

RUSSIANS COMMENCE NEW DRIVE, CAPTURE OF STANISLAU GAIN

Lemberg Is Main Objective in Determined Rush of the Czar's Soldiers in Galicia.

STRONG POSITIONS TAKEN

Aim Is to Establish a Barrier of Steel Around the Teuton Carpathian Army in Campaign.

London, Aug. 12.—(U. N. S.)—Repeating the fruits of the capture of Stanislaw, Russia's invading armies in Galicia have begun a winter drive on the whole 150-mile front from the Brody region in the northeastern edge of the Austrian crown land, down to the Carpathian foothills.

They have advanced along the 25-mile front from west of Tarnopol to west of Husiatyn, pushing their lines in the north closer to Lemberg and in the south menacingly close to Halicz, on the Stanislaw-Lemberg railroad.

Strong Positions Are Taken. The capture of a number of small but strongly fortified points northwest of Husiatyn in their drive on Halicz, while the left wing of General Letchitsky's army, which took Stanislaw on Thursday, pushed without halting its pursuit of the defenders northward toward that town, thus trying to cut off the Teuton forces heading for the Stanislaw-Lemberg railway, now their only avenue of escape.

They captured two important towns, Nadworna and Solotvino, northeast of the Carpathians, from the Czarna Dniestrza river at the former and the Zlota Dniestrza at the latter. This represents an advance of 18 miles since Thursday when they captured Delatyn, the main base of Arch Duke Karl Franz Joseph's right wing. It means, moreover, a vital step toward the achievement of the Russian aim to establish a barrier of iron and steel around the Teuton Carpathian army, thus to prevent it from breaking through and joining the main forces of the Hapsburgs.

Escape Is Being Blocked. They captured a number of small but strongly fortified points northwest of Husiatyn in their drive on Halicz, while the left wing of General Letchitsky's army, which took Stanislaw on Thursday, pushed without halting its pursuit of the defenders northward toward that town, thus trying to cut off the Teuton forces heading for the Stanislaw-Lemberg railway, now their only avenue of escape.

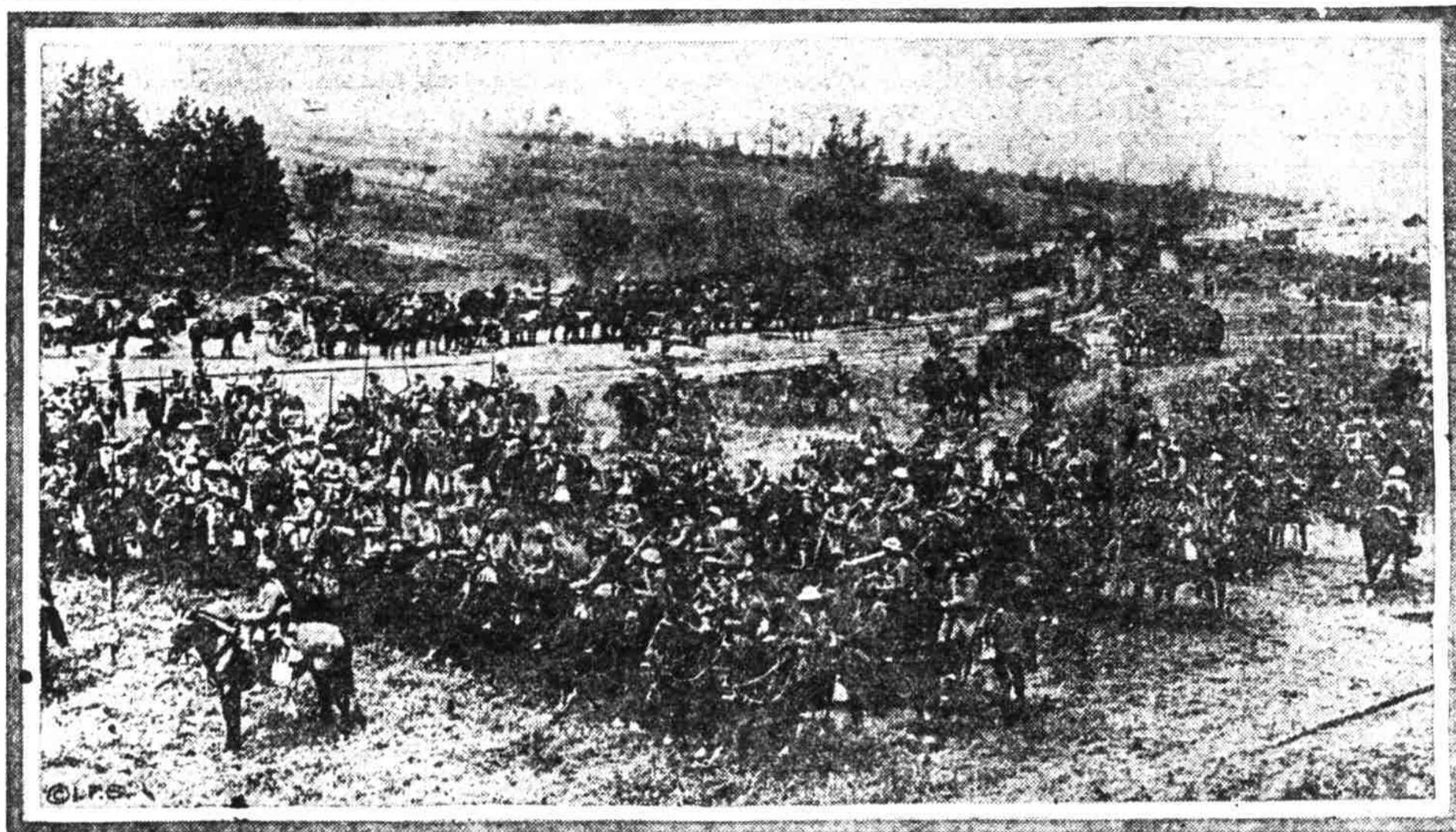
In their drive on Lemberg, whose capture forms the basic aim of General Brusilov's strategy on the Galician front, the Russians have since the fall of Brody advanced to within 42 miles of the city from the south, east and to within a little more than 60 miles from the north.

The most important success achieved in the northern is the capture of the town of Kosovoff. After crossing the Strypa, the Russians have only 20 miles to advance to Brzezany on the Zlota Lipa. From this town a railway leads directly northwest to Lemberg, only 45 miles away.

Austrians Silent on Subject. Tonight's official Austrian statement makes no mention of the recent gains reported above on the strength of Petrograd's official report. Vienna merely states that General Boehm-Ermoloff's army repulsed a strong enemy attack. This army forms the right wing of Field Marshal von Hindenburg's forces and extends to the region west of Tarnopol where it rejoins Archduke Karl's left wing.

It does not, therefore, come within the province of the territory in which the Russian gains are recorded. In Volhynia, west of Kaskhova, the Austrians, according to the Vienna statement carried out a successful surprise attack, capturing 170 prisoners and three machine guns. South of Stobychova (northwest of Kovel) Russian attempts to cross the Stokhoff broke down under the Teuton barrier fire.

FRENCH TROOPS PUSH BACK GERMAN LINES ON FOUR-MILE FRONT

Smashing Advance Near Hardecourt Regarded as Most Important Achievement.

Paris, Aug. 12.—(U. P.)—French troops struck a great blow north of the Somme today.

Smashing the German lines on a front of about four miles the French advanced their lines from 500 to 1,000 yards, the war office announced tonight. The advance was made from a point east of Hardecourt to Esnoourt.

The captured trenches comprise the German third positions, almost from the point where the French troops link up with the British to the River Somme. The advance is the most important scored by the French since the early days of the Somme offensive.

At the hour when detachments were filed to the war office tonight, two German prisoners and 20 machine guns had been brought in. The new French lines extend from the southern slope of Hill 109, along the road from Clercy to Maurepas, linking up with the front line yesterday in the fighting around Hem wood. The Germans counter attack unsuccessfully between Clercy and Maurepas.

WAR CORRESPONDENT IS GIVEN REAL THRILL IN GERMAN PLANE

Aeroplanes Demonstrates How Teutons Are Checkmating Russian Attack on Kovel.

Headquarters of General von Linsingen's Army, near Kovel, via Berlin, Aug. 12.—(U. P.)—Flying at a dizzy height far above the Volynian battlefield I observed today the machine-like precision with which the Germans are checkmating every movement made by the Russians in their desperate effort to capture the great railway center of Kovel.

A fleet of two score German aeroplanes climbed skyward and disappeared in the direction of the battle line east of Kovel when our party arrived at the aviation ground. They were off to drop bombs on the Mielchajolowa railway communications and to attack Russian troops by swooping low and riddling their ranks with machine gun fire.

It was the first time correspondents of the German front had been permitted to see German aeroplanes in action. An officer, just returned from the fighting line, volunteered to take me through the stunts he had performed during air battles around Verduin.

Ascot Is Thrilling.

Wrapped in furs and wadded coats I took the observer's seat in a huge aeroplane. Two heavy straps were fastened about my shoulders. The officer, in a single gasp, gave the command, the motors hummed and then like a streak of lightning we were literally pulled from the field.

It was like riding a slide the tail of a giant airplane. We mounted so quickly I lost my breath but regained it as the plane drifted half a mile above earth, circling the city and then pointed itself in the direction of the battle front.

Noncombatants are not permitted to view the actual fighting from the air. For that reason, when we had proceeded a few miles, the machine suddenly and sharply turned eastward like a sky-rocket. The dive was made at such a terrific rate that it seemed as if we were about to splash in a river or plunge into a plowed field. But after a drop of 200 feet, made in a few seconds, the plane tilted upward again and we glided over fields and roads as easily as if we were riding in a comfortable limousine.

Great Activity Seen.

Below in thin streams, columns of troops were on route to the front. There was great activity behind the German front as far as the eye could reach. There was no confusion anywhere. Everything moved like a cog in a great machine.

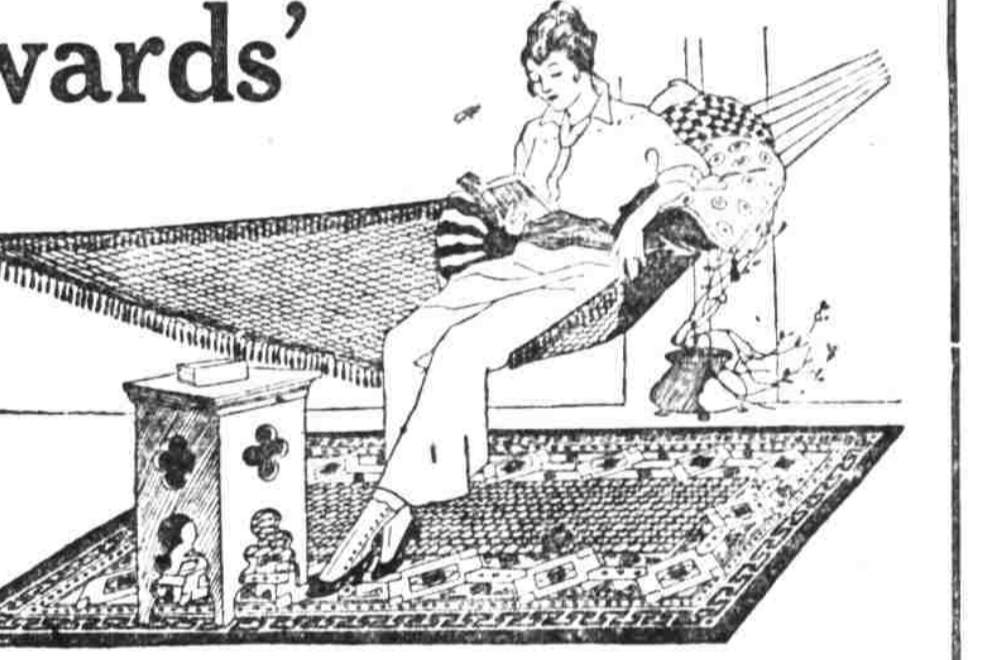
Automobile Turns Over.
