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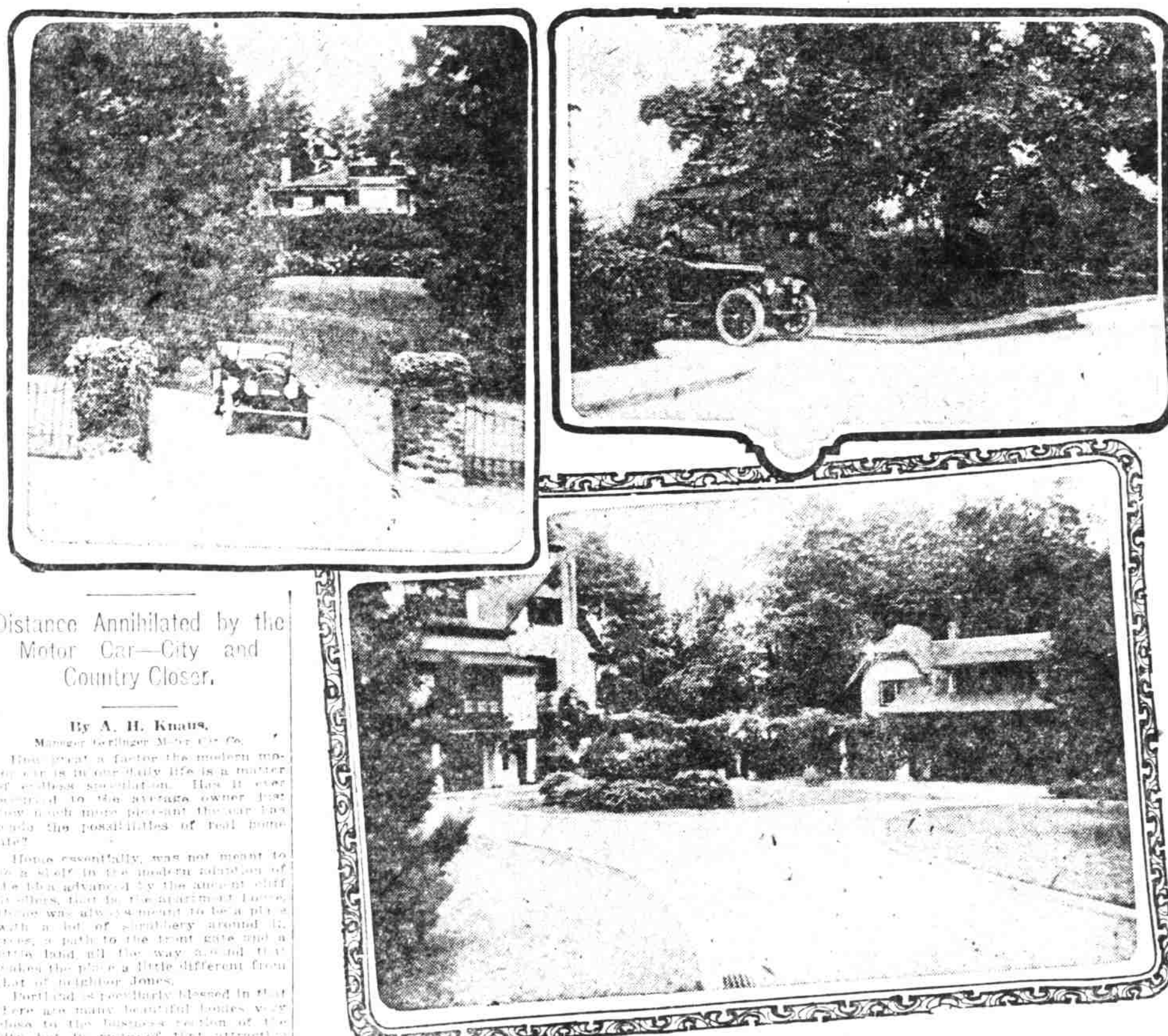

GOLF IS ONE ATHLETIC ACTIVITY WHERE AGE AND YOUTH MAY PLAY

Young Quimet and Old Travis
Show That Years Are No
Bar to Winning.

UNIQUE GOLF DEBT PAID

Loser Entertains Crowd by Telling

Golf is the perfect sport; the one game where extreme age and extreme youth do not act as a handicap.

Two years or so ago, Francis Quimet, just out of kindergarten, entered the national open championship—and won. He beat all the crack players in America; he triumphed over Vardon and Hay, the great English diskists. And Quimet was still in his teens.

A short time later Walter Travis, far along in the fifties, contested against the best players in the Metropolitan district—and Travis won the championship.

Vardon Won at 20.

Harry Vardon won when he won his first title; he won his sixth at the age of 41. Jimmy Braid, also of England, wasn't a champion until he was 21 years of age. Since then he has won five championships—the last in 1914.

And Braid's playing at 49, and not considered far beyond athletic prime, was more brilliant than he displayed at 21.

And so it has gone throughout the golfing history; a school of champions that show that age has nothing whatever to do with the ultimate outcome of a golf match.

Frank H. Hoyt of the Swaney Country Club (New York) paid a golfing debt the other day in having John T. Little paid that debt as a reward on the course.

Hoyt, a crack, played a round with Little and lost. Little, who is a little over 70, is a member of the club.

HARRY VARDON'S TIPS TO PLAYERS OF GAME OF GOLF

Great English Golfer Tells
How to Attain Perfection
on the Links.

Here are seven bits of advice also given by Harry Vardon, the English star to those who aspire to perfection on the links.

"Keep your head still until the club has struck the ball."

"Don't be afraid to hit hard if you are swinging correctly."

"Let the movement of your swing be steady and rhythmic."

"Keep the head steady. Do not let the left foot turn outward—then the body can only wind up when the arms go back."

"Grip the club with the thumbs and forefingers. The arms are so well adapted as the other fingers to the purpose of taking a strong hold, and they are the most important of all for the purpose of the golf grip."

"Let the club head lead the left wrist turning toward the arm following the club head and the right hip following next."

"Don't throw the arms forward as you start to come down as though you were mowing grass. Rather throw them back, and let them come round to their own way from that point."

MAY CALL SOLDIER BOYS

Stenstrom and Wilson, Spriters, Are
With National Guard on Mexican
Border—Boxers to Go South.

The Pacific Northwest association will be represented in the far western championships at San Diego during the latter part of this week by the best talent available.

Following is the personnel of the track team: Chester Lee, James Javelin, Sam Bell, pole vault and broad jump, Tom Lee, high jump, Harry Cole, discus, J. Murphy, high jump, Carl Johnson, broad jump, Williams, sprinter, Paul Clyde, distance runner, Walter Hunsell, hurdles and broad jump, and Wilson, sprinter.

There is also a possibility that Sam Stenstrom, the University of Washington sprinter, who is with the Washington National Guard at the Mexican border, will join the team.

Wilson, the University of Oregon sprinter, is a member of the Oregon National Guard, and Paul Clyde, the most used athlete champion, left Seattle Friday night en route to San Diego.

Sam Bell, the national pole vault champion, is at Sacramento, and he will join the team athletes at San Francisco next Wednesday.

A preliminary workout will be started this morning on Muttomah field.

Ralph Underwood, hurdler, and Tom Lee, high jumper, will represent the Multnomah Amateur Athletic club in the far western boxing events.

Lloyd Madden, halfweight, and Carl Haind, the pounder, representative of the Seattle Athletic club, left Seattle last Tuesday night for San Diego.

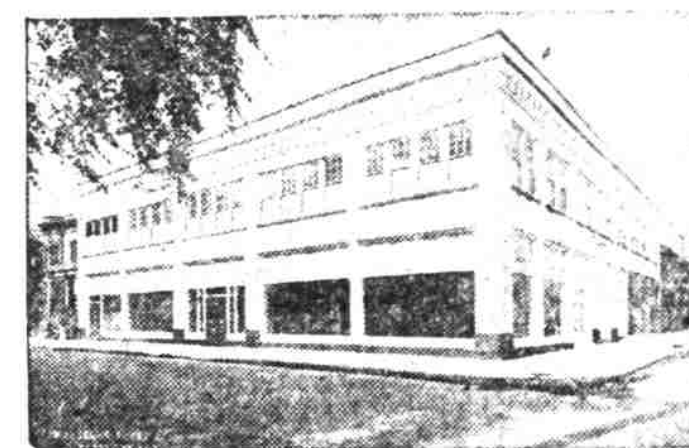
The Spokane Athletic club boxers will probably be Leon Anshutz, 165 pounds, and Ross Hunsell, 185 pounds.

Vincent Moulder, the Multnomah club welterweight, will not be able to make the trip on account of his leaving in the far western boxing events.

The athletes assembled here will depart Tuesday for San Francisco. The stay in San Francisco will be a short one, as they are due to reach San Diego Thursday morning.

The marks made in the track and field events will be accepted as the official far western records, as the records being up last year were not accepted on account of the stiff breeze that was blowing during the progress of the events.

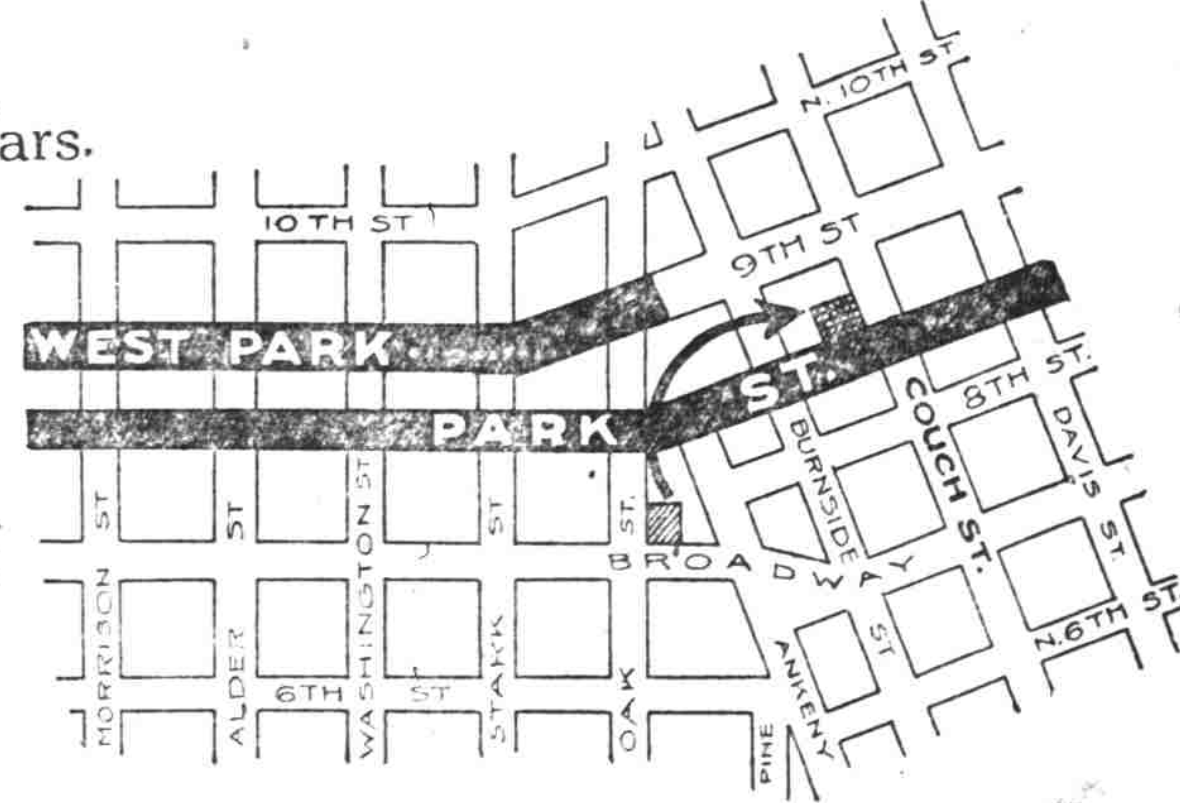
