

PLAINTIFFS IN ACTION AGAINST FORD MOTOR COMPANY WIN AWARD

Federal Judge Directs Verdict
for Refund and Damages
to Two Eugene Men.

TREBLE DAMAGES ASKED

Motion Asks Defendant Company
Violated Anti-Trust Law and Seeks
to Have Damages Increased.

V. W. Winchell and F. M. Hathaway of Eugene won their suit against the Ford Motor company yesterday afternoon, when Judge R. S. Bean directed the jury to return a verdict in favor of the plaintiffs. The verdict awards the plaintiffs a refund of \$10,077.50 and \$5000 damages.

On the theory that the Ford company had violated the anti-trust law by its efforts to force the plaintiffs, who were agents of the company, to maintain a certain selling price on Ford automobiles, the plaintiffs immediately filed a motion asking that the amount of the damages awarded be trebled. The anti-trust law provides that victims of violations of the anti-trust law are entitled to three times the actual amount of damages suffered. Arguments on this motion will be heard next Monday.

Winchell and Hathaway had been dealing in Ford cars for several years, being known as Ford agents, and last spring their agency was cancelled because the company complained they were not maintaining the fixed price of Ford machines. The company took action to replevin the 37 cars the dealers had purchased from the company, and suit was brought in the federal court to recover the money the dealers had paid for the cars and for damages.

CONDITION WINS A PAROLE

Mamie Guggenheim Pleads Guilty;

Tuberculosis Brings Freedom.
Mamie Guggenheim, alias M. Grab-felder, M. Guggenheim and M. Gordon, pleaded guilty in the circuit court this morning to obtaining money by false pretenses, was sentenced to from one to five years in the penitentiary and paroled by Judge Davis. He was paroled because he is suffering from tuberculosis and must return to Texas.

Guggenheim was charged with drawing worthless checks on the Chicago Map & Polish company at the Benson and Franklin hotels on August 2 and 3, respectively. Each was for \$100. He went from there to El Paso, Texas, where he was arrested. He was being treated in an El Paso hospital when taken into custody, according to statements this morning.

Accident Followed by Suit.

A damage suit for \$15,175 was filed in the circuit court yesterday by Andrew F. McAttee against the Robert's Motor Car company, Gouin Wy and others. The suit is the result of an accident at Third and Morrison streets on August 19, in which McAttee was run over by a machine. He says that it was sold to a Chinese concern by the Roberts company, and that an employee of the company was teaching Gouin Wu to drive it.

Dr. Ausplund to Appeal.

Notice of appeal to the supreme court was filed this morning by attorneys for Dr. A. A. Ausplund, who was convicted of manslaughter in the circuit court on December 23, 1915, and sentenced to from one to five years in the penitentiary by Judge Kavanaugh. Dr. Ausplund was convicted of performing an illegal operation on Anna Anderson, who died in his office at Sixth and Washington street on October 16, 1915.

Cooperative Union Dissolved.

The Western Cooperative Rural Credit Union was dissolved yesterday by Judge Morrow. This action was taken on a plea entered by Deputy District Attorney Murphy. The union was charged with misuse of funds, and of not being in accord with the rural credits law. It was organized by A. C. Marsters and C. M. Hurlburt.

Pair Face Statutory Charge.

Saula Donovan and J. E. Haley have been bound over to the grand jury by District Judge Jones on a statutory charge. They were arrested Saturday on a complaint sworn to by Albert M. Donovan, the woman's husband. They waived preliminary hearing.

County Jail Sentence Imposed.

Fred Love and George Voglesang were sentenced to three months in the county jail this morning by Circuit Judge Davis when they pleaded guilty to larceny charges.

The funeral services for Montgomery G. Hall, for many years superintendent of the Northern Express company, were held yesterday afternoon from Finley's chapel. Dr. L. R. Dyott officiated at the service.

Apartment House Will Cost \$45,000

New Building Planned for Hartill and
Stout Streets; Other Apartment
Houses Are Planned.

Indicating the increased activity in building, and particularly in apartment house construction, is the proposed apartment house on Hartill and Stout streets, for which Carl Magnusson, manager of the Link Belt & Dodge Products company, has applied for a building permit. The contemplated building will be three stories high, part brick, and will cost about \$45,000.

Other apartment houses are planned for the near future, some are in process, and others will be completed. One of the largest in the city is the Imperial Arms apartment, built by R. F. Wassell, which is just being completed, and will be ready for occupancy in a few weeks. The cost is \$100,000.

Herbert Gordon of the Lawyers' Title & Trust company, is just beginning the construction of the Laurelhurst apartments at East Twenty-fifth and Belmont streets. The cost will be \$30,000.

Police Assert: Gangsters Stole 65
Quarts of Whiskey and Four Fights
Outcome of Indulgence in Liquor.

Thomas O'Keefe, 20 years old, was arrested last night by firemen as the result of a fight in front of the house of Engine 8, Rodney avenue and Russell street. O'Keefe is alleged to be one of a gang in Albina that has participated in many riots recently.

The police assert that the gang stole 65 quarts of whiskey from 816 Grand avenue north, Sunday and that the fight was caused by too much indulgence in the liquor by the gang members. Extra police will keep peace in Albina tonight. O'Keefe will be tried in municipal court tomorrow.

A youth known as Boston Slim was arrested with O'Keefe but escaped in a dash for liberty made by the pair. O'Keefe was severely beaten before he submitted to arrest. He is charged with being drunk and disorderly.

MRS. CATT PREDICTS BIG WAVE FOR EQUAL SUFFRAGE WILL COME

President of National Association
Addresses Convention on "The Crisis."

SAYS CAUSE IS GAINING

End of Present War Will Bring About
Sweeping Changes All over the
World, Speaker Says.

Atlantic City, N. J., Sept. 7.—(U. P.)—A mighty wave of democracy will sweep the world at the end of the present war, bringing with it the enfranchisement of women both in the United States and Europe, Mrs. Carrie Chapman Catt, president of the National Association for Woman Suffrage, declared at this afternoon's session of the national convention.

"Another tide of political liberty, similar to that of 1848, but of a thousandfold greater momentum, is rising from the battlefield and hospital, from camp and munition factory," said Mrs. Catt. "In Great Britain hundreds of bitter, active opponents have confessed their conversion on account of the war services of women. Above the roar of the cannon, the scream of shrapnel, and the whirr of the aeroplanes, one who listens may hear the cracking of fetters which have long bound the European woman to outworn conventions."

"Woman's Hour Has Struck."

"The woman's hour has struck. It has struck for the women of Europe and for those of all the world. If our own people possess the sense of patriotism and the sense of nationality which should be the inheritance of an American, they will not wait until the war is ended, but will boldly lead in the inevitable march of democracy, our own American specialty."

Mrs. Catt's subject was "The Crisis." The suffrage movement, she pointed out, had made rapid strides from 1910 to 1916 and is now approaching a crucial period when the suffrage leaders must put forth their greatest efforts. Particularly she urged women to awake from the passive attitude that "suffrage is bound to come."

"Our cause has won the indorsement of all political parties; every candidate for the presidency is a suffragist," she said.

"It has won the indorsement of most churches; it has the hearty approval of all great organizations of women. The majority of the press in most states is with us. Great men in every political party, church and movement are with us. The names of the greatest men and women of art, science, literature, philosophy, reform, religion and politics are on our lists."

Reactionaries Will Stand Pat.

"But we have not won the reactionaries of any party, church or society and we never will. We have not won the ignorant and illiterate and we never can. We have never won the forces of evil and we never will. As Speaker Champ Clark said the other day 'some good and intelligent people

are opposed to women suffrage; but all the ignorant and evil minded are against it."

"The liquor forces have developed an organized opposition, apparently supported by large funds, which have been an active factor in every campaign except two since 1890 and in those two, we won. The secretary of one state liquor association recently said to a man of honor that they would not allow another state to be carried for woman suffrage within the next 10 years."

"We know that in the Colorado campaign the brewers of Denver printed false statements and caused them to be put under the door of every house in the city. We know that in the last unsuccessful campaign in Oregon the order went out from the liquor forces to the saloons of the state to deliver a stated number of votes in opposition to the suffrage amendment. Every suffragist in Michigan seemed to agree that the amendment was counted out in the first campaign and that the ballots were stuffed in the second and that the agents were the liquor forces."

Believes Amendment Counted Out.

"The attorney general, who was serving at the time in Nebraska, has declared he believes the amendment was counted out there, and again the charges lie at the same door. The wet counties in Ohio certainly defeated the amendment there. The Boston & Maine railroad contributed to the defeat of the suffrage question in the constitutional convention of New Hampshire and afterward it was found that it had been in collusion with the liquor lobby. The brewers arrested on the federal charge of conspiracy in elections in Pittsburgh are supposed to have contributed large sums to defeat the question in four eastern campaigns."

"But the woman's hour has struck. Yet, if the call goes unheeded, if our women think it means a vote without a struggle, if they think other women can and will pay the price of their emancipation, the hour may pass and our political liberty may not be won."

Harrison Will Coach Reed.

FIRE PREVENTION TO BE CONSIDERED OCT. 9, SAYS THE MAYOR

Representatives of Every In-
dustry in City to Be Asked
to Join in the Program.

THE SCHOOLS ARE INVITED

Committee of 100 Business Men Will
Be Requested to Serve in Making
the General Arrangements.

Mayor Albee this morning designated Monday, October 9, as Fire Prevention day.

In conference with H. P. Coffin, chairman, and other members of the public safety commission, the mayor went over plans for the celebration, which will be the second annual day of dedication in the widely successful fire prevention work in this city.

Representatives of every industry and business in the city will be asked to participate, with employers and floats, in the big parade to take place at 3 o'clock that afternoon.

As many pieces of fire apparatus as can be spared from service will be entered in the parade, and these will carry banners showing the work that has been accomplished along fire prevention lines during the year.

The high schools will be asked to participate, and the student fire fighting organizations will march as parade units.

A committee of 100 business men will be asked to serve in the making of general arrangements.

Mayor Albee said that the public had contributed as largely in making the fire prevention work a success as had the fire bureau, and asks general participation in the celebration.

The public safety commission will meet next Tuesday to begin arranging for the event.

The fire prevention jubilation meeting will be held at the Chamber of Commerce during the noon hour, October 9, when various speakers will be heard from.

PASSES CROSSING ORDINANCE

Council Takes Step in Elimination
of Dangerous Places.

The city council yesterday afternoon passed an ordinance abolishing grade crossings on Sandy boulevard at East Forty-seventh, East Fifty-second, East Fifty-third, East Fifty-fifth, East Sixtieth, East Seventy-fourth, East Eighty-second and Halsey street and elsewhere. The report of the engineers on damages to property will be next prepared. All protests, objections and claims to injury to property put in by the owners were overruled or consideration was postponed until after the report of the engineers has been received.

Labor Takes Steps For World Congress

American Federation of Labor Will
Work for Improved Conditions After
European War.

Washington, Sept. 7.—(I. N. S.)—Proposals for a world labor congress, to be held simultaneously with a general peace congress at the close of the war, will be renewed by the American Federation of Labor, according to a statement issued here today by the federation's national officers. This step has been decided upon, it was said, despite the fact that the British trades unions had rejected the suggestion.

"We believe," said Frank Morrison, secretary of the federation, "that such a conference would have great weight in urging and presenting suggestions for the general welfare of humanity, as well as helping to determine the nature of the decisions reached by the peace conference."

The petitioner is willing to pay the same amount for it to the city as is now being received from jitney licenses. He offers on the second year to increase the amount by \$500 each year, to and including the fifth year; \$1000 a year to the tenth year; and after that \$10,000 a year until the expiration of 17 1/2 years. After the \$12,000 a year, The jitney drivers have asked for a partial franchise, and the two will probably be taken up together by the council.

To Buy Gasoline and Fuel Oil.

The city purchasing department is preparing specifications for bids for fuel oil and gasoline, the contracts for which expire September 30. About 22,000 gallons of fuel oil will be required. The gasoline bids last year were at 2 1/2 cents a gallon, and it is figured that the city has saved this last year \$12,000 on the two bids from the oil companies. The bids for the coming year will be prepared on a sliding scale to accompany the regular market price.

Overhead Crossing Completed.

Residents of the Reed college section were joyous today over the completion of the paying across the Pybus avenue viaduct spanning the Southern Pacific tracks. The work has been under way for a long time. For several days during the brief heated period car service was suspended over the viaduct because of the condition of the concrete base.

Adjourned Meeting Tomorrow.

An adjourned meeting of the city council will be held tomorrow at 11 a. m. Judgments against the city in suits against members of the police force will be considered. It is possible the jitney franchisees may be taken up.

Daily on Vacation.

City Commissioner Will Daily be spending four days' vacation on the Bull Run water reserve, and will go over it in a mixed business and pleasure trip.

Hotel Company Incorporated.

WILSON IS DENOUNCED BY HUGHES, 'POLICY OF SURRENDER' BLAMED

Adamson Bill "Not an Eight-
Hour Law, but a Wage
Law," Declares Candidate.

Hampton Beach, N. H., Sept. 7.—(U. P.)—"It is only one step to the abdication of government," was the characterization with which Charles Evans Hughes here today wound up a vigorous denunciation of the "policy of surrender to force" which he saw in President Wilson's hurrying through the eight hour law in attempting to avert the railroad strike.

The Republican nominee went further in his denunciation of the legislation than in any speech so far, and a crowd of about 1500 cheered him vociferously.

"It is not an eight hour law," he vehemently asserted; "it is a wage law."

Rule of Reason Given Up.
He referred to surrender of the "rule of reason," and declared:

"Against every effort of that sort by the hand of the executive, the authority of congress is hurrying through. We cannot surrender what we have won for free institutions in the country. We have won the right of free discussion, a free press, a democratic form of government, free assemblies and an executive chosen by the people. We have left autocracy and we have left tyranny and we have left force. They shall not come back if we can help it."

"We have had recently, at the proposal of the executive, an act passed by congress, confessedly in ignorance of what justice demands; confessedly in ignorance of what the facts require. No One Knows If Law Is Just.

"It is not an eight hour law; it is a wage law, and no one knew whether it was just or not. It may be just, but I am against arbitrary action like that, which strikes a blow at the fundamentals of our institutions. I propose in what we do we shall investigate first and then legislate; not legislate first and then investigate."

Hughes carried his fight for votes into New England today. For the next four days he will be campaigning strenuously in Maine.

Arriving here the nominee and Mrs. Hughes motored to Hampton Beach, where a brief noon speech was made. Returning to Portsmouth, Hughes was to speak there and later at York Harbor, Maine. He planned to motor from York Harbor to Portland for a night meeting. A brief stop was planned for a rear-end platform speech at Beverly, Mass., on the return trip.
