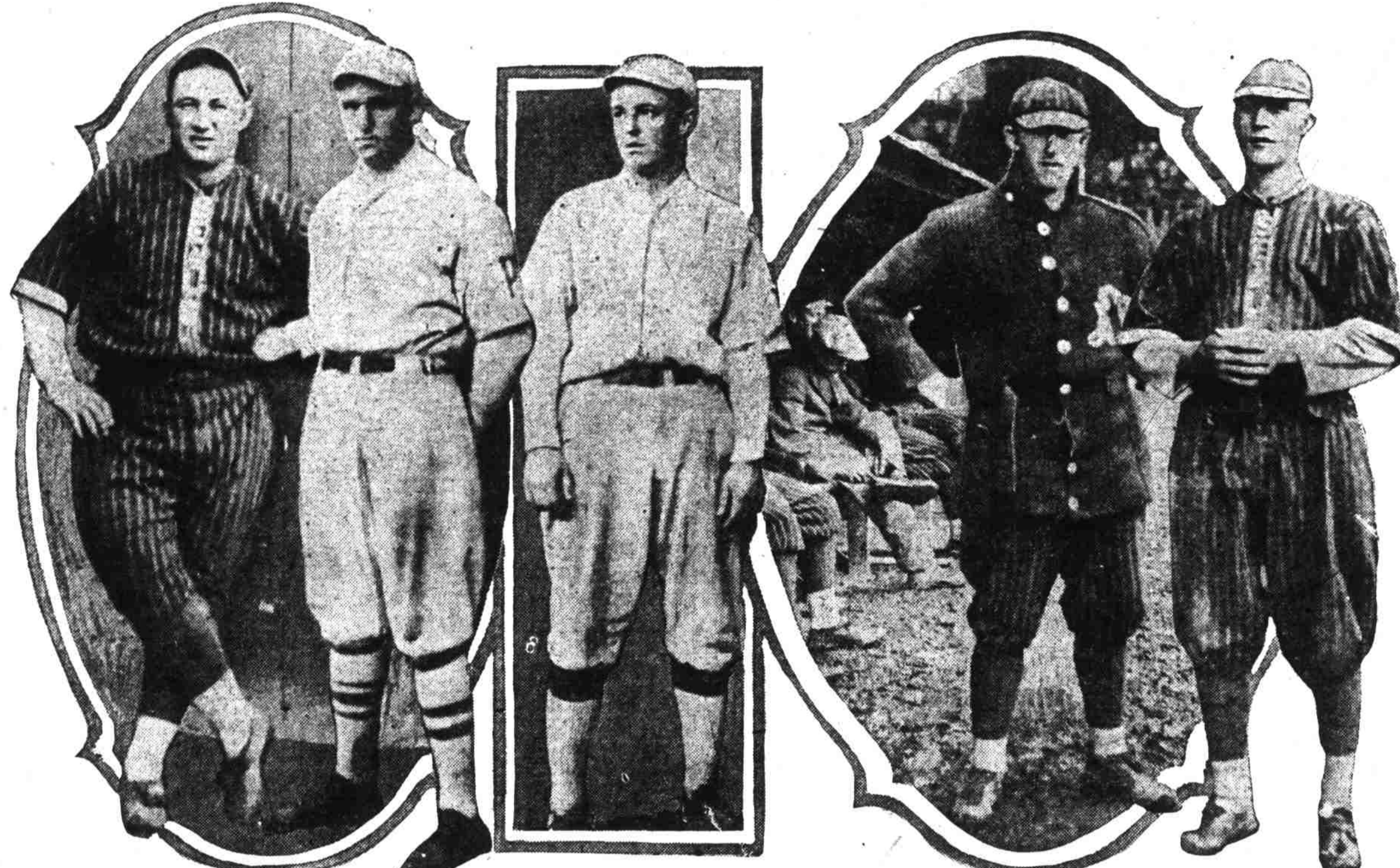


Newcomers and Veterans of Portland and San Francisco Baseball Clubs Two Coast Players Who Will Graduate to Majors and Two Just Breaking In
