

PORTLAND STOCKYARD EXPENDS LARGE SUM IN NEW BUILDINGS

Three Structures Are Under Construction at an Estimated Cost of \$150,000.

EXCHANGE PROGRESSING

Anticipating a large increase in the activities and commercial importance of the industry in the northwest within the next few years, the Portland Union Stockyards company is rapidly enlarging facilities to meet the situation.

Construction amounting to over \$150,000 is now in progress at the Portland Union stockyards in north Portland.

Work on the first unit of the livestock exchange building, which is to be completed before the first of the year, is progressing smoothly and the foundation work is nearly completed.

Work is also progressing on the new scale house, which R. L. McGee, assistant secretary, will be equipped with the largest set of scales west of Denver.

Additional hay barns are also being built, providing capacity for 500 tons of hay in addition to present facilities.

WILLAMETTE VALLEY BEST FOR LOGANBERRY, VIEW OF J. S. EXPERT

George M. Darrow, Investigator of Department of Agriculture, Visits Albany.

Albany, Or., Aug. 21.—George M. Darrow, horticulturist and horticultural investigator of the United States department of agriculture, Washington, D. C., spent Saturday in this city and vicinity looking over the loganberry industry.

Mr. Darrow came to Albany at the request of George G. Brown of the local loganberry juice plant and carried on investigations here that he has been pursuing all through western Washington, Oregon and California. He has had the advantage of seeing the possible areas and the most favorable conditions for the loganberry industry, and he is already convinced that the soil and climatic conditions of this section excel any other part of the country.

Mr. Darrow's visit is in the interest of the grower. His investigations of the approach to the fruit crop, the conditions and manner of treatment to assist the grower to determine the most desirable soil, and how to prepare the land and plant yards and train and cultivate the loganberry plant so as to produce the largest quality of berry and give the largest possible yield to the grower.

Small Cyclone Visits.

GERMAN DIVER SINKS TWO LIGHT CRUISERS IN NORTH SEA BRUSH

British, in Turn, Claim to Have Destroyed One Submarine and Rammed One.

London, Aug. 21.—Two British light cruisers and a German submarine were sunk and another U boat rammed when the German and British high seas fleets came within a few sea miles of each other in the North sea Saturday.

The two cruisers, the Nottingham and Falmouth, were destroyed by submarine attacks, according to an official statement by the admiralty last night.

The British naval forces were searching for the German high seas fleet, which, these statements say, came out on learning from their scouts that British forces were in considerable strength, avoided an engagement and returned to port.

Thirty-eight members of the crew of the cruiser Nottingham are missing and are believed to have been drowned. All of her officers as well as the whole complement of the Falmouth were killed, though one of her stokers died of injuries.

The German admiralty, in a brief statement issued last night, in which no reference is made to an action in the North sea, announced the destruction by a German submarine of a "small cruiser and destroyer," adding that another small cruiser and a battleship were damaged by torpedoes.

The Nottingham displaced 5400 tons and was built in 1912. Her length was 480 feet and beam 49 feet. The Falmouth, built in 1910, displaced 5200 tons and had a complement of 376 officers and men. Her dimensions were practically the same as those of the Nottingham.

Dallas, Or., Aug. 21.—Madame Schumann-Heink will tell the Polk county jury in the Nickum ranch case today in a trial which is expected to be a long one. The famous contralto, who is in Oregon to buy a farm, Saturday looked over the property best known as the Mount Desert Island. It is a highly improved piece of ground covering 500 acres and for a long time was planted to hops but of late, since the sale of the land to the Nickum ranch, has been given over to the production of fruit. She made no intimation, however, whether or not she would invest in this property. It is located near the town of Polk county.

He and his friends were not sick. "I only feel tired," he said. Mr. Carnegie's doctor, who accompanied him constantly and is always within call, declined to talk about the patient.
