The women of all nations are ready to begin the work of reconstruction after the conflict. The fact that our own women have responded so gloriously to the call for help in other countries, and brought us much more closely in touch with them.

Never in the life of our country have we been so united and sympathetically into world relations. We have stepped from nationalism to internationalism, and have opened the avenue of communication through a body of women, who number in the United States alone 5,000,000. The added 2,000,000 of the general Federation will give courage to all who have at heart the amelioration of conditions abroad, both moral and physical.

There will be no loss of individuality, rather will each organization contribute its individual strength to the cooperation of all women. The national council welcomes the federation as a finely organized and effective body of women, ready to solve the problems before the world.
