

ATTORNEY IS CHARGED WITH ABUSING HIS CLIENT'S CONFIDENCE

Woman Alleges She Was Forced to Accept Worthless Property for Judgment.

ALLAN R. JOY IS ACCUSED

Philomina Bolter Makes Complaint in Suit Filed in the Circuit Court.

Allan R. Joy, attorney, is charged with abusing the confidence of a client, in a suit filed in the circuit court yesterday by Philomina Bolter. She claims that Joy forced her to accept worthless property in satisfaction of a judgment of \$1875.15, and that the attorney kept two automobiles and some bonds given for the judgment by the losing litigant.

Attorney Joy represented Mrs. Bolter in a suit against the Michigan Auto & Buggy company, in which the judgment was obtained. The attorney is accused of telling Mrs. Bolter that the company could not pay in cash, but would give her a lot worth \$3000. She claims that the lot is not worth the taxes. The complaint states that Joy received three automobiles and some bonds from the company, and that he traded one machine for the lot. The attorney retained the two autos and the bonds, Mrs. Bolter says.

ESCAPE FROM COUNTY JAIL

Two Trustees Flee at an Early Hour of the Morning.

Two trustees, Ralph Ecker and Arthur Schmidling, escaped from the Multnomah county jail at an early hour this morning. Their escape was noticed shortly afterward by Jailer Clyde Rupert, and deputy sheriffs are scouring the country today in an effort to apprehend them.

HUSBAND ACCUSES WIFE

William George Files a Suit for Divorce Today.

Charging that his wife danced with men until midnight, refused to wash clothes and accosted men on the street, William George filed suit for divorce this morning against his wife, Florence George. The husband says that the dancing was a nuisance in the neighborhood, and that it greatly humiliated him. He charges that his wife destroyed clothes instead of washing them, and brought strange men from the street to their home while the husband was away.

They were married in Portland in April, 1914. The husband seeks the custody of the 1-year-old child.

WOULD SWIM WITH WHITES

Beatrice H. Canady, Colored, Sues to Have Rule Abolished.

A suit against the school board was filed in the circuit court this morning by Beatrice H. Canady, colored. She asks an injunction restraining the board from prohibiting her from the swimming tank at the Couch school on nights that are reserved for white people.

Saturday evening is set aside for negroes at the school tank and they are prohibited from its use on other nights.

COURT DEFENDS ORDINANCE

Injunction Against Taxicab Measure Is Denied.

Judge McGinn held yesterday that the taxicab ordinance is a reasonable regulation and within the power of the city commission to pass in denying the petition of A. W. Lafferty to restrain the city from enforcing the measure. Mr. Lafferty represented 27 "for hire" drivers.

CLAIM ALLOWED BY COUNTY

A. E. Clark Fee of \$800 in Poor Farm Case Settled.

An \$800 attorney's fee was allowed A. E. Clark by the county commissioners yesterday for his services in the foreclosure on the poor farm several years ago. The fee was allowed on the recommendation of District Attorney Evans.

Two Admitted to Practice

Henry B. Hazard and Seth Smith were admitted to practice in federal court this morning.

City Improvement Bonds Bring Offer of High Premiums

Street improvement bonds to the amount of \$26,852.85 brought high prices when bids were opened by Commissioner Bigelow this morning. Henry Teal offered a premium of \$6.75 for the entire amount and G. H. Henderson offered a premium of \$7 on a block of \$1500. The Lumbermen's Trust Co. was the lowest bidder, offering a premium of 6.5. The city council will tomorrow award \$25,152.86 of the bonds to Henry Teal and \$1500 to G. R. Henderson.

Bids on \$6954.40 in street extension bonds were also opened, with the Lumbermen's Trust Co. and the city being the only bidders. The bonds went to the city for sinking fund investments.

Lincoln Methodist Church Pastor Dies

Rev. G. G. Haley Leaves Wife, Daughter and Parents; Funeral Services Will Be Held Saturday.

Rev. G. G. Haley, pastor of the Lincoln Methodist church, died at the Good Samaritan hospital late yesterday afternoon. Mr. Haley is survived by his wife and daughter, Margery. The funeral services will be held Saturday in the Lincoln Methodist church at East Fifty-second and Lincoln streets. Rev. J. W. McDougall, superintendent of the Portland district, will have charge of the service. Mr. Haley was a native of Wisconsin and was 44 years of age. He came to San Francisco when 16 years of age. He attended the Willamette University and the Chicago Methodist University and had charge of congregations in St. Helens, Warrenton and La Grande, Oregon, Albion, Mackay, Blackfoot, Gooding, Payette and Boise, Idaho. His parents, Mr. and Mrs. Howard Haley, reside at 1694 Woolsey street.

ORGANIZERS' ARRIVAL BRINGS DIFFERENCES IN RANKS TO A FOCUS

Oregon Suffrage Leaders Take Position No Vote Instructions Necessary.

The arrival of Miss Margaret Whittemore and Miss Mary Gertrude Fendall, organizers of the Woman's party, in Portland has brought to a focus the difference between the members of the Congressional union and the National Suffrage association and marks the reopening of the fight that was made by the former organization two years ago during the campaign of Senator Chamberlain for reelection.

At that time members of the Congressional union came into Oregon for the avowed purpose of defeating Senator Chamberlain because he would not follow the directions of the organization in reference to the submission of the Susan B. Anthony amendment to the federal constitution providing for national woman suffrage.

Miss Whittemore and Miss Fendall have been sent to Oregon to organize the women of the state in a campaign hostile to the election of President Wilson and in the interest of Mr. Hughes. The Woman's party at its convention in California Springs directed that a fight be made against the reelection of President Wilson because he would not follow the demands of the party and attempt to force congress to pass the Susan B. Anthony amendment.

There is a wide cleavage between the plans of the Woman's party and those of the National Suffrage association. The latter believes that the militant propaganda of the Woman's party is not for the best interests of the suffrage cause. The big majority of Oregon suffrage workers are opposed to the National Suffrage association. The latter believes the campaign planned by the two organizers of the party who are planning to open headquarters in Portland.

The leaders of the suffrage cause in the state take the position that, having won their fight for the ballot, it is not necessary for them to be instructed how to cast their ballots. They believe that the activities of the members of the Woman's party could be directed with more effect in those states which have not extended the right of suffrage to women.

Dry Open Headquarters.

The union dry committee has opened headquarters in room 50a Journal building and is mapping out the details of the state wide campaign which it will conduct in the interest of the dry amendment to come before the people in November. Oswald West, chairman of the committee, will make a speaking tour of the state in support of the amendment and other speakers have been engaged. It is planned to send speakers into each of the counties of the state.

Pioneer Merchant Dies.

In the death of David Cole yesterday the ranks of the pioneer business men of Portland lost another member. David Cole came to Oregon 44 years ago and was engaged in the hardware business for over 40 years before retiring. He was 73 years of age and a native of Watertown, New York. He is survived by one daughter, Mrs. Winnifred McCarter, of Los Angeles, now en route to Portland. Three brothers are Frank, Reuben and Isaac Cole, of California. Mr. Cole was a member of Washington lodge, A. F. and A. M., Washington council Royal and Select Masters and Washington chapter, Royal Arch Masons.

NEGRO IS HURRIED TO JAIL IN AUTO WHEN BIG MOB APPEARS

Enraged Farmers Would Avenge Attack on the Wife of John Baber.

ONE SHERIFF IS INJURED

Officer of Law Who Refused to Release Prisoner's Hiding Place Is Threatened With Lynching.

Lima, Ohio, Aug. 31.—(U. P.)—The mob of enraged farmers who were seeking Charles Daniels, a negro, arrested and accused of attacking Mrs. John Baber, 24, wife of a farmer living three miles from here, dispersed today when news was received here that their quarry had been rushed from Ottawa to the Toledo jail.

Quiet settled over the countryside after Ottawa authorities informed Mayor Simpson of Lima that Sheriff Miller of Putnam county was speeding toward Toledo with the negro in a fast automobile and that it was useless for the farmers to continue their search.

Sheriff Taken to Hospital. Lima, Ohio, Aug. 31.—(U. P.)—A dozen posers of enraged farmers converged to search the countryside here today bent on lynching Charles Daniels, a negro, who attacked Mrs. John Baber, 24, a white woman, when she passed him food.

The negro has been jailed "somewhere in northwestern Ohio," but at an early hour today the frenzied mob had not discovered his location.

Meanwhile, Sheriff Sherman Ely of Allen county, lies in an Ottawa hospital with two broken ribs, a broken arm and a dozen cuts. He was man-handled by the mob when he refused at first to reveal the hiding place of the negro. Only after being threatened with lynching did he tell the frantic farmers the negro was in the Putnam county jail at Ottawa.

Despite his injuries, the bruised and bleeding sheriff was dragged into an automobile and rushed to Ottawa where it was learned the hunted negro had again been spirited away.

Shortly before the lynching party arrived at the Ottawa jail a closed automobile whizzed from the rear of the building. It is believed the negro was one of the two huddled figures in the machine and that he was taken to another jail in a nearby county.

Mrs. Baber, who expects a visit from the negro in the kitchen of her home while she was alone yesterday morning. When she refused the negro's demand for something to eat he slashed her throat with a razor and beat her over the head. One of her eyes was gouged out. It is believed she will die.

BUILDING ACTIVITY IS GOOD, CONSIDERING THE VACATION TIME

Postoffice Receipts for the Month Also Show Marked Increase Over Year Ago.

POSTAL SAVINGS CLIMB

Residence Construction Getting Into a More Satisfactory Condition—Building Permits Compared.

Vacation time and real estate deals, leasing and building activity, usually do not go well together, but August shows activity in all of these lines, despite the fact that many people are still rustivating at beaches and summer resorts.

August, 1916, shows a gain of \$4300 in receipts at the Portland postoffice over those of August, 1915, when they were \$93,500.

Deposits in the postal savings bank have increased \$47,000 in August, and are now \$1,150,000.

Building activity, as shown by the number and aggregate value of permits issued, shows a decrease for August over the same period last year, as well as a decrease over last month. As compared with last year, the character of building activity has changed considerably, from excessive hotel and business buildings to residential construction. This is partly responsible for the decrease. In character of residences constructed, there is a marked tendency to get away from the cheaper dwellings, and to erect more homes costing \$10,000 or over.

More representative, however, of the city's welfare and progress are the concrete evidences of business activity. In the past month, there has been a marked tendency of merchants to move from old locations to newer and more expensive sites, where elaborate alterations are being made.

Cedar District Has Need for a Change

Port Orford Man Says Economical and Saving Methods, With Improved Transportation Are Pressing Needs.

The famous Port Orford cedar district is in need of a real change in conditions, according to L. F. Gardner, Port Orford resident, who is in Portland.

An economical way of cutting ties from the cedar, stoppage of the enormous waste now the practice, and improvement of transportation means to and from Myrtle Point are the most pressing needs, declared Gardner.

The plants at work there are doing a good business, though on a small scale. In many cases the ties being hauled out of the logs instead of sawed, as should be done.

FAVORS ELECTION TO DECIDE UPON TERMS OF JITNEY FRANCHISE

Commissioner Baker Makes Suggestion After Fruitless Meeting of City Council.

Commissioner Baker would have the city council call a special election in November to allow the voters to determine the provisions of a franchise for jitneys. He suggested his plan to the council yesterday afternoon during the discussion of the jitney franchise but the council took no action.

The council members talked for another two hours yesterday without result. The session was enlivened by a verbal tilt between Commissioners Daly and Baker.

Commissioners Baker and Dieck want the jitneys to serve districts not served by streetcars, would have the jitneys give an indemnity bond to protect passengers in case of accidents and subject them to other regulations which they are not subjected to now.

Commissioner Daly told Commissioner Baker that his aim appeared to be to prevent the jitneys from competing with the Portland Railway, Light & Power company.

"I'm trying to protect all classes and treat them fairly," said Baker. "Why don't you prepare a franchise of your own?" Daly asked him. "So far you haven't suggested anything of a constructive nature."

"It's not in my department," answered Baker, "but if you feel as though you've failed, I will gladly draft a franchise."

Fighters Are Arrested.

As the result of a fight on the dock at the foot of Market street last night John Chitburn, John Champion, Eugene Bouten and Albert Martin, Astoria fishermen, were arrested by Patrolman Martin and held for investigation. Eleven participated in the battle, the police say, the four who were arrested being attacked by the others. Bouten, who is a half breed Indian, claims to have been robbed of \$10 during the melee.

New York Times Business Head Here

Louis Wiley on Tour of Pacific Coast—Trip Over Columbia River Highway Made This Morning.

Louis Wiley, business manager of the New York Times, is a Portland visitor today, on a tour of the coast. This morning he went out to the Columbia river highway.
