SUGAR CLIMBS FASTEST

In Most Instances Staple Articles of
Food Show Substantial Upward
Jumps Over 12 Years Ago.

Salem, Or., Aug. 16.—Sugar is one of the things that has greatly increased in price during the biennial period ending June 30, according to figures compiled by Labor Commissioner Hoff. Figures for sugar and other products are given as far back as 1904. While bacon was much higher in price than 1904, the price this year was somewhat less than in 1914.

BEND VOTES BONDS TO BUY RIGHT OF WAY FOR STRAHORN ROAD

Citizens Show at Election
That They Are Behind the
Project as Now Outlined.

CITY LIMITS EXTENDED

Improvement of Streets and Laying of
Sewers Also Included in Measures
Given Support of the Electors.

Bend, Or., Aug. 16.—Bend signified its intention of cooperating with Robert E. Strahorn, promoter of the Oregon, California & Eastern railroad, to the extent of \$25,000, when the citizens Tuesday voted a bond issue to that amount, which will be devoted to the purchase of terminals, easements and rights of way within the city limits. The vote was 156 to 21. The vote was light, little interest being shown, in view of the certainty of the carrying of the measure.

By a vote of 102 to 102, all the platted areas adjoining the present city limits were annexed to the municipality, which brings into the corporation limits a population exceeding 1000 persons, and an estimated assessed valuation in property of \$100,000.

In only one district was much opposition manifested. The vote to amend the city charter to provide for a method for the improvement of streets and laying of sewers, upon a petition of a majority of the property owners to be benefited, and to provide for a payment of the costs of 20 semi-annual payments, carried by a vote of 195 to 18.

Progress in carrying out subsequent details relative to the Strahorn road, so far as Bend is concerned, will be made, now that the bond issue has carried. Right of way has been received here for all the territory from Bend to Riley, and work will begin at once to have the right of way deeds signed in the territory through which the road will run.

Former Marshfield Man Dies in Battle

Lieutenant James Grant Ferguson,
Graduate of Stanford, Killed While
Leading Charge at Longueval.

San Francisco, Aug. 16.—(P. N. S.)—While two other brothers fought their way through a storm of shot and shell that deluged the famous black watch, highland infantry, in the British offensive before Longueval on July 14, Second Lieutenant James Grant Ferguson, aged 27, graduate of Stanford university in the class of '08, was killed while leading his platoon in a charge. He was buried in the village near which he fell.

Ferguson was the son of R. Arkley Ferguson of Ethelbert, Broughty Ferry, Scotland, and the nephew of Mrs. Fairclough wife of Professor Henry R. Fairclough, head of the Latin department at Stanford.

Following his graduation from Stanford, Ferguson held the principalship of the Marshfield, Or., high school for a year or more before going to Johns Hopkins university, for his medical course.
