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AMERICAN PROTECTS HER TRADE BLACKLIST

President Said Personally to Have Compiled the Protest Which Was Cabled Today.

Washington, July 27.—(U. P.)—America's protest against Great Britain's boycott of American firms has already been cabled to London and probably is now in Ambassador Page's hands.

Acting Secretary of State Polk announced today that President Wilson last night approved the message of protest, which was immediately coded and put on the wire.

It is understood that President Wilson personally compiled the protest, which will be made public Monday morning.

It was believed the protest insists that the boycott is in direct violation of trade treaties existing between the United States and Great Britain, and characterizes it as an unwarranted interference with the domestic affairs of the United States.

Interference with American business, when that business is confined almost exclusively to neutrals, cannot be permitted by the United States, it is declared in the protest.

RIVERS AND HARBORS BILL HAS SIGNATURE OF PRESIDENT WILSON

Belgian Frontier Closed

London, July 27.—(U. P.)—Germany has sealed the Belgian frontier, according to dispatches from Amsterdam. She is pouring great masses of troops into the west and the frontier has been closed as a precaution against any of their movements becoming known.

"The German army is excited, realizing that the crucial stage of the war has arrived," says a Central News Telegram from Holland. "Belgians are not allowed to leave their homes while the great troop movements are in progress."
