

TWO MEN ACCUSED OF BOOTLEGGING HELD TO FEDERAL GRAND JURY

Charles J. Bertelson and
Charles F. Robinson Fail to
Raise \$1000 Bonds Each.

BOAT HAS BEEN LIBELED

Forfeiture. Asked on Ground Used
Illicit Traffic—Question Is Raised
as to Jurisdiction of Court.

Charles J. Bertelson and Charles F. Robinson, accused of being "deep sea bootleggers," were given a preliminary hearing yesterday before United States Commissioner Drake, and were bound over to the federal grand jury on bonds of \$1000 each, which were not furnished.

The men were arrested in the Columbia river below Astoria by customs officers, and a small quantity of liquor was found in the 25 foot boat in which, it is alleged, they have brought several cargoes of liquor down from Vancouver, B. C., since January 1, selling it to fishermen along the Washington and Oregon coasts, but outside the three mile limit to which civil authority extends.

This raises the question as to whether the men have violated any law in their deep sea operations. It is believed, however, that they have a cache of liquor on land, and that their transactions have not been altogether on the high seas.

Their 25-foot boat, seized when they were arrested, has been brought to Portland, and Assistant United States Attorney Rankin filed a libel against it today, asking its forfeiture to the government for having been used in illicit traffic.

NON-COMPLIANCE IS CHARGED

Two Employers Sued Under Workmen's Compensation Act.

The State Industrial Accident Commission, through Attorney-General Brown and District Attorney Evans, has filed suits against Esau M. Tucker and William Jasper Hallock for failure to comply with the workmen's compensation act after signifying acceptance of its terms.

Tucker as proprietor of a machine shop and Hallock as a Portland contractor are said not to have paid payroll percentages as required by law. A total of \$80.55 is alleged to be unpaid by Tucker and \$25.75 by Hallock.

To Exchange Court Rooms.

Circuit Judge Gantenbein and County Judge Cleaton are to exchange court rooms for the balance of the year, beginning with the September term. Judge Gantenbein is now on the fifth floor near the juvenile court and Judge Cleaton is on the second floor, near the county clerk's office. Inasmuch as Judge Cleaton is juvenile judge, the change will place all his departments on one floor. Judge Gantenbein looks favorably on the second floor court room.

Former Policeman Must Pay.

Circuit Judge Gaten has issued an order directing Mart Sheridan, Hazen, former Portland policeman, against whom Mrs. Daisy Lydia Hazen has filed suit for divorce, to pay \$75 for the support of his family pending the outcome of the trial, to pay \$100 attorney's fees for wife and to restore to her custody their son Norrold. Mrs. Hazen is suing for a separation on the ground of cruelty. They have four children.

Asks \$7500 for Boy's Death.

Suit for \$7500 was filed against the Lee Delivery company yesterday as a result of the accident at Hazel Fern place and East Forty-first street, Larchmont July 13, in which George Martell La Pointe, a little boy, was killed while coasting. Suit is brought on the ground that the had had the right-of-way over the two-ton truck of the Lee company. It was filed by E. R. La Pointe as administrator.

Calls His Wife a Flirt.

That his wife went to dances against his wishes and that she became a flirt and carried on so as to become the talk of the town, are among the reasons for a divorce signed by Harry Gray in a suit filed yesterday in the circuit court against Vera P. Gray. The Grays were married in 1910 and lived in Dayton, Or.

Land Company Incorporated.

Articles of incorporation have been filed by the Stuart Land company with headquarters in Portland. The company is capitalized at \$50,000. The incorporators are D. M. Stuart, K. B. Stuart and D. B. Stuart.

Mother Given Child's Custody.

Judge Gantenbein has granted a decree of divorce by default to Grayce G. Holman from Phelps Holman on the ground of cruelty. Mrs. Holman is given the custody of a minor child.

N. P. Dispatchers Are Given a Raise

Tacoma, Wash., Aug. 10.—(P. N. S.)—Northern Pacific dispatchers here today were apprised of a \$10 a month increase in salary, recently requested and now granted by the railway company effective as from August 1. Chief dispatchers will now receive \$190 a month, night chief and his assistant \$175, and truck dispatchers \$165. This agrees with a similar increase recently granted dispatchers of the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul lines.

NEW COMBINATION OF VAUDEVILLE BOOKING AGENCIES REPORTED

Orpheum Is to Open Here
About September 15, According to Carl Ritter.

Telegrams from the east to Walter C. Smith, manager of the Hippodrome, announce today a combination of vaudeville booking agencies said to be the greatest ever accomplished. The circuits affected are the Western Vaudeville Managers' association (Orpheum), the A. & K. (Ackerman & Harris) circuit, Hippodrome circuit (Ackerman & Harris), the Kellie Burns agency, a Seattle concern, and the Brennan circuit in Australia. The reputed combination also signifies, it is said, the elimination of the Affiliated Booking company or, if not complete elimination, a merger that practically accomplishes the same end. This reputed aggregation will be affiliated with the United Booking company, the main booking agency east of Chicago.

The new circuit will be put in effect so far as this coast is concerned on September 6 at Hutto. It is understood, when acts intended for the coast will be turned over to the Hippodrome circuit.

The amalgamation brings under one head in the neighborhood of 75 houses and wipes out all other transcontinental bookings except the Pantages circuit, which also books from coast to coast, according to theatrical men. Acts will be booked for 50 weeks, practically a solid year, it is said, not including the option to visit Australia for a booking that will run at least 17 weeks and from that possibly up to a year, the Australian houses often keeping acts much longer than the guaranteed period.

Carl Ritter, the Orpheum representative in this city, states that it is a certainty that the Orpheum will open here about September 15. Ritter made this statement yesterday after a return from Seattle, where he was in conference with Henderson and Brown, other heads of the Orpheum interests on this coast. It is also known that Ritter and other theatrical men in this company, visited show houses in this city, apparently not for the purpose of witnessing the performances. The news from the east today tends to clinch Ritter's assertion.

Twins Save Father From Paying Penalty

A pair of twins saved the day for W. H. Zimney, a farmer, when he appeared in police court today on a charge of running his automobile with the muffler open. Zimney had been arrested by Patrolman Sims. He explained that his muffler had been choked with country road dust and could not be closed until cleaned. "Married," asked Municipal Judge Langguth.

"Yes, sir," was Zimney's reply. "Any family?"

"Yes, sir. I've got a wife and a pair of twins."

"Hm, discharged at once," said the judge and Zimney went his way rejoicing.

Jail Awaits Future Bootleggers, Advice

Bootleggers are going to jail hereafter, instead of being allowed to get off with small fines, according to announcement made by Municipal Judge Langguth today. He says the new ruling becomes effective immediately.

"Bootlegging is increasing," he said this morning, "and the only way to stop it is to put the offenders in jail for a while. I'm getting tired of assessing small fines which do no good. Offenders feel that they can take a chance of being arrested, paying a fine of \$50 and making more by selling the liquor. This is going to be stopped."

Council Considers Submarines.

Berne, Switzerland, Aug. 10.—(P. N. S.)—Resumption of unrestricted submarine warfare is under consideration here, according to dispatches received here. It was said the committee on foreign affairs of the German federal council had met to consider whether present relations with neutral nations justified again bringing the divers into unrestricted action.

J. P. Jaeger Says Vandals Have
Ruined His Building.

J. P. Jaeger has appealed to Mayor Albee and Chief of Police Clark for protection for his flat and store building at the corner of Alnsworth and Union avenues. Three years ago, he says, the building was occupied and in good condition. The tenants moved out, and since then the place has been badly treated by vandals, who have cut holes in walls, stairs and ceiling, and broken into the building repeatedly. A gang of roughs makes headquarters there, Mr. Jaeger says. It is useless, he says, for him to try to repair the building unless police protection is made more adequate than it is at present. The policeman in that district has a boat extending from Stanton street to the city limits, beyond Columbia boulevard.

Bulldog Is Cause of Auto Accident; Man and Girl Hurt

A bulldog was the cause of an automobile accident at a Union avenue and Skidmore street last night, which resulted in Miss Hilda Benden, 18 years old, of Battle Ground, Wash., being sent to the hospital and C. R. Holbrook sustaining a bruised shoulder. A. Grossen and Mrs. Bushlack riding in the machine were slightly injured. Miss Benden was taken to the Portland Sanitarium. Her injuries are not serious, however. Mr. Holbrook attempted to steer clear of the dog which was running in front of the car when the animal made a lunge and went under one wheel. The machine turned and struck a telephone pole.

INDUSTRIAL LOAN FUND TO ENCOURAGE BIGGER PAY ROLLS IS PLAN

East Side Business Men's Club
Would Make Portland "Future
Hamburg of Coast."

SUBSCRIBERS ARE SOUGHT

Scheme Will Be Financed by Sale of
Stock in Development
Fund.

To make Portland the "future Hamburg, Liverpool and Antwerp of the Pacific coast," the East Side Business Men's club announced today the details of its proposed \$500,000 industrial development loan fund for the aid of Portland and Oregon manufacturers.

The Industrial Development league, which has been organized to administer this fund, has investigated the plans used in other cities where effective encouragement to industrial enterprises have been carried on. The results of this investigation form the basis of the plan as outlined, as follows:

A credit guarantee and security investment plan, backed by signatures to

stock subscriptions, on which small initial cash payments are to be made. The cash and credit guarantees will be used to encourage home industries and assist outside industries to locate here. This would do away with the old plan of soliciting personal subscriptions to capital stock or bonds, which always was unsatisfactory, because of the individual investor's inability to make full investigation.

The fund to be used for this encouragement of industry would be administered by a board of directors consisting of men experienced in business and finance and two or more officers authorized to execute the work of the board.

Two classes of stock are proposed for the financing of the industrial loan fund: Class A to be paid for within two years in equal weekly or monthly installments, the proceeds to be known as the cash fund, to be used in purchasing such securities of industries to be aided as the directors may designate.

Subscribers to Class B stock are required to pay into the treasury in cash the first 25 per cent of their subscriptions as follows: Five per cent on 10 days' call, 10 per cent 20 days after first payment and 10 per cent 30 days after second payment. The remaining 75 per cent shall be payable in varying percentages as per subsequent call of the board.

Aid for needy industries may be provided after proper investigation—either by payment of cash from the various funds or by borrowing on the industrial company's credit.

The league is now soliciting signatures to the plan, the signers taking out either class of stock and agreeing to the terms of payment. Subscriptions made now, however, are not considered binding until \$250,000 shall have been subscribed.
