Headquarters in Portland Hotel and

Where Headquarters Are.
Registration headquarters for the various Pythian members who are now assembling in Portland to remain in days have been located as follows:
For supreme representatives, Supreme Lodge Knights of Pythias in the lobby of the Hotel Portland.
For supreme representatives, Supreme Temple Pythian Sisters, in the Elizabethan room of the Imperial Hotel.
For all Pythian visitors and subordinate lodge members, in the lobby at the Hotel Oregon.

The general committee in charge of the meeting of the Supreme Lodge Knights of Pythias and Supreme Temple of Pythian Sisters, and the Grand Lodge of Oregon, last night announced plans as affecting the pleasures and entertainment of visitors in Portland during the time these organizations will remain as guests of the city.

Cards of admission to all the entertainments which have been provided for all of next week, badges, programs and detailed information at the time their names are registered are at any one of the booths which have been located among the hotels of the city.

The registration booth at the Hotel Oregon opened yesterday morning and large numbers of "privates" in the ranks of the great Pythian fraternity and entertainment of visitors in Portland during the time these organizations will remain as guests of the city.

Members of the supreme lodge will register tomorrow at the Hotel Portland. The envelopes which will be handed them will contain a card of equipment from that given the subordinate lodge members. They will contain a handsome medal and ribbon badge as well as complimentary tickets for all excursions, banquets, dinners, etc.

Members of the Supreme Temple, Pythian Sisters, will be equipped in a similar manner on registering at the Hotel Imperial. The registration at temple headquarters will be assisted by a large reception committee of Portland and Oregon women. They are:

Remainder of the morning in their respective halls and at 2 o'clock a big street parade will be participated in by all the visitors. Automobiles have been provided for this, a great many Portlanders who are not members of the order offering the use of their automobiles.

Auto and River Trips.
Wednesday morning will see the start of a journey over the Columbia river highway, the steamer Bailey Gatzert having been chartered for those who prefer the river to the highway trip. At 130 the automobiles and boatists will assemble at Bonaville for an afternoon feast, the party returning in time to witness the night parade of the Dramatic Order, Knights of Khorassan, an auxiliary of the Pythians. This will be followed by a ceremonial at the Armory and a banquet at midnight, open only to the Khorassan Knights.

From that time on the sessions of the lodge will be supplemented by drills at Multnomah field, tennis and theatre parties, luncheons and automobile trips. Next Saturday an excursion to Seaside is planned, with luncheon at Astoria, followed by bathing in the ocean and a clam-bake at 6 o'clock on the beach.

Big Attendance Promised.
Estimates yesterday indicated that the attendance would nearly equal the original estimate, which was between 8000 and 10,000. Besides the regular sessions of the lodges, a number of auxiliary organizations will hold their conferences, the Pythians now having a great many of these including an insurance branch, a society of keepers of records and seals and a dramatic order.

Five Bands to Play In Pythians' Parade

Portland's Welcome to Thousands of
Visitors to Be Accentuated by Musicians From Oregon Towns.

Five Oregon bands will participate in the great fraternal parade which is to move at 2:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. They will consist of two uniformed rank bands, the Wallawa County band, Albany band, Dallas band and Hubbard band.

Nine special trains are expected to arrive in Portland Tuesday morning bearing Knights of Pythias from Washington, Idaho and all parts of Oregon for participation in the parade. One is coming from Coos County with 400 Knights aboard; one from southern Oregon and Albany; one from eastern Oregon; one from Bend; one from Astoria; one from Pasco; one from Aberdeen; and one from Seattle.

Many of these Knights will be in special uniform, which will add color and interest to the parade, which will cover all of the downtown sections of the city following the line of street decorations.

The parade will be headed by 400 members of the uniformed rank. The next division will contain members of the Supreme Lodge, Knights of Pythias, and the Supreme Temple, in automobiles. The third division will be for uniformed lodges from different parts of the northwest and headed by Ivanhoe Lodge No. 1 of Portland. The next division will be for unattached Knights. The last division will contain floats and special features.

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UNIFORMED PYTHIANS TO CAMP IN THE CITY PARK AT VANCOUVER

Tents Are Pitched for Bivouac
of Plumed Knights Across
Columbia.

Tents were yesterday being erected in the city park at Vancouver, where the camp of the uniformed rank Knights of Pythias will be pitched during the convention of the supreme lodge.

Visitors to the camp will be welcome each afternoon and evening. Vancouver citizens are arranging a special program of entertainment for the semi-military organization which will be the guest of their city, and for visitors. It is expected that from 400 to 600 uniformed knights will be in camp.

On Thursday afternoon at Multnomah field a test will be held between the drill teams of uniformed rank companies of Oregon and Washington. The first prize is \$500 in gold. The drill teams of the various companies have been training for this event for several months and it is expected that a fine exhibition will be given. Seats in the grandstand will be free to the public. The judges of the competition will be from the regular army barracks of Vancouver.

The uniformed rank of the Knights of Pythias is one of the reserve military organizations of the United States and would be able to furnish a division of fully 50,000 trained men within a week from the time a call should be made by the president of the United States.

It was in recognition of the efficiency of this corps of drilled men that congress granted the Knights of Pythias a charter authorizing the existence of the fraternity in this country. It is the only organization possessing such a charter.

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OREGON GRAND LODGE OF PYTHIANS TO RUSH SESSIONS TO AN END

Pythians of the Grand Lodge of Oregon will open their state convention at the castle hall of Ivanhoe lodge Tuesday morning. The sessions will be hurried along, so that the supreme gathering will not be too far advanced for the state Pythians to enjoy, but the two days of session are crammed full. Grand Chancellor Willard L. Marks, of Albany, who will preside, already has a full complement of committees at work, not waiting for the opening day. This will leave the grand lodge sessions free for the more important business.

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VETERAN PYTHIAN OF PORTLAND TO ATTEND BIG CONVENTION HERE

Louis Lachmann Organized
First Pythian Lodge in the
State of Oregon.

One of the "figures" at the sessions of the supreme lodge, Knights of Pythias, will be Louis Lachmann of Portland, organizer of the first Pythian lodge in the state and first chancellor commander of Excelsior lodge No. 1.

Mr. Lachmann was born in Germany in 1846. He came to New York in 1864, but did not remain long. Instead, he went to San Francisco and attended school, where he graduated into a minor clerkship. This life was too prosaic for Lachmann and he sought the mines, but found no fortune. Returning to San Francisco, he got a job as drummer for a jinking house. In 1869 he joined Excelsior lodge No. 12, Knights of Pythias at San Francisco.

Mr. Lachmann came to Portland in 1872. He asserts that it was the impulse of Pythianism that gave him the ambition and determination that brought about his marriage in 1870 and impelled him to launch into business for himself.

He found five other Pythians here, but no lodge. So he gathered these five, found a few other willing would-be fraternalists and organized a lodge of his own, affiliating with the grand lodge of California.

Pythianism is the only other survivor of the original Pythian organization now in Portland.

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
