DEMURRAGE RATE ON FREIGHT CARS RAISED ON O. S. L. RAILROAD

Intermountain Demurrage Bureau Says the Current Rate Has Been Too Low.

Salem, Or., Aug. 17.—Word was received by the state public service commission Wednesday from the Intermountain Demurrage Bureau of Salt Lake that an advance from \$1 to \$2 per day on demurrage on freight cars had been made effective on the Oregon Short Line's interstate shipments. This makes the rate the same as that which has been in effect in Oregon.

In the letter of notification, the bureau says that \$1 is too low. It estimates the yearly earning capacity of a car, exclusive of Sundays, at \$592, whereas the demurrage collected at the rate of \$1 per day would total only \$365.

Digest of Labor Laws.

Salem, Or., Aug. 17.—Labor Commissioner Hoff has had a sufficient number of the eighth edition of the digest of labor laws of Oregon published to supply any and all persons desiring a copy. The little book contains 32 pages and it is intended to assist employees and employers in following the laws for the protection of labor. It will be mailed upon application.

Change in Text Books.

Salem, Or., Aug. 17.—Strayer's "A Brief Course in the Teaching Process" is to be replaced by Gesell's "The Normal Child and Primary Education" as the textbook on theory and practice of teaching in which those taking the teachers' examination in June, July, 1917, are required to pass. Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill said Wednesday. The questions on theory of teaching for the December examination will be taken from the Strayer text, while the Gesell text will be the source of the questions for the June-July examination.
