

OVER 200 MOTORISTS ARE ASSURED FOR BIG TOUR TO THE BEACHES

At Least 40 Automobiles Will Take Part in Auto Dealers' Trip.

BIG TIMES ARE PLANNED

Machines Will Leave Portland Tomorrow as Fanny Dictates, Reaching Astoria at Least by 8 o'clock P. M.

More than 200 motorists are assured for the "Honk Honk" tour which starts tomorrow for Seaside, when Portland automobile dealers will charter a squad of at least 40 automobiles over the roads to Astoria and the beaches.

President Hurd of the dealers' association left this morning in his White to post the road to Astoria. He has in his car a supply of big painted arrows which can be seen from a distance. These he will place at all troublesome spots where the motorists have been losing their bearings.

The inland road to the coast is traveled for the most part and from Mist is said to be in excellent shape. This route is considerably longer than the Columbia river highway, but many will follow it.

A. S. Robinson, chairman of the tour committee, and C. M. Menzies, another member, will leave tomorrow morning to post the Columbia river highway.

Route Will Be Marked.
The route around Houlton and St. Helens will be well posted so that following the arrows will eliminate chance of losing the road. A short detour takes one around the new road work.

Astoria is making extensive preparation for the visit of the automobile people and with the big day at Astoria and the features at Seaside and Gearhart, the auto owners of the two cities expect to have a full program.

At the committee meeting of the dealers yesterday noon the official "Honk Honk" hats were adopted and any detouring them should get in touch with Chairman Robinson of the Klatskanie.

Venue will be out-vented in the bathing girl parade of Sunday afternoon. Girls of Portland and Seaside who live by the sea are priming themselves for the display and many new creations in bathing suits are expected to startle the on-lookers.

Dinner Will End Fun.
Sunday morning the travelers will breakfast at Cannon Beach at 8 p. m. and if the tide permits will run around Hug Point and down to Arch Cape.

The finale will be a big dinner at the Hotel Moore on Sunday night. All morning additional cars have been signed to go on the tour and without exception it will be the biggest party which ever has visited Seaside.

The itinerary of the party is as follows: Leave Portland any time. Be at the Waldard-Astoria at 8 p. m. Dance in the open at Astoria 9 p. m. Breakfast at Warrens, Cannon Beach, 8:30 a. m. Sunday. Lunch at Seaside. Bathing suit parade 1:30. Race at Gearhart 2:30. Dinner at Hotel Moore 7 p. m.

NORTH BEND NOW PLANS TO RECEIVE EXCURSION GUESTS

North Bend, Or., July 23.—The first day's celebration of the Coos Bay railroad jubilee is to be in North Bend, and the various committees of citizens have made tentative plans for the entertainment which will provide for the visitors. L. J. Simpson will be master of ceremonies, and leading men of the city have been appointed to look after the details of the different features.

On the evening of August 23, the night before the opening of the jubilee, the Marshfield band will give a preliminary concert at North Bend. The jubilee will open with dedication exercises at Simpson Park, when the property will be formally turned over to the city by the Simpson Lumber company and the deeds transferred.

There will also be exercises to formally open the railroad. This will be about all the formal exercises that will be held in connection with the three days' celebration.

The special trains from Eugene are expected to arrive at 12:30 p. m. and, according to reports received now, 500 persons will come on the trains from Lane county. There will be a big civic parade, and this will take place at 2 o'clock in the afternoon, so the Eugene party can take part. Following the parade there will be water sports in the bay, and at night there will be dances and music and the whole city will be brilliantly lighted.

The North Bend people are doing everything possible to make provisions for the visitors. It is planned to erect whole camps of tents to provide sleeping quarters in addition to what will be afforded in private houses and hotels.

GET-TOGETHER SESSION OF COMMERCIAL MEN AT ASHLAND SUCCESS

Two Hundred Gather and Discuss Building of Auditorium and Other Questions

Ashland, Or., July 23.—Two hundred business men of Ashland gathered at the Hotel Austin Tuesday night and joined in one of the best get-together meetings held in Ashland in recent years. The new management of the hotel which recently passed into the hands of A. Austin Chisholm, served a banquet. Plans for an immense "bonfire" celebration to be held in September were discussed. A new Chautauqua auditorium, one which would seat 6000 people and be an asset in getting conventions to come to Ashland, was described as one of the things which Ashland must and will get before next July. An automobile road to Lake of the Woods and eventually through to Crater Lake was reported to be receiving substantial endorsement by citizens who are circulating subscription lists.

An automobile road within four miles of the summit of Mount Ashland and the erection of a log cabin hotel and installation of means for taking tourists to the top on horseback were stated to be assured within the next two years by outside capital. Enthusiastic approval of the various projects was evidenced and committees appointed to take hold of several other matters.

DEATHS IN NORTHWEST

Mrs. Osborne, Walls Walla.

Walla Walla, Wash., July 23.—Mrs. Louisa Osborne, aged 80 years, a pioneer resident of the valley, who came to Walla Walla in 1875, died here Wednesday afternoon. Funeral services were held Thursday.

Sanford Bramlett, Walls Walla.

Walla Walla, Wash., July 23.—Sanford Bramlett, one of the early pioneers of the Walla Walla valley, died Wednesday in Lapwai, Idaho, at the age of 88 years. Funeral services were held in Lapwai, and the body was taken to Walla Walla for burial.

M. M. Gilbert, Goshen.

Albany, Or., July 23.—A member of the faculty of the Albany public schools was lost Monday at Goshen, eight miles south of Eugene, in the death of Professor M. M. Gilbert, former principal of the old Central school and assistant principal of the new Junior high school. He was about 40 years old. A wife and five children survive him. Tuberculosis was the cause of death.

Thomas Smith, Lebanon.

Lebanon, Or., July 23.—Thomas Smith, well known native of Linn county, who died in this city Monday, after being stricken with heart failure at the Bonney Lumber company plant, where he was employed, was buried Wednesday in the Masonic cemetery near Lebanon.

W. R. Wilson, Freewater.

Freewater, Or., July 23.—W. R. Wilson, fruit rancher, died Wednesday evening at his home on Winesap avenue, a short distance from Freewater, from diabetes. Mr. Wilson was 48 years of age and was born in Oregon. He is survived by his wife and several children. The funeral services were held Thursday. Rev. J. A. Lord of the Milton Christian church officiating. Interment will be in the old city cemetery at Milton.

Lebanon Bridge Open.

Lebanon, Or., July 23.—The new steel wagon bridge over the Santiam river at this place was opened for travel Tuesday. The county court will inspect the work in a few days, preparatory to officially accepting the structure. The new bridge takes the place of a wooden bridge that has been in use over 40 years.

New Officers in Charge.

Centralia, Wash., July 23.—Captain G. B. Hoek and wife arrived here today to succeed Captain Mary Elliott as commander of the local corps of the Salvation Army. Captain and Mrs. Hoek have been taking instruction in the Army's Chicago training school for the past six months.

Gasoline Schooner Safe.

Marshfield, Or., July 23.—Reports received here state that the gasoline schooner Reamer, which was reported in trouble at Rogue river Wednesday, is safe. When entering the river her engine stopped and she drifted to shallow water and grounded but no damage was done and the boat is now at the dock in Wedderburn.
