ASTORIA IS GETTING READY FOR ANNUAL REGATTA SEPT. 1 TO 4

Decorations Going Up and Carnival Center Being Enclosed.

DIVERS WILL TAKE PART

Harley Bungalow Will Be at Disposal of Queen Muriel During Her Reign Over the Festival Galities.

Astoria, Or., Aug. 29.—Astoria is rapidly taking on its regatta attire, for the show September 1, 2, 3 and 4. Business fronts are being elaborately decorated with the regatta colors, blue and white, intermingled with the American flag and emblems, while the great carnival center at Seventh, Duane and Eighth streets is being enclosed for the many attractions to be presented. A mammoth grandstand has been erected on the O.W.R. & N. dock in front of which will be staged the official races and water sports, and the marine parade and fireworks. The preparations for regatta days are going on coincidentally with the immense reclamation work now in progress.

Visitors Will See Improvements.

Visitors to Astoria this year will be shown a city going up. Scores of buildings in the business center are being raised to conform to the new street grade, while the work of construction of the viaduct system of street improvements proceeds.

Queen Muriel will have a palace. Through the courtesy of Mrs. F. F.
