He was a member of the volunteer fire department of early days in this city, and pitched against Joseph Buchtel in the first public baseball match in Portland.

High School Boys On Border May Get the Usual Credits

Salem, Or., Aug. 18.—Announcement was made today by Superintendent of Public Instruction Churchill that arrangements had been perfected for high school students with the Third regiment, Oregon National Guard, to go ahead and studies while on duty at the border, and obtain credits. The state superintendent's action in the matter followed receipt of a letter from Rev. W. S. Gilbert, chaplain of the regiment, saying that he contemplated inaugurating a regimental school for students, and asking if arrangements could be made to give them credits in their high school work. Superintendent Churchill forwarded to the chaplain today the high school course of study and told him to go ahead and start his school, and that credits would be forthcoming.

Imperial Chancellor to Distribute Meat

Regulation Passed Last May Forms Basis of Measures for Distribution and Consumption for Whole Empire. Berlin, Aug. 18.—(I. N. S.)—It is officially announced that a change which has been voted by the Bundsrath in the proclamation of March 27 concerning the distribution of meat, empowers the imperial chancellor himself to undertake the distribution, which hitherto has been left to communities.

The regulation forms the basis of measures for the distribution and consumption of meat for the whole empire. Cleveland Trades With Washington. New York, Aug. 18.—(U. P.)—Secretary McRoy of the Cleveland Indians today announced the trade of Elmer Smith and Joe Leonard to Washington for Joe Borching, the Senators' south paw and Danny Moeller. No cash was involved in the deal. The Cleveland players will report to Washington and the latter's men to the Indians immediately.

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Roumanian Lines Buying Steel Rails

Output of the German Mills in July Amounted to More Than Last Year but Less Than 1914. Berlin, via Sayville, Aug. 18.—(I. N. S.)—Roumanian state railroads have contracted with the German Steel Works Union for from 25,000 to 30,000 tons of steel rails. The output of German iron works for July amounted to 1,134,000 tons, against 1,047,000 tons last year and 1,562,000 tons in 1914.
