

PROGRESSIVE FOUND SENTIMENT IN FAVOR OF PRESIDENT WILSON

T. J. Cherrington, of Dallas,
Calls New York Apathetic
Toward Hughes.

T. R.'S MOVES RESENTED

Says Republicans Assent Hughes Was
Meek Instrument of Ringsters and
Special Privileges as Governor.

"The Progressives are not going to be delivered to Hughes by Theodore Roosevelt," said T. J. Cherrington of Dallas who has just returned from an extensive trip through the middle west and Atlantic states. Mr. Cherrington was one of the organizers of the Progressive party in Oregon in 1912, and was a life-long Republican before that. "Progressives everywhere feel a strong resentment toward Roosevelt for his switching and indecision during the convention days in Chicago," he continued. "I talked with many Republicans in several states and all the Progressives I could find. In New York state there is a distinct apathy toward Hughes. Republians there say he was a meek instrument of the ringsters and special privileges when governor, and the labor people have no use for him."

"I stopped several weeks in New York City. The distinct contrast between the two men who were marked. In New Jersey the people still tell of the way Wilson brought the gang bosses and the special interests to their knees. You don't hear any remarks of that kind about Hughes in New York."

"FINANCIAL DRIVE" PLANNED

Prohibitionists to Form New Committee of One Hundred.

Under the leadership of ex-Governor Oswald West, Dr. J. P. Wilson, J. P. Sanger, Mrs. Adah Wallace, F. H. Sanger and others, the prohibitionists are now forming a new prohibition committee of one hundred, with the following objects:

To insure the passage of the new dry amendment prohibiting importation of liquor, to expose the real meaning of the brewers' amendment and thus insure its defeat, to make sure that the 1917 state legislature shall be a dry one, and wherever possible to assist upon the action of dry judicial, administrative and congressional candidates.

The committee is preparing for a big "financial drive" to raise funds to wage a thorough comprehensive campaign for the last eight weeks before election. They aim to raise \$10,000 and are confident that this goal can be reached upon the date set. They point out that this is less than 2 cents a head, according to the population of the state; that it is less than 25 cents a head for those who voted the straight prohibition ticket; that it is less than 75 cents a head for those who registered themselves as prohibitionists at the last campaign, and it is less than 20 cents a head for those who signed the new dry amendment, the passage of which is the main object of this new committee of one hundred.

The state has been divided into districts. Three hundred volunteers are being enlisted, trained and supplied with ammunition, and at a given signal they will simultaneously make an onslaught on Oregon's pocketbook, and will not retire until they have secured the amount which they have been ordered to raise. Each hand will

know exactly what it is expected to raise, and where it is expected to get it. The attacks will be made from 10 to 12 o'clock every day, all over the state, on September 2, 6, 7, 8 and 9. Results of each day's engagement will be flashed to Portland, and the results will be given to the daily papers, that all may watch the progress of the fight. The staff at headquarters believes that the "big drive" will be successful.

ICE HIPPODROME SECURED

Republican Candidate Hughes Will
Speak in Great Auditorium.

Former Justice Charles Evans Hughes, Republican nominee for president, will greet the people of Portland in the Ice Hippodrome next Wednesday night at 8 o'clock. This was decided upon yesterday afternoon by the executive committee of the state central committee after arrangements had been made to have a board flooring laid over the refrigerator pipes that gridiron the floor of the building.

Final details for the entertainment of Justice Hughes, and for the meeting in the evening, were perfected yesterday after a long conference with A. N. Rodway, who is traveling in advance of the candidate's party. Mr. and Mrs. Hughes will reach Portland Wednesday morning at 6 o'clock, will be met by the local reception committee and escorted to their hotel at 7 o'clock. Automobiles will be placed at the disposal of both Mr. and Mrs. Hughes, and if time permits, the party will be taken for a ride over the Columbia highway.

State Chairman McNary is trying to arrange for a flying trip up the Willamette valley, during which Mr. Hughes would speak at Salem, Albany and Eugene, and has wired Mr. Hughes for his decision in regard to the matter. It is considered doubtful that the arrangement can be made. If not, an effort will be made to arrange an afternoon meeting at which Mr. Hughes will address the women of the city.

Mr. Rodway reached the city early yesterday morning and left for San Francisco late in the afternoon.

Hughes Urged to Attend Luncheon.

The county commissioners this morning addressed a communication to Charles Evans Hughes, Republican presidential candidate, urging him to attend the luncheon at the Portland club next Wednesday, to which he has been invited. Attendance is asked by the commissioners because of the great desire on the part of the people of Multnomah county to meet Mr. Hughes.

Shopkeepers Object to Return of Goods

San Francisco Considers Ordinance
Aimed to Stop Abuse of Privilege of
"Home Inspection" of Purchases.

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 11.—(U. P.)—That favorite pastime of many fair shoppers of taking goods on approval may soon lose its charm, for city officials are today considering an ordinance to stop it. If the ordinance passes, it will be necessary to go through inspection by the health department before articles of clothing can be taken home on approval, or exchanged after purchase.

Already the practice is in disfavor with the Retail Dry Goods association, and its members have pledged their support to Health Officer Hassler in his move for the measure.

The proposed ordinance will make it a misdemeanor for an establishment to receive returned goods unless the premises of the person who returned them have been examined by the health department.

Killed Deer; In Jail.

Roseburg, Ore., Aug. 11.—F. W. Young of Yonville on Thursday pleaded guilty in the justice court here to killing a deer out of season. He was fined \$30 by Justice Riddle, in default of which he was placed in the county jail. Young admitted killing the deer and giving parts of it to friends, but pleaded that he thought the season opened August 1.

SIGNAL HONOR WON BY PORTLAND WINDOW DISPLAY MANAGER

M. J. B. Tennent Is Awarded
Five First Grand Medals
and Three Seconds.

WHOLE WORLD COMPETES

Present Is Second Time Victory Has
Crowned Local Man for Artistic
Work.

A telegram has just been received from A. J. Edgell, president of the International Association of Display Men, stating that M. J. B. Tennent, window display manager for the Meier & Frank Co., has been awarded five first grand medals and three second grand medals in the annual contest just held in Chicago. Mr. Tennent has also been elected vice president of the organization.

Upon the only other occasion that Mr. Tennent entered in this international competition with other display men, in 1913, he was awarded four first grand medals and four second grand medals, giving him a position 29 points ahead of his nearest competitor.

This is no small honor for the Meier & Frank Co. and is a personal triumph for Mr. Tennent, as photographs of the best window displays of the largest and most representative stores of the world are entered in these contests.

The telegram does not mention the windows upon which awards were made. Particularly artistic windows of the Meier & Frank Co. were arranged during the spring style exhibit. At this time Mr. Tennent's work aroused a great deal of favorable comment, notably his "Bakst" panels and arrangements which were inspired by the costumes for Sergius Diaghileff's Russian ballet.

Photographs and accounts of these awards will appear in trade journals all over the world.

Highway Pavement Is Completed Today

With Paving of Sandy Road Crossing
45 Mile Paved Highway to Hood
River County Will Be Opened.

With the completion of the pavement on the Columbia river highway today and the paving of the Sandy road underground crossings near the county farm in a few days, Multnomah county will have a paved road all the way to the Hood River county line, a distance of 45 miles. Beyond the city limits there will not be a railroad crossing of a wooden bridge. This is the culmination of three years' work. The total cost of this work has not yet been cast up, but it will probably approximate \$2,000,000.

The cost of the section known as the Columbia river highway proper, between the Sandy river and the county line, will be in the neighborhood of \$1,500,000. About \$1,000,000 will have been spent between Crown Point and Hood River county, or an average of \$50,000 per mile.

In estimating the cost of the pavement, some close figuring was done, and it may be possible that the appropriation out of the \$1,250,000 county bond issue will be overrun a small amount. This is a possibility, but the withdrawal from the fund of several thousand dollars for bridges on other county roads, which were not taken into account when the paving estimates were made up.

Bootleggers Are to Face Jail in Future

Municipal Judge Langguth and Deputy District Attorney Deich Plan Severe Punishment for Law Violators.

Convinced because of the increasing number of cases coming before him that illicit sellers of liquor are able to pay the moderate fines imposed and still show a profit, Municipal Judge Langguth announced from the bench yesterday afternoon a policy of greater severity towards bootleggers. Hereafter, he declared, fines will be much heavier and jail sentences will be the rule, rather than the exception. Bonds on appeal are also to be made much higher. Hereafter, he said, fines have ranged from \$50 to \$250.

Deputy District Attorney Deich supplemented the judge's remarks with a slap at Circuit Judge McGinn for turning bootleggers loose on impulse because of the securing of evidence against them by stool-pigeon methods. The police and sheriff's office and the district attorney's office are working hard to suppress bootlegging, declared Deich, yet their efforts are, to a great extent, nullified by Judge McGinn, who has either quashed or suspended sentences.

"Soft drink parlors in the North End blossom out into bootlegging joints following his decisions, giving us just what we need much more trouble," asserted Deich.

Judge Langguth said he knew from personal observation that drunkenness is on the increase and that he proposes to go to the limit of the authority vested in his court to suppress it.

Average Daily School Attendance 35,209

Annual School Report Shows Night
School Attendance Increased From
1817 to Over 6000 in Three Years.

Average daily attendance in the Portland schools for the year ending June 30, 1915, was 35,209, according to the forty-third annual school report, soon to be out in printed form. The report shows that 494 boys and 751 girls were enrolled in the trade schools during the year, and that the night school attendance was more than 6000, a growth from 1817 in three years.

"Our aim is to give each child such an education as will enable him to be a self-reliant and self-supporting citizen," says Superintendent Alderman in the report.

Dr. Robert Will Go East.
Dr. David N. Robert, state health officer, will go as delegate from Oregon to attend a national conference of health officials at Washington, D. C., August 17, when the prevention of infantile paralysis will be discussed.

Tank Cars Offered for Government Use

Union Tank Line Company Will Furnish
Solution for Water Problem
Facing Soldiers on Mexican Border.

New York, Aug. 11.—(U. P.)—The Union Tank Line company, a former subsidiary of the Standard Oil company of New Jersey, has come to the aid of the war department in solving the problem of getting fresh water to the troops along the border. It was learned today that the company had offered to the military authorities the use of 40 new tank cars, each with a capacity of 5000 gallons. The offer was accepted immediately and the cars will be on their way in a solid train from Milton, Pa., where they were built, to San Antonio. The offer entails the use of the cars as long as the government needs them, and this despite the fact that oil refiners are reporting a shortage of from 2000 to 3000 cars in equipment available for the transportation of petroleum.

MAYOR ROLPH STARTS MOVEMENT TO SOLVE INDUSTRIAL DISPUTE

Appointment of Board to Arbitrate
Has Been Proposed
to Central Labor Bodies.

San Francisco, Cal., Aug. 11.—(U. P.)—Arbitration of all of San Francisco's industrial disputes will be attempted at once if the suggestion of Mayor Rolph in an open letter made public today is adopted by the chamber of commerce and the unions involved.

The mayor proposed that the Central Labor bodies and the employers' organizations appoint five members each and that the body so organized be added Archbishop Hanna and four other clergymen appointed by the archbishop. He suggests that such a board be given power to act and express the belief that it "could quickly relieve much of the present industrial friction, correct abuses, prevent strikes, lockouts and boycotts and insure industrial peace without which neither capital nor labor can prosper."

The mayor's suggestion was immediately endorsed by the Building Trades council, and other union organizations are considering it today. The employers' organizations have not yet replied to the mayor's appeal.

Simultaneously with the mayor's appeal, the police committee of the board of supervisors rejected the proposed ordinance to make picketing by striking working men a misdemeanor punishable by a fine and imprisonment.

Lineman, Shocked, Falls to His Death

Henry C. Rumsey of The Dallas Tumbles
From Top of Fifteen-Foot Ladder
After Current Burns Him.

The Dallas, Ore., Aug. 11.—Henry C. Rumsey, line foreman of the Pacific Power & Light company of this city, was killed this morning when he received a shock from a high-power wire and fell on his head from the top of a 15-foot ladder, fracturing his skull. He died soon after being taken to The Dallas hospital.

Rumsey was working on wires at the local substation when the accident happened. No one saw the accident, but from the man's hands and feet it is believed Rumsey was knocked from the ladder by the shock. He is survived by his widow and three children.

EXCHANGE OF NEWS BETWEEN CONTINENTS HAS STRONG APPROVAL

President Wilson Declares
New Departure Will Establish
Friendly Relations.

NO DOUBT OF BENEFITS

Lansing Says Arrangement Made by
United Press and La Nacion Is
Proof of Demand for Knowledge.

Washington, Aug. 11.—(U. P.)—President Wilson and Secretary of State Lansing today indicated the official interest of this government in the new arrangement for the interchange of news between North and South America.

President Wilson said: "I think I can say with definite knowledge of the facts that the people of the United States desire to know the people of the South American republics better. Although neighbors geographically, lack of ready communication has constantly prevented us from making us strangers. La Nacion and the United Press seem to be removing this menace of misunderstanding for in no other way can we become so well acquainted as through the easy processes of every day news."

Secretary Lansing said: "The arrangement made between the United Press of this country and La Nacion, one of the great journals of South America for the exchange of news, is most gratifying proof of the increased demand for more intimate knowledge of one another which is so prevalent today in all the American republics. It evidences the success of the Pan-American movement to which the government of the United States is so earnestly devoted."

"A wider acquaintanceship between the sister republics of the western hemisphere will do much to foster the friendship and mutual interest which found expression in the spirit animating the second Pan-American scientific congress which met in Washington last winter. There can be no doubt of the benefits to be derived from this interchange of knowledge and those whose enterprise has increased the facilities for such interchange are rendering valuable public service to the peoples of North and South America."

Mr. Vandepul Much Pleased.
New York, Aug. 11.—(U. P.)—Frank A. Vandepul, president of the National City bank, which has a branch in Buenos Aires, today expressed great satisfaction at the completion of arrangements for the interchange of news between North and South America.

"I have learned with the greatest interest of the extension of the United Press service to South America," said Vandepul, "and I believe the reciprocal relations between the United Press and La Nacion mark a real step in the promotion of a closer union of the vital interests of the United States and the great republics of the south. I wish to congratulate the United Press associations and our friends in South America on this important step."

Chairman Watson Resigns.
George H. Watson, chairman of the Democratic county central committee, resigned the chairmanship at a meeting of the committee held at the Central library Wednesday. Mr. Watson has found that the demands of the position are so heavy that he has been forced in the interest of his private business to withdraw. The resignation was tabled by the committee for a week, and will be given final consideration at a meeting to be held next Wednesday evening at the library. John H. Stevenson and State Chairman Samuel White made brief addresses at the meeting.
