

DIVORCED PAIR CAUSE MANY LAUGHS WHEN APPEARING IN COURT

Alimony Tangle Settled by Order to Ex-Husband to Make Final \$50 Payment.

EX-WIFE HAS NEW MATE

Latest Wedding, However, Didn't Take Because of Divorce Time Limit, So She Awaits Complete Freedom.

The court, the attorneys and the spectators were convulsed with laughter when Mrs. S. S. Sutton was in court to protest against the demands of her divorced husband, Patrick Sutton, that he be relieved of paying alimony.

The hearing was before Judge Gaten, who granted Mrs. Sutton a divorce May 22 and allowed her \$40 a month alimony. Subsequently, Mrs. Sutton and Jack Burman, a former lover, went to Vancouver and were married. Then Mrs. Sutton learned that the marriage was not legal, as the statutory six months had not expired, so she left Burman to await the legal time, when they intend to be remarried.

"Now, why can't you and Mr. Sutton make up and be remarried?" asked Judge Gaten.

"I'd rather be at the bottom of the sea," replied Mrs. Sutton.

"Wasn't he affectionate to you?" continued the court.

"Once I got out of his lap," she replied, "and he threw me out. He said I was too old to get kiltish. He is the first freshman I ever saw who was not a loving man."

"She is the mother of nine children by former marriages."

"After I was divorced from Mr. Sutton," she explained to the court, "Mr. Burman came out to see me. I saw him coming into the yard and went to meet him."

"Jack, is that you?" I said.

"Yes, Sadie, it is me," he replied.

"I want to tell you how I am now. He is the kind of a man to take care of me when I get old."

Judge Gaten modified the divorce decree to provide that Sutton should pay Mrs. Sutton \$50 which would end his alimony payments.

SESSION ENLIVENED BY TILT

Litigation Over Attorneys' Fees Calls Forth Exchange.

A sharp tilt between Dan J. Malarky, representing Attorney J. H. Winkler, Sidney J. Graham and C. M. Idelman, and G. L. MacGibbon, former counsel of the defunct American Bank & Trust company, was continued this morning over the question of the reasonableness of the fee claimed by the three attorneys for work performed for the bank.

MacGibbon asked that Graham be placed on the witness stand for cross-examination by him. Malarky objected, declaring that MacGibbon was a man who wrecked the bank and should have no right to conduct a cross-examination of the witness.

Malarky recalled the testimony of Justice McBride of the supreme court, who was called several days ago to give his opinion as to the reasonableness of the fee in question. Justice McBride declared that the bank "had fallen into the hands of a band of robbers." He said it was not a bank, but a false token.

MacGibbon resented the imputations cast by Malarky, but he did not proceed with the cross-examination of the witness.

Former Attorney-General Crawford called as a witness for the depositors who were losing the claim of the three attorneys.

The case, which has been before Judge Kavanaugh for many weeks, was continued until another date yet to be fixed.

VERDICT GIVEN DEFENDANTS

Jury Finds That Misrepresentations Were Not Made in Deal.

Allegations of conspiracy to defraud Sarah L. Salisbury and E. P. Salisbury in a real estate deal were not proven against John Bruce Goddard and A. W. Ehrlich, according to a verdict of a jury in Judge Gantenbein's court, returned today in favor of the defendants.

The plaintiffs traded an eight room house and lot in Salem for the furniture in the Hotel Bushmark, 555 1/2 Washington. The plaintiffs alleged that the defendants misrepresented the value of the property. The plaintiffs sued to recover \$2500.

This was the second trial of the case. The first trial resulted in a verdict for the plaintiffs. The former verdict was appealed to the supreme court, which set it aside and remanded the case for a retrial on the ground that the trial court had erred in limiting the number of expert witnesses that might be called.

Divorce was granted to Jennie Branger from James Branger on the grounds of cruelty and desertion. They were married in Scotland in 1912 and have one child.

Harrison Is Bound Over to Grand Jury

Involuntary Manslaughter Charge Made in Case—Alleged Victim Died From Burns Caused by Gasoline Massage.

George L. Harrison, who was arrested in connection with the death of John Old Lindblom, was bound over to the grand jury by Municipal Judge Langguth this morning on a charge of involuntary manslaughter. His bail was fixed at \$2500.

Lindblom died Wednesday night at Emmanuel hospital from burns received a week before while he was being massaged with gasoline. The accident occurred in a sanitarium conducted by Dr. Meelen at Twelfth and Alder streets.

Coroner F. H. Dammasch was the only witness for the state. He said Lindblom died from the shock of his injuries. Harrison testified in his own behalf.

MORE THAN 50,000 IN SAN FRANCISCO TAKE PART IN BIG PARADE

Preparedness Advocated in Spectacle That Gives Bay Cities a New Thrill.

San Francisco, July 22.—(U. P.)—Each carrying an American flag, more than 50,000 residents of San Francisco, Oakland and the city and the bay region marched here this afternoon in the greatest demonstration in support of a national movement that has been gathering momentum.

Flames Cover Wide Area of Eminence Near San Francisco; Fire Fighters Are Rushed on Special Train.

Sausalito, Cal., July 22.—(P. N. S.)—Mount Tamalpais is affire. A widening area a quarter of a mile above West Point, on the western slope of the mountain, spreading fast in the direction of the Forest Springs trail.

Mill valley residents are exerting every effort to prevent a recurrence of the disastrous fire of August, 1913, rushed 100 fire fighters to the scene shortly before 1 o'clock.

The blaze started this forenoon and after burning an hour, jumped one of the wide fire trails which had been cut above West Point as a precaution against dangerous fires.

At San Rafael a dense column of smoke rising from the mountain side is visible.

The flames can be seen clearly from the Tamalpais tavern.

This is the first serious fire on the mountain since the blaze three years ago, which swept the entire slope, menacing Mill Valley and surrounding towns.

deduced from \$20,000,000 to \$16,000,000. The appropriation of \$2,000,000 for a 1 per cent. increase in the pay of officers was reduced to \$500,000.

The appropriation of \$6,000,000 for enlisted regulars and militiamen was reduced to \$1,000,000.

Japanese Peril Cited.

In submitting the army appropriation bill to the senate yesterday Chairman Chamberlain emphasized the Japanese peril on the Pacific coast.

The moment the naval bill was passed, the army bill was called up. Senator La Follette indicated that he would attempt to reduce its provisions for Japan as he fought unsuccessfully to cut down the naval program.

Senator Chamberlain said: "It is because the people of the Pacific coast realize the seriousness of this situation that they are clamoring for better national protection. Japan has more veterans, more men who have been trained as soldiers on the Pacific coast, than we have in our regular army."

Will Not Move Out.

Senator Chamberlain said that unless the means is found to stop immigration from the Orient the American population would be crowded out. The people of the Pacific coast do not intend to be crowded out, he declared, "would rather stay here and fight for their rights and be wiped out than give up that which belongs to them."

It was agreed to hold this measure exclusively before the senate until it came to a vote. It is expected to pass.

Chevalier Brenna is a member of an old patriarchal family.

He is also known as one of the most active and efficient members of the Italian diplomatic service. He will return to Seattle Monday.

Orchardists May Use Coke.

Medford, Ore., July 22.—A quail of coke is being made from coal taken from the Sunnyside coal deposits in this vicinity that is said to be the best, and most economical heat and fuel for orchards in prevention of frost damage so far developed in this region. It is cheaper than oil or wood and may be used with much less expense and greater safety. An ordinary snudge-pot full of this coke will burn for six hours at a cost of 1/4 cent per pot. It emits no smoke. No cinchona are left. It is easily handled. An inexhaustible quantity of Sunnyside coal of this quality is in sight.

Apology Deemed Insufficient; Judge Waiting to Hear Accused's Side of the Story.

An apology from James F. Cassidy, head of the mothers' pension department of the juvenile court, for his alleged insults to Mrs. B. Barry, a dependent widow with four children and an aged mother to support at 1804 Smith avenue, St. Johns, will not be sufficient to appease the wrath of members of the Oregon Congress of Mothers.

Reports of Cassidy's alleged brutal and uncouth methods have been reaching the mothers' congress for a long time and the incident with Mrs. Barry which occurred last Monday, was the final straw that decided Mrs. George McMath, president of the Oregon Congress of Mothers, to make demand for Cassidy's removal.

"Apology Not Enough."

"An apology will not be sufficient for insulting a good woman," declared Mrs. McMath. "And to threaten a helpless woman with a lawsuit, as Mrs. Barry is a cowardly business, to say the least."

Mrs. Barry is receiving a mother's pension of \$10 a week from the juvenile court. Cassidy called on her last Monday and Cassidy asked her if she did not have property in the east. It is claimed. Then he asked her if she did not have property at St. Johns. Cassidy's answer was given to both questions.

Statement Is Resented.

Cassidy then told her a lot of complaints were being made against her men, it is alleged. Mrs. Barry quickly resented such an imputation and shaking her hands at Cassidy declared he should not make such statements about her.

Thinking of the label of his coat Cassidy is said to have tapped his police star and told Mrs. Barry to look out or he would send her up stairs, meaning to the county jail.

He then told her that Mrs. McMath had reported that she was neglecting her children. This about drove the woman frantic as she was the point of a hysterical breakdown.

Cassidy is declared to have twisted Mrs. McMath's solicitation for the removal of the woman into an accusation of adultery and then flung the statement at her.

The loud talk by Cassidy and the pleadings from the woman created such a commotion in the department that Mrs. McGuire, Cassidy's assistant, called in another woman in the department, as she was afraid to stay alone, according to her statements to others. One of the probation officers also opened the door to see what was the matter.

Removal Is Demanded.

"We have nothing to say about Mr. Cassidy personally," said Mrs. McMath, "but he is not a fit person to be at the head of a mothers' pension department. Someone should be at the head of the department who can help and assist the dependent mothers and not terrorize them."

"Mrs. Barry told me that one time when she called for her pension she was told to look out for herself. She has been given to her mother, and the coat looked rather nice, and Cassidy demanded to know where she got it. She said she had given it to him. He man be treated in this manner."

Mrs. McMath has made demand on Judge Cleeton to remove Cassidy. She is preparing to take the matter up with the executive committee of the Oregon Congress of Mothers next Friday. If necessary, she said she would carry the matter to every woman's and civic organization in Portland.

Cassidy is away on his vacation and Judge Cleeton said he would await to hear of his return before deciding what action, if any, he might take.

London, July 22.—The Astor family is forging another link with England by the forthcoming marriage of Captain Jacob Astor to Lady Charles Mercer Nairne. His only sister married an Englishman, Captain Spender Clay, M. P., but his brother, Walter Astor, M. P., married an American woman, like all the other Astors.

Captain Astor, who wears the French Legion of Honor and is an officer of the Life Guards, became an Englishman when his father, now Lord Astor of Hever, took his naturalization papers 12 years ago.

Captain Astor's marriage will bring him into relationship with Lord Lansdowne, for Lady Charles is the widow of that statesman's second son and one of those who have given their lives for their country. She is a sister of a Scots Guardsman, Lord Minto, as well as of the future Countess of Cromer.
