New York Woman Officer Uses Disclosure to Effect Arrest, Which Discloses More of Inside of Vice Trust.

New York, Aug. 21.—(U. P.)—Wearing a blonde wig to hide her brunette locks and with her cheeks heavily rouged, Miss Ida Lippman, probation officer at the Magdalen Home for Wayward Girls, aided District Attorney Swann in making an important arrest yesterday in the investigation of the New York vice trust.

John Larido, alias José María, a waiter, was the man arrested. According to Swann, Larido's arrest revealed the fact that more than 100 waiters in downtown hotels and restaurants were preying upon women of the streets.

Five Negroes, Two of Them Women, Killed

Florida Mob Makes Short Work of Those Suspected of Assisting Negro Slayer of Constable to Escape.

Gainesville, Fla., Aug. 21.—(U. P.)—Five negroes, two of them women, were forcibly removed from jail at New Berry, Fla., by a mob Saturday and hanged. The lynching party resulted from the killing of a constable and the shooting of a deputy constable.
