

WILSON EXPECTED TO CARRY LINN COUNTY BY SEVERAL HUNDRED

Predicted Combined Taft-Roosevelt Vote Will Not Be Cast for Judge Hughes.

HUGHES IS NOT POPULAR

Many Remember His Disregard of Laborers and Material Men in Railroad Case 20 Years Ago.

Albany, Or., Aug. 30.—Woodrow Wilson will carry Linn county in November in a straight fight against Charles E. Hughes, just as he carried it in 1912 in the three-cornered fight against Taft and Roosevelt.

This is the consensus of opinion as expressed by those who have been watching the development of the presidential campaign unblinded by partisan hopes or connections but who have formed their beliefs from the gist of what they have heard.

For one thing Mr. Hughes is not popular among many of the old time residents of Albany and Corvallis who gained their opinion of him when he came out from New York some 20 years ago to bid in the Oregon Pacific railroad property, then in the hands of a receiver.

Arbitrary Attitude Remembered. At that time the interests of the bondholders, whom he represented, ran counter to claims held against the road by those who had constructed it with their labor or the materials which they had furnished, and the arbitrary attitude of Lawyer Hughes for the bondholders and against the laborers has left a lasting memory.

And it is also a fact that there are a great many newcomers who voted the Progressive ticket in 1912 who will not support Mr. Hughes.

In 1912 President Wilson was given 2134 votes in Linn county while Mr. Taft was given 1301 and Roosevelt 1229. In other words the combined Taft and Roosevelt vote was 396 larger than Wilson's vote in the county.

Normal G. O. P. Lead 400. Linn county's registered Republican majority ranges from 1,500 to 2,000 above the Democratic registration figures, but Republican leaders in the county claim it is "normally Republican" in county contests by approximately 400 votes. This is the figure that they are guessing for the November presidential election.

If you ask those who are closely concerned with the Hughes campaign in Linn county what the November result will be, they with surprising unanimity make answer that he will carry the county by the normal Republican vote. When you ask for figures they say "about 400."

Wilson Decidedly Popular. From this it is easily seen that the leaders are counting on the combined Taft and Roosevelt vote of four years ago being cast for Hughes. No one who has listened to Senator Fulton's "ground swell" of public opinion in the county believes that this will come to pass.

It is not the talk you hear about the Depot hotel, where the railroad men gather to eat and pass the time of day. There you hear tales of straw votes taken among the railroad men which gave 96 out of hundred votes to

Wilson and of other stories which would lead to the belief that there are going to be more than 396 of the votes cast for Taft or Roosevelt in 1912 which will be cast for Wilson in 1916.

Undercurrent of Revolt. If you spin yarns with the average man you meet on the street, the farmer or with his produce, or the dairyman with his cream, you hear the same undercurrent of revolt.

"There are lots of Progressives out in my part of the country," one says in answer to a question as to what he hears about things political. "We are for peace, and Wilson has kept us out of war," is the expression of another.

"There are a lot of Republicans who are disappointed in the fair-riding campaign of Mr. Hughes," says another, "this time a businessman. They say that Wilson has done as well as any man could under the circumstances of the past three years, and they can see no cause for change unless Mr. Hughes can show more reason than he has yet expressed."

Wilson May Turn Tables. With that kind of sentiment rampant in the county a paper majority of 396 votes constitutes a pretty slim foundation upon which to build hopes for final results favorable to Mr. Hughes. Those who make claims of political prognostication say that they expect President Wilson to turn the tables and put those 396 votes in his own column in November.

Sale of Shore Lands Stops. Salem, Or., Aug. 30.—The state land board decided at a meeting Tuesday to sell no more Columbia river lands. Instead, the lands will be leased.

ABUNDANCE OF SNOW ASSURES WATER FOR IRRIGATION PROJECT

Manager Wallace Reports It Four Feet Deep in Crater Creek Watershed.

DRIFTS ARE 20 FEET DEEP

Morson Land Company Pays \$30,000 in Bonds to Provide Funds for Further Development.

Salem, Or., Aug. 30.—There is an abundance of snow in the Crater creek watershed, of the Tumalo irrigation project, Fred N. Wallace, project manager, reported to the state desert land board Tuesday. Snow is four feet deep on the level and there are drifts 20 feet deep, Wallace said.

The fact that this snow remained in the mountains this year means that there will be a plentiful supply of water in 1917, Wallace believes. It was unnecessary to use the supply of water from Crater creek on the project this year, the other source being sufficient.

Notification was read from J. E. Morson, of the Morson land company, operating near LaPine, that bonds secured on part of the project had been issued to provide \$30,000 for use in developing the project.

Car Shortage Complaint Made. Salem, Or., Aug. 30.—The G. H. P. Lumber company, of Hillsboro, which took over the interests of the Hillsboro Lumber company, complained to the public service commission Tuesday that the Southern Pacific had taken away seven of the 13 cars it had been using in log transportation and the result has been that expenses have nearly doubled as the company has been unable to work the logging crew to advantage. The company says it cannot shut down as the tract it is working on must be logged off by January 1, 1917. The company also complains of a lack of cars for shipping lumber.

Old Resident Dies. Salem, Or., Aug. 30.—Thomas Jennings, a resident of the vicinity of Salem since 1875, is dead. He was 65 years old. Death was due to pneumonia. He is survived by a widow, two daughters and a son.

Flax Information Asked. Salem, Or., Aug. 30.—The Puget Sound Traction, Light & Power company, of Bellingham, Wash., Tuesday requested information from Secretary of State Olcott relative to the flax industry at the state prison. The company says it is investigating the possibilities of flax culture for the Puget Sound district.

Tucker Spring Does Not Supply Enough Water and Source Once Examined, Now Pure, Is Again Used. Hood River, Or., Aug. 30.—The Tucker spring that was piped into the city at a cost of approximately \$100,000 has failed to supply the city with the needed water for the season and water from the old Coo spring that was formerly the city's sole supply has been daily pumped into the city reservoir for domestic use.

The old Coo spring was at one time condemned by the officers of the state board of health and local authorities, but an analysis made of the water recently by the officers of the state board of health shows the water to be pure, containing about the same number of bacilli as the Tucker spring. The city authorities have ordered the old Coo spring properly protected as its use has become a necessity.

Watchman Fires on Robbers; Wounded. Alfred Minnick, 70, of La Grande, Gets Bullet Near Heart, but Is Expected to Recover.

La Grande, Or., Aug. 30.—Several robbers entered the Union county cooperative store at Evans Monday night and in their effort to escape were shot at by Alfred Minnick, watchman at the store. One of the robbers returned the fire in close range and a bullet entered Mr. Minnick's chest near the heart and lodged in his arm.

Mr. Minnick, who is near 70 years of age, sleeps in the store. He heard the robbers and immediately fired, but evidently missed. Sheriff Marvin was on the trail within an hour and a half after the shooting, but no arrests have been made to date.

The victim of the shooting has a good chance to recover, despite his advanced age.

Accused Pastor Had Church at Medford. Bev. A. A. Holmes, Charged by California Girl With Improper Conduct, Had Trouble While in Oregon.

Medford, Or., Aug. 30.—Rev. A. A. Holmes, pastor of the First Baptist church, Modesto, Cal., charged by a young woman of that city with improper conduct toward her, was formerly pastor of the First Baptist church, Medford, here, for over an hour, it is alleged, about three years ago. Persistent effort at undue familiarity with women of the church was made by members of the congregation here.

Cottage Grove Now Has a Hughes Club. Supporters of Republican Nominee for President Organize at Enthusiastic Meeting Held Monday Night.

Cottage Grove, Or., Aug. 30.—A Hughes-Republican club was organized here Monday night with a large membership. The officers elected were: President, Elbert Bede; vice president, Mrs. Clara A. Burkholder; secretary, treasurer, Worth Harvey.

O. H. Foster, Fred E. Smith and Colonel W. G. D. Mercer of Eugene and Walter L. Toole of Salem made speeches. Considerable enthusiasm was displayed and the name of Hughes was repeatedly cheered.

Will Leave Malheur For Whitman Forest

Oliver M. Porter to Engage in Timber Reconnaissance Work Along Proposed Route of Sumpter Valley Extension. John Day, Or., Aug. 30.—Oliver M. Porter, employed on the Malheur national forest the past year in technical studies, has been transferred to the Whitman forest, effective September 1. For the next few months Mr. Porter will be engaged in timber reconnaissance work along the proposed route of the Sumpter valley railroad extension.

It is the general opinion that the extension will be made for the purpose of tapping an immense belt of government timber on the south fork of Burnt river. The forest service is making an intensive survey of the timber for the purpose of being in a position to complete negotiations for its disposal when the railroad extension is completed.

MRS. H. W. METZGER SAVES HOUSE GUEST FROM WATERY GRAVE

Tangled in Marsh Grass, Mrs. A. Schweitzer Sinks Twice Before Rescued.

Seaside, Or., Aug. 30.—By almost superhuman efforts, Mrs. Henry W. Metzger, daughter of Marcus Fieschner and niece of I. N. Fieschner, Tuesday saved from drowning Mrs. Albert Schweitzer, formerly Miss Ruth Schiel of Portland after she herself had been dragged under the water four times in two successive attempts and Mrs. Schweitzer had also gone down an equal number of times. Mrs. Metzger was formerly Miss Flora Fieschner.

Mrs. Schweitzer and Mrs. Metzger, members of a picnic party given by the families of I. N. Fieschner and Max Fieschner on the shores of West, and Johnson's lake near Sunset beach, were in swimming. Mrs. Schweitzer, in diving, became entangled in marsh grass and went down twice in her efforts to extricate herself.

Mrs. Metzger abandoned the first attempt and swam ashore after both had gone both had again gone down twice, succeeded in rescuing her friend.

Mrs. Metzger is small but very strong, the result of athletic pursuits. She is credited with having one of the finest soprano voices in Portland, and to her ability to breathe deeply, engendered by her musical training, is given the credit for her successful efforts to save Mrs. Schweitzer.
