

## ALLEGED EX-GUNMAN IS UNDER ARREST ON WHITE SLAVE CHARGE

Charge Is in Connection With  
Trip of Mulatto Woman  
From Tennessee to Coast.

### EXTORTION HINTED ALSO

Police Also Fear Disgrace Has Met  
Man Who Is Believed to Be Victim  
of Gang; Arrests Are Made.

San Francisco, Aug. 16.—(P. N. S.)—Nicholas Collins, alias Polaski, alleged one-time member of the "Gyp The Blood" gang of New York, murderer of Herman Rosenthal, the gambler, is under arrest in this city on a charge of violating the Mann white slave act. Federal officials admit they are investigating Collins' connection with a gang of extortionists who recently operated in Seattle.

Collins appeared before Federal Judge Dooling today. He was recently indicted for transporting Mabel White from Seattle to Texas.

According to the federal officials, Collins is suspected of being one of three men who last May fleeced Clifford Yarborough out of \$300 at Seattle. Collins, it is alleged, with two other men said to be under surveillance in the north, approached Yarborough and confronted him with evidence that he was guilty of white slave violations in bringing Eugenia Murray, a half breed negress, to Seattle from Pulaski, Tenn.

Yarborough, whose present whereabouts is unknown, gave the men \$300 rather than face prosecution. The girl was given a ticket to Chicago, where she met a police woman and sobbed out her story. The department of justice in Chicago investigated the girl's story and the arrest here of Collins and the two men at Seattle is believed to have been the result of their probe.

Yarborough was never heard of after his hurried departure from Seattle. The police of the Pacific coast fear that the gang of extortionists might have murdered him when they learned that Eugenia Murray had told her story to the authorities.

## Stefansson Will Remain in North

Arctic Traveler Will Continue to  
Explore Newly Discovered Land North  
of Prince Patrick Land.

Nome, Alaska, Aug. 16.—(P. N. S.)—Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the Arctic explorer, who went into the far north regions in the summer of 1913, will not return to civilization this year, according to word brought here by the Stefansson party, who arrived on the schooner Alaska during the night. Instead, he will continue to explore newly discovered land north of Prince Patrick land.

The party aboard the Alaska, under Dr. Rudolph Anderson, Stefansson's chief subordinate, has been exploring and charting the coast line bordering Union and Dolphin straits and the Coronation gulf region far to the east of the mouth of the McKenzie river.

All of the party on the Alaska, which left here in July, 1915, returned with the exception of Daniel Blue, engineer, who died on Ratley Island in May, 1915.

## Great Naval Act Is Ready for President

Bill Is Returned to Conference Com-  
mittee to Straighten Out Some  
Minor Matters After Passage.

Washington, Aug. 16.—(P. N. S.)—The senate today ratified the conference agreement on the naval bill, carrying \$315,000,000, and then returned it to the conference committee to settle minor differences between the house and senate on navy yard appropriations.

Secretary Daniels and other naval officials expressed gratification today over the passage of the bill.

"The building authorizations," said Daniels, "are the greatest ever passed in any country and will place the United States second among the world's navies."

## Husband Is Charged With Wife's Murder

Leon Harter Called Police July 26  
Telling Them Spouse Killed and He  
Shot by Mobster.

Pittsburg, Pa., Aug. 16.—(P. N. S.)—Leon Harter, a clothing salesman, is held on a charge of murder in connection with the death of his wife as a result of evidence submitted to a coroner's jury.

On the night of July 26, Harter called the police to his home. His wife was dead and he was shot in the leg. He said he and his wife were attacked by two men in the street near their home. Harter was taken to the hospital under guard and since has been kept under surveillance.

H. A. Van Amringe Buried.

Centralia, Wash., Aug. 16.—The funeral of H. A. Van Amringe, who died here Monday, was held this morning. He formerly lived in Portland, where he was in the moving picture business for eight years. Mr. Van Amringe, who has been a member of the Seattle Elks for over 20 years, was born in Cincinnati. He is survived by his wife, Mrs. Anna Van Amringe, and two children by a former wife, the latter are Harry V. Van Amringe of Newman, Cal., and Mrs. Joseph Stanhope of San Francisco.

## VALUE OF NATIONAL FOREST RESOURCES

Washington, Aug. 16.—Value of the national forest resources in Oregon, as estimated by the forest service, is \$120,000,000. Of this sum, \$115,765,762 is assigned to timber, while the value of grazing and forage is placed at \$4,234,237. These figures were brought out in connection with the tentative division of funds for forest roads made at a conference of forestry officials with members of congress from the forest states. Oregon's timber value is not rated so high as the timber in some other states, because a large part is at present far from transportation lines.

## MORGAN ANNOUNCES DETAILS OF BRITISH \$250,000,000 LOAN

Total of Securities Pledged  
Amount to \$300,000,000;  
Paper to Be Offered at 99.

New York, Aug. 16.—(U. P.)—Details of the new British loan were announced by Morgan & Co. today.

The issue will be for \$250,000,000 in two year five pound secured gold notes to be dated September 1, 1916, with interest payable semi-annually. At the option of the British government the notes may be redeemed in whole or in part on 30 days' notice on any day until and including August 31, 1917, at 101 and accrued interest and on any day thereafter until their expiration at 100% with accrued interest.

The loan will be secured by the deposit with the Farmers' Loan and Trust company of New York, of \$200,000,000 worth of securities which have been approved by Morgan & Co. A large part of these securities, it is understood, will consist of stocks and bonds of American corporations held in England and recently mobilized by the British government. One purpose of the loan is to stabilize exchange between the two countries.

The loan is the first ever negotiated by Great Britain here in which it was required that it be paid here by collateral. The collateral must include \$200,000,000 worth of American securities. Of this \$100,000,000 must be in securities either issued or guaranteed by the following governments: Argentina, Chile, Norway, Sweden, Switzerland, Denmark and Holland. If the value of these securities depreciate so as to impair the 20 per cent margin, more securities must be deposited as collateral.

## War Orphan Is on Her Way to Spokane

Child's Father Killed in Battle Off  
Jutland and Mother Died When She  
Heard the News.

New York, Aug. 16.—(P. N. S.)—Annette Harvey, a 7-year-old, freckle-faced little girl, fatherless and motherless since the naval battle off Jutland, who arrived here on the Anchor liner Tuscanian, today is speeding on the second half of her journey from Belfast to Spokane, where her only living relative awaits her.

Annette's father was killed during the clash of the English and German fleets in the North sea. Her mother died when she heard the news. Father died in Belfast cared for the child until Mrs. G. F. Delany, her mother's sister, wrote for her.

## Return of Warcraft Shows Crisis Past

San Diego, Cal., Aug. 16.—(U. P.)—That the Mexican situation has passed the critical stage is indicated in orders received by a number of the vessels of the United States Pacific fleet now on patrol duty in southern waters to return to this port in the next few days.

The collier Brutus will arrive at 7 p. m. today; the cruiser Colorado will drop anchor in the harbor next Friday, and the cruiser Milwaukee, flagship of the torpedo flotilla, and the destroyers, Hull, Hopkins, Tuxton, Whipple, Preble, Stewart and Paul Jones will sail from La Paz on August 18 for this port.

The flagship San Diego, with Admiral William B. Cagerton on board, will arrive August 25 and will probably be followed by most of the remaining vessels of the fleet in a short time.

The seven bluejackets suffering from malarial fever, who were on the Brutus, recovered sufficiently for transfer to the Milwaukee at La Paz.

Germans Sent to Trieste.

Paris, Aug. 16.—(P. N. S.)—Germany has taken over the defense of Trieste and is sending troops especially organized for that purpose, according to a dispatch received by the Temps today from Milan.

Conferences Will Be Delayed.

Mexico City, Aug. 16.—(U. P.)—Justice Brandeis' refusal to serve on the commission to settle America-Mexican difficulties will delay the conferences indefinitely, Foreign Secretary Aguilar, said today.
