PYTHIANS PAY HONOR TO MEMORY OF DEAD AT MASONIC TEMPLE

List for Two Years Includes
Names of 61 Former
Supreme Lodge Members.

Friends bound in the spirit of fraternalism, gathered in the Masonic Temple last night, paid tribute to the memory of those members of the supreme lodge, Knights of Pythias, who are still by the hand of death.

The list included the names of 61 who have died in the past two years. Several hundred members with their friends gathered in the assembly room of the Masonic lodge, which had been decorated with American flags and streamers bearing the colors of the Knights of Pythias and Masonic lodge.

Supreme Prelate Speaking Presides. In the absence of Honorable Brigadier S. Young, supreme chancellor, Rev. J. H. Spearling, supreme prelate, presided. Miss Evelyn Egerton, sister of the wife of Representative James H. Beane of Wheeling, W. Va., opened the program with a song, "Entreat Me Not to Leave Thee" by Gounod. Miss Egerton has a charming voice and her interpretation of the song more than pleased her hearers.

Following this number, Rev. J. H. Spearling, taking the place of Rev. Fred Atwood, S. R., who had not returned from Seaside, gave the invocation, calling on the Supreme Being for mercy to those departed members and His divine guidance for those who survived.

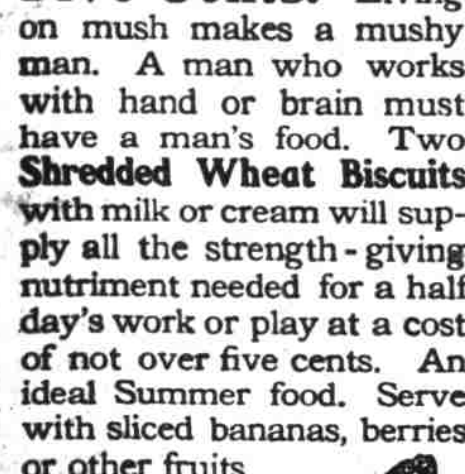
Featuring the program was the eulogy on Union Hunt by Arla M. Brown of Winchester, Ind., speaking in the absence of Hon. James E. Watson, S. R. Union B. Hunt was a member of Murdock lodge, Indiana, and prominent as president of the insurance department.

"He was born in 1864, the early part of his life being spent on a farm, later working in a brick and tile plant," said Mr. Brown. "It was while working in these places that he gained the sterling qualities of manhood that marked his life throughout. He was a man whose humanity was as broad as the shores of time, with an undying faith in humanity and his friends, in which he believed was the ultimate attainment of spiritual glory."

PORTLAND WOMAN IS AUTHORESS OF ARTICLE IN AUGUST BOOKMAN

Maryland Allen Continues
Series of Articles on Robert
Louis Stevenson.

Maryland Allen, well known Portland writer who makes her home at Rock Spur on the Willamette, has an article in the August number of The Bookman on "South Sea Memories of R. L. S."

Mrs. Allen, who is the wife of E. T. Allen, supervisor of the Western Forestry and Conservation association, has spent a number of winters on the island of Tahiti, and learned much of the master's life in the South seas from the native chiefs who knew him.

The article is really a continuation of a series begun in The Bookman in 1914 by Clayton Hamilton, "On the Trail of Stevenson."

Maryland Allen follows the trail to Tahiti. She tells of the three men whom Stevenson knew and loved best there and who in turn loved Stevenson. Tati Salmon, chief of the district of Papeete, where Mr. and Mrs. Stevenson visited; Haapi, chief of Taaitira, the district where the Stevensons lived; and Monsieur Donat, French acting-vice-resident of Fakarua.

She reproduces the text of letters written by R. L. S. to the three. The article gives an intimate view of the novelist's friendship for the trio. It is illustrated with views of Tahiti showing spots connected with his life.

She concludes: "What impressed me most in my talks with these three men of such widely different interests and temperaments was this: They had each one met R. L. S. as equals. Knowing nothing of his halo and caring less, they found him a generous friend, a dear companion, and the tenderness in which they held his memory is more moving than any monument I have ever looked upon."

ONE PUPIL IN EVERY EIGHT IN WASCO IS A HIGH SCHOOL MEMBER

Hood River County Has Done
Away With School Terms
of Less Than Nine Months

Salem, Or., Aug. 7.—One pupil in every eight that attended school in Wasco county during the year 1915-1916 was in the high school, Superintendent Bonney has reported to Su-

perintendent of Public Instruction Churchill. The high attendance was 368 and the total enrollment 2919. The county superintendent traveled 5352 miles, held one annual and six local teachers' institutes and 133 educational meetings for the pupils and patrons in the various districts of his county. Thirteen Wasco county schools employed more than one teacher. The Dallas leading with 32. Superintendent Gibson reported that Hood River county has entirely done away with school terms of six, seven and eight months, every district having nine months during the past school year. Salaries paid teachers of the county districts are the highest yet reported to the department of education, the average being \$75 per month.

Lane county has 11,721 children of school age, Superintendent Moore reports. There are 136 districts, the largest number of any county in the state. Seven of these are union high school districts and 156 have only one teacher. During the year 446 teachers were employed, 82 of whom

were men. Eight new schoolhouses were built.

Marshfield, Or., Aug. 7.—The steamer Stanwood, built at Kruse and Banker shipyard in North Bend, is now ready for installation of machinery and will be towed to San Francisco on arrival of the tug Printer which is expected any time. The vessel will be in commission in about 60 days.

Long Missing Son Prisoner in Africa

German Manufacturer Is Informed
That His Boy Had Not Been Allowed
Once to Write Home.

Berlin, Aug. 7.—(U. S. S.)—Early in September, 1915, Wilhelm Fels, a manufacturer of Osterath near Crefeld, was informed that his only son was among the missing after one of the battles on the western front and had probably been killed. As the International war prisoners committee and the Red Cross society could find no trace of the young soldier he was given up for dead.

Last week the sorrowing father was informed by an ex-changed invalid that his supposedly dead son is alive and well in a French prison camp in Northern Africa. Since his capture the young man has not been permitted to write one letter to his parents.
