JENKS' TRANSFER CAUSE

Acting General Manager of Great

The changes were made by General Superintendent Davidson, who has been operating head of the North Bank system since General Manager C. O. Jenks was made acting general manager of the Great Northern system.

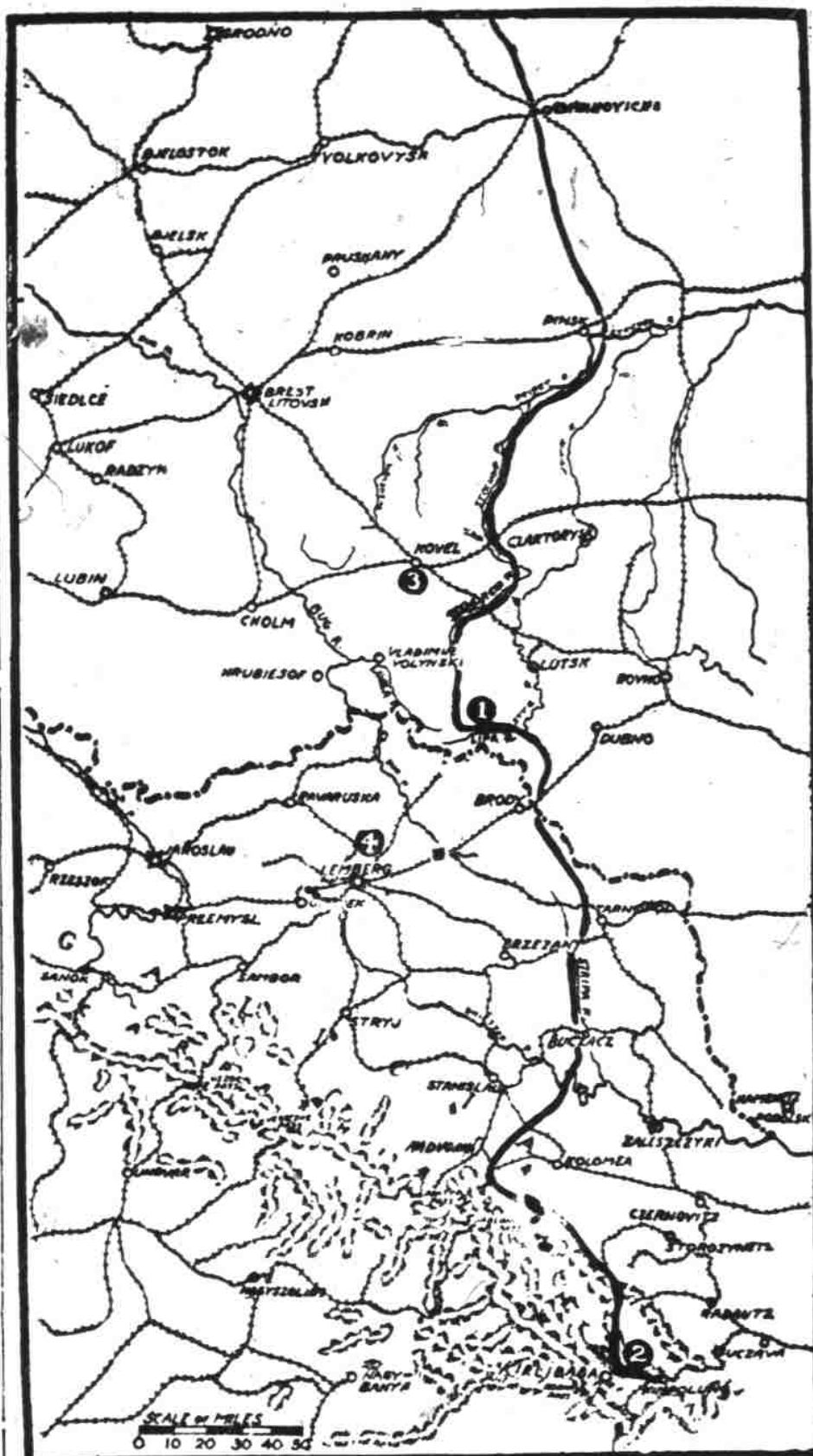

a leader who has acres and optimism of development in his soul, who will give opportunity of realizing the population and make an asset of human energy, which, through its own evolution, may become a part of the country.

"Real Americanism should have for its slogan: 'More Americans owning pieces of their own country, in order to win a comfortable existence.' This also constitutes real preparedness.

KAISER STATES WAR IS ONLY TO RUIN GERMANY

empire on Germany's peace terms. Fifty well known German orators made the same speech in 50 German cities, emphasizing Germany's willingness for an honorable peace.

Berlin, Aug. 1.—(I. N. S.)—(Via Copenhagen and London)—Today witnessed a series of meetings throughout Germany under the auspices of the so-called national committee for public discussion, within limits, of the goals of the war and the demands which must accompany peace.

This national committee was formed a month ago under the presidency of Prince Wedell, former "Statthalter" of Alsace-Lorraine, Baron von Sturm, who has had a long diplomatic career, lending prominent assistance to Prince Wedell. The real soul of the enterprise, however, is Professor Adolph Parnack, Germany's foremost theologian, director general of the Royal library and a personal friend of the Kaiser.

Seek Sentiment on War.

The object of the committee seems to be to seize the opportunity at the end of the second year of war to evoke from the German people an expression of opinion and sentiment on the subject of war goals.

As indicated in previous dispatches, the imperial chancellor, Dr. von Bethmann-Hollweg, has been under fire because of declarations regarding necessary peace terms insufficiently aggressive and definite to suit agrarians and other conservatives.

On the other hand there exists some slight socialist sentiment demanding peace at any price.

Middle Road Sought.

The program of the national committee is the middle road. Its announcements are purposely full of generalities which would be without meaning in America, but the spirit of the movement is to support the chancellor, to carry on the war in full confidence of success, meanwhile opening to the German people an opportunity of expressing themselves.

A statement issued by the committee accepts as a basis the chancellor's watch word: "Expansion of our borders in the east, real guarantees in the west. Without both no peace and no surrender of occupied territory."

Conversations with leaders of the committee give the impression that its task is to be to oppose extremes on both wings, one of which accuses the chancellor of annexation madness and the other of a desire for an empty peace.

Extreme Views Feared.

A very great number of Germans of moderate thought and high patriotism view with apprehension the possible consequences of agitation by the extremes of both sides alike during the remainder of the war, while peace negotiations are proceeding and after they have been concluded.

Tuesday night there will be mass meetings in at least 40 chief German cities. The Berlin meeting will be held in the Philharmonie hall, the largest auditorium of the city. It will be addressed by Professor Parnack.

The activities of this committee, which is only the most imposing of a number, are from various viewpoints interesting, chiefly as "trial balloons" to test the winds of German public opinion.

GERMANS' HOLD ON GALICIA IS NOW WAVERING

backward in the bend of the Stockhod in the region of Velicki and Kuchary.

Flooded fields, mostly swamps and barbed wire entanglements, partly submerged, failed to stop the Russian advance across the Stockhod river north of Kovel. German positions which the Teuton commanders have spent months in perfecting are succumbing daily to the Russian assaults.

The enveloping movement around Kovel is proceeding step by step. General Kaledin's forces have negotiated the difficult marshes of the Stockhod and General Sakharoff's division is forcing the Austrian troops under General von Boehm-Ermolli westward from Brody.

"Kink" in German Line.

Between Kovel and Brody is a "kink" in the line. Military authorities estimate the Teutonic army must retire from this angle if the Russian advance on both sides continues or else run the risk of having its flank turned.

Judging from battle front dispatches today, the floods on the Dnieper river have subsided somewhat, permitting General Letchitsky to press forward with greater rapidity. Austrian big guns are bombarding Brody in a counter attack, but it is unofficially stated the fire is waning.

German Defenses Crumble.

Headquarters of the Russian Army on the Stockhod front, Sunday, July 30 (Delayed).—(I. N. S.)—The movement on the front of the entire army is proceeding successfully. The enemy's defenses, which are extraordinarily strong, have been crumbling like sand before the Russian troops. It must be remembered that the defenders of the Stockhod line are largely German troops and fighting on a position picked in advance and which has been in preparation for months. In two days' fighting the Russians have taken 49 guns among which were 25 German "heavies," and 9000 prisoners, not counting those taken since noon today.

The Russian movement from Kasiyovka, on the Stockhod, due east of Kovel, has been developing strongly and the troops now have forced their way miles beyond the river, capturing many prisoners and guns. At the point now reached by the Germans, they are making a stubborn stand, but there is reason to believe this is only a rear guard action, as observers report the road to Kovel is black with retreating troops.

The Russian movement on the left flank is slowly swinging forward with the village of Perehodi as its approximate axis. Operations at other points, which it would be unwise to discuss, are equally successful.

Are Pursuing Turks.

Petrograd, Aug. 1.—(U. P.)—Continued pursuit of Turkish forces toward Mosul was announced in the war office statement today.

Carrie Elwert Loses.

Salem, Or., Aug. 1.—In an oral opinion today, the supreme court found for the defendant in the suit of Carrie Elwert, appellant, against the Portland dock commission, affirming Circuit Judge Davis. The plaintiff brought suit to restrain the commission from disposing of blocks 1 and 2, East Portland, to William Reed for a consideration of \$40,000, alleging she had an interest in block 2. The supreme court held she had no interest. The opinion will be written by Justice McBride and given out later.

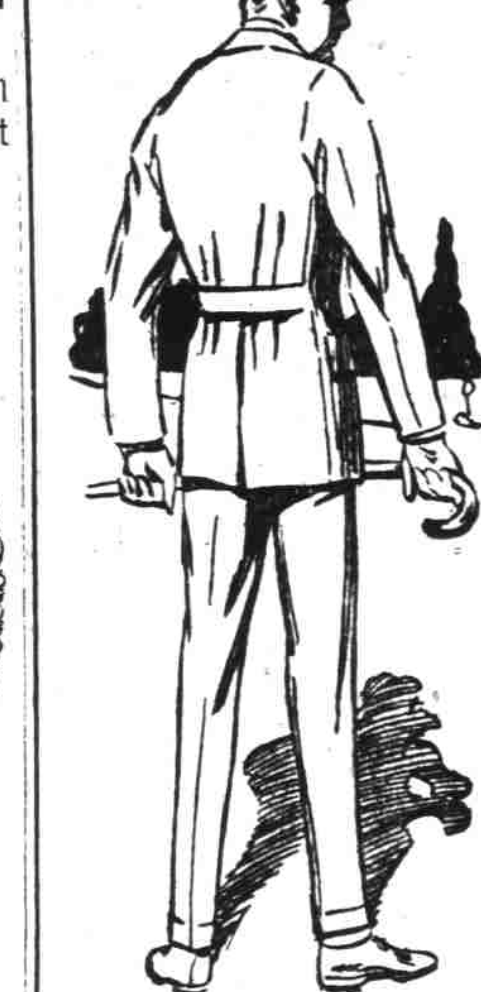
