

SECRETARY OF WAR TO HURRY PAYMENT TO SOLDIERS' FAMILIES

Large Discretionary Powers
Given in Distribution of Ap-
propriation of \$2,000,000.

STANDARDS TO BE FIXED

Amount Paid Must Not Be More Than
Soldier Had Contributed Monthly
to Support of His Family.

Washington, Aug. 19.—(Washington Bureau of The Journal.)—Unusual discretionary power is given to the secretary of war in the provision of the army bill which authorizes the payment of funds to the dependent families of soldiers in the federal service. The bill is again before congress, having been disapproved by the president in regard to another feature.

Upon Secretary Baker devolves the responsibility of saying how this money shall be spent. He is given authority to prescribe regulations and his decision is final. It is expressly provided that there shall be no appeal to the courts.

The amount paid must not be more than the soldier has been contributing monthly to the support of his family at the time of his being called or drafted into the service of the United States. In the case of national guardsmen, or during his enlistment period in the regular army at the time of such call or draft of the organized militia or national guard. In the case of a soldier of the regular establishment.

Rules Must Be Established.
Thus Secretary Baker must prescribe some form whereby the amount the soldier has been contributing to his family may be determined. Also, he must provide means for showing what amount is necessary. It appears, irrespective of the amount the soldier has contributed. What the soldier paid for his family support is merely the maximum of what may be paid.

These are some of the questions the secretary's regulations will have to answer: For proof of what the soldier paid for his family's support at the time of enlistment be shown by affidavit of the soldier, or of members of the dependent family or of both?

Should the evidence be allowed, and if so, who shall judge the case? How shall an amount "deemed necessary" be established? Should payment be made on a graduated scale, according to the number of dependents in the family, or should evidence be required as to the specific need in each case?

It is no secret that Secretary Baker does not relish the task that is set for him. Whatever standards he fixes, there is sure to be criticism from those who believe some other set of rules should have been adopted. There will necessarily be delay in making proof concerning dependence of the family, the necessity of relief, and the sum that should be paid.

It is the policy of the department to expedite the payment as much as possible, and it is believed that no unnecessary red tape will be used. That the purpose of the appropriation will be carried out. The section of the bill making the appropriation reads as follows:

"That the sum of \$2,000,000 is hereby appropriated, out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated, to be expended under the direction of the secretary of war, and under such rules and regulations as he may prescribe, for the support of, at a cost of not more than \$50 per month, or so much of said amount as the secretary of war may deem necessary, and not more than such enlisted man has been contributing monthly to the support of his family at the time of his being called or drafted into the service of the United States or during his enlistment period in the regular army at the time of such call or draft of the organized militia or national guard called or drafted into the service of the United States until his discharge from such service, and the family of each enlisted man of the regular army until his discharge from active service thereon or until the discharge of the organized militia or national guard from such service if such enlisted man is at that time in active service in the regular army, which family during the term of service of such enlisted man has no other income, except the pay of such enlisted man, adequate for the support of said family."

clearing house and secretary of the Oregon State Bankers' association. It is stated that the net earnings of state banks last year was only 3.8 per cent on their entire capital and surplus, while 22 banks showed actual loss.

There is proposed, however, under a senate amendment, a special license tax of 50 cents on each \$1000 of capital stock, undivided profits and surplus of all corporations, with an extension of \$100,000. This tax would not be exclusively upon bankers and banks, but upon all corporations except the munitions plants, which are separated from the rest of the industry by such a tax would yield \$5,000,000 a year.

The revenue bill in the senate committee has undergone many changes of minor character, and the final form of the bill may see other changes made. Where a change is made in one place, subtracting from the revenue estimated to be needed, another alteration must be made to make up the deficiency so created.

HUGHES' CHARGE THAT SOUTH IS FAVORED BY CONGRESS DISPROVED

Washington, Aug. 19.—In his speech at Butte, Mont., Charles E. Hughes read a list of chairmen of committees in the present congress to show that southern Democrats are in control. The present administration is not American, he said.

No one will dispute the accuracy of his committee lists. The public may recall, however, that while southern Democrats constituted the chief opposition to the child labor bill, they failed to bring it to a vote. The bill was passed by the administration.

ASTORIA DOCUMENTED GREATER TONNAGE IN YEAR ENDING JUNE 30

Annual Report of Deputy Col-
lector of Customs Is For-
warded to Washington.

Astoria, Or., Aug. 19.—Charles H. Haddix, deputy collector of customs in charge of the Astoria offices, has submitted to the department at Washington his annual report for the fiscal year ending June 30 covering the documenting of vessels here.

The report shows that during the year 12 sailing vessels with a total gross tonnage of 12,511, 22 steam vessels with a total gross tonnage of 18,152, and 80 gas vessels with a total gross tonnage of 1739 were documented here, a total of 114 vessels.

During the preceding year 115 vessels with a total gross tonnage of 31,719 were documented here. This shows that during the fiscal year just closed the tonnage has been considerably increased.

"I have traveled some in other coun-
tries but I have seen nothing to equal
this road," said James A. Baker of
Houston, Texas, yesterday afternoon
on his return from a ride over the
Columbia river highway.

Mr. Baker, or Captain Baker as he is best known at home, is one of the leading attorneys of the southwest. He is attorney for the Hartman lines in Texas and the receiver for the International & Great Northern railroad. With Mrs. Baker and their children, he spent the day in Portland yesterday.

"I would not like to undertake the task of hunting up words to describe the highway's charms," said Captain Baker. "The more the world is brought to the highway the more travelers will be attracted to it."

"I was in Portland about 20 years ago the last time and many changes have certainly taken place. One would hardly recognize the city as the place I saw 20 years ago."

"It appears to me, with the limited time I have had to make observations and to look things over here, that this is to be one of the great cities along the Pacific coast and that it is now on the verge of big forward movements. With us in Texas when cotton is bringing a fair price everyone is happy and things boom. Your prosperity, I take it, depends largely on the activity of the lumber trade. We are also great lumber producers in Texas. I believe that there is every reason to think that the lumber business will grow better rapidly from now on. There are many things which I have ever enjoyed a more delightful climate."

Applications for Lower Rates Denied

Interstate Commerce Commission Holds
That Tariffs Effective Through Sus-
pension of Canal Traffic Should Rule.

Washington, Aug. 19.—(I. N. S.)—Following its usual policy of holding that transcontinental freight rates on general merchandise should be maintained at a comparatively higher level because of suspensions of traffic through the Panama canal, the Interstate Commerce commission yesterday denied specific applications for several transcontinental lines to reduce the rates.

Among the applications denied were: To reduce rates from New York city to the Pacific coast on canned goods, iron and steel articles, paints, paper and other commodities, from California to the Atlantic coast on wines, grape juice, sugar, grain, canned goods, dried fruits, cereals and rice.

HUSBAND KILLS YOUNG MAN HE DISCOVERS IN HOUSE WITH HIS WIFE

J. F. Allen, of Hereford,
Baker County, Surrenders
After Shooting Lewis Butts

Baker, Or., Aug. 19.—O. C. Koonits of Hereford arrived here early last evening, having in custody J. F. Allen, who gave himself up to Koonits after shooting and killing Lewis Butts at Allen's home between Unity and Hereford in the afternoon.

Intimacy of Butts with Allen's wife is ascribed as the reason for the shooting. Otherwise he has little to say. Butts, a young man, had been employed on a ranch near Allen's home, some months.

District Attorney Godwin and Coroner West have gone out to investigate. After shooting Butts, Allen immediately went to Koonits, a former peace officer, telling him of the crime and requesting that he be brought to jail.

Allen's story is that Butts had been paying his wife attention and had threatened to kill him. Allen went hunting this morning and, on returning home, found Butts in the house with his wife. He drew a rifle on Butts. His wife sprang between them. Allen fired, the bullet striking Butts in the breast, and also hitting Mrs. Allen, clipping off one of her fingers. Butts fell dead just outside, according to Allen's story. Allen helped his wife bandage her hand and went immediately to Koonits' place.

Allen greatly feared lynching at the hands of Butts' friends, he told the officers, and said he had not breathed freely until he was put in jail.

Mrs. Allen is a member of the La-Porte family, wealthy residents of the upper Burnt river section.
