

BUFFUM & PENDLETON TO OCCUPY QUARTERS AT 127 SIXTH STREET

Former Lotus Location Is Being Remodelled Into Handsome Clothing Store.

PIANO STORE TO ENLARGE

Sherman, Clay & Co. Make Move Necessary—Abendroth to Go, but Lennon's Will Retain Location.

A lease has been signed by Buffum & Pendleton, pioneer clothiers of Portland, with H. B. Chase of Pacific Grove, Cal., for the building at 127 Sixth street, which was formerly occupied by the Lotus. The building is being remodelled for occupation by September 1.

The front of the structure will be torn out and entirely changed. Alterations planned will provide for a 50 foot glass frontage, by recessing the two show windows 17 feet back to the entrance. This arrangement, according to Winthrop Hammond, one of the proprietors of the concern, will give the second largest glass windows this side of the Rocky mountains.

The store room will extend 100 feet back, with the entire floor of tile. At the rear of the first floor will be a mezzanine floor 15 feet wide for the company's offices. The main floor will be used for furnishings and hats.

The outside staircase, which formerly led to the billiard-rooms of the Lotus, will be torn out, and access to the upper salesroom for clothing will be from the interior. The second floor provides for an elaborate lighting system by the use of prism lights from the front and rear, with a light well extending to the main floor in the center.

The move from 311 Morrison street, where Buffum & Pendleton have been located for the past 13 years, is necessitated by the enlargement of quarters of Sherman, Clay & Co., which has the lease on the entire Stearns building. E. Abendroth, the jeweler, adjoining Buffum & Pendleton, will also have to vacate by September 1, but as yet has not secured a new location. Lennon's will remain at its present location and has no intention of altering or enlarging its present store.

The firm of Buffum & Pendleton was established in 1884, and was located on First street. Later it moved to Third street, where it remained until 1903, when it moved to the present location. A year ago Mr. Buffum retired and the firm was reorganized as a corporation, at which time Winthrop Hammond, manager, became interested.

Rural Carriers in Favor of Good Roads

City's Indebtedness Is Reduced \$500

Vancouver, Wash., Aug. 8.—The city's outstanding indebtedness was reduced approximately \$500 during the past month, according to the monthly report of the city treasurer, which was filed last evening. The report shows that on July 1 the indebtedness was \$28,225, and that warrants in the sum of \$28,725 were redeemed during the month. Warrants in the sum of \$23,225 were redeemed, leaving a balance outstanding of \$5,000.

The report also shows that the unpaid taxes on July 1 were \$23,063.93 and that collections in the sum of \$4,000.57 were made, leaving a balance of \$18,063.36 still unpaid.

The road and bridge fund had a credit of \$16,751.12 July 1 and received the sum of \$245.88 during the month. Warrants in the sum of \$22.25 were paid, leaving a balance of \$16,973.75 in the fund.

Will Show Teachers The Big Highway

Oregon City, Aug. 8.—Teachers attending the annual Clackamas county teachers' training school in this city will take an automobile trip to the Columbia highway Friday. County School Superintendent Calavan announced this morning.

The party will leave Oregon City at 8:30 o'clock. Over 100 teachers are expected to make the trip in automobiles donated for the day by Oregon City motorists. Teachers will furnish lunch and entertainment for the excursion.

"Oregon City automobile owners are loyal in supporting the plan," said Superintendent Calavan this morning. "The trip is an educational one, as it will give the teachers opportunity to see one of the best known scenic highways on the coast."

The horse ran away, hitting his rig, throwing him out and injuring his head and body and also his kidneys. He claims the county road at that place was in a dangerous condition. McLaughlin is 61 years old.

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HAIRLY IS NOTIFIED OF NOMINATION FOR OFFICE OF PRESIDENT

Ceremonies Conducted by Prohibition Party on Lawn of Candidate's Home.

Indianapolis, Ind., Aug. 8.—(U. P.)—J. Frank Hanly, former Republican governor of Indiana and recently the candidate of the Indiana Progressive party for governor, this afternoon was formally notified of his nomination as a candidate for president of the United States by the Prohibition party.

Dr. Ira Landrith of Boston shortly afterward received notification of his nomination for vice president. The ceremonies were held on the lawn of the Hanly home.

Early in his speech of acceptance Hanly declared that he neither approved nor accepted the initiative, referendum and recall plank adopted by the party at St. Paul. It was this plank adopted by Indiana Progressives that caused him to refuse the nomination for governor.

Hanly devoted as much time to the Mexican situation, the tariff and to Americanism as he did to prohibition. "We are failing and have long failed to assure and guarantee the lives and property of European and American citizens," said Hanly. To meet this duty in the case of Hayti and San Domingo has been easy and we have met it. To meet it in the case of Mexico has been difficult and we have failed it."

Hanly said prohibition offered the best means of preparedness. He came out strong for Americanism, but warned against militarism in too great preparedness. He said so far as a crisis in American life is concerned it will "make absolutely no difference whether Wilson or Hughes is elected," for both are intensely American and jealous of the nation's honor. Both love peace, but either would sacrifice it to save the nation's honor," he said. He declared "There is no crisis."

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Getting Ready to Classify O.-C. Land

Louis L. Sharp, Chief of Field Division of General Land Office, Is on Hand to Take Active Charge.

Ashland, Or., Aug. 8.—Louis L. Sharp, chief of the field division of the general land office, arrived here last Friday from Portland and has gone to the Hotel Austin to establish near Pinehurst, 30 miles east of Ashland, on the Klamath Falls road, to take personal charge of work upon the classification of the Oregon-California land grant lands. Ten thousand acres of land are to be classified and a policy broad enough to include these of every political group who desire to secure definite reforms affecting women and children.
