMAN TO BLAME FOR DEATH OF YOUTH

O-W. R. & N. Employee Held to Have Kicked Lad Killed at Milton, Or., Off Train.

Freewater, Or., July 21.—That the deceased came to his death by falling from a car on the track of the O-W. R. & N. at Milton on July 19 and that said fall was caused by a kick from brakeman James McMahon, was the verdict of a coroner's jury returned last night in the inquest over the body of the unknown boy of 19 killed at Milton yesterday.

Brakeman McMahon testified that the man's foot was fast in the safety chain and that he sprang up on the blind baggage to assist him, but the testimony of the dead man's companions, to the effect that he was kicked off the train, was accepted by the jury.

Coroner Brown stated today that he believes the body to be that of Weston Milton, of Benton county, Oregon.

PROPOSED MERGER OF COLLEGE DISCUSSED BEHIND CLOSED DOORS

Synod Finally Refers Question to Committee of 5 Ministers and 4 Elders.

University of Oregon, Eugene, Or., July 21.—After ordering the representatives of the Congregational church from the hall, the Presbyterian synod of Oregon spent Thursday's session behind closed doors fighting out the proposed merger of Albany college and Pacific university.

The matter was finally referred to a committee of five ministers and four elders which may report to the present session.

Albany college will open as usual in the fall according to Rev. Carl H. Elliot of Salem, chairman of the college.

The synod voted to ask the national committee on aid for colleges to contribute \$200 towards paying some of the back salaries, said Mr. Elliot. "This will not cover the deficit. How to meet the balance was not decided on."

Before the synod went into secret session, Dr. Luther R. Dyott, pastor of the First Congregational church of Portland, trustee of the university, urged that all of the Willamette valley denominational colleges combine in one institution at Eugene.

Dr. W. H. Bleakney of Walla Walla and Dr. Edward M. Sharp of Albany were elected trustees of the San Francisco theological seminary.

Yesterday's registration showed 103 ministers and 16 elders in attendance as compared with 82 ministers and 17 elders last year.

Fifty Mile Event Brings All Fast Cars Into Competition.

Alumni and under-graduates most prominent in the sport gathered in response to a call to consider the advisability of abolishing the sport or resigning from membership in their inter-collegiate rowing association, in which its associates are Cornell, and Pennsylvania.

It was decided unanimously that Columbia was not only to continue to support rowing but that the sport was to be put on a much firmer basis. The control of rowing will be taken away from the Columbia rowing association and will be centered in the athletic association which controls athletic finances.
