

WOMEN OF EASTERN OREGON ARE PUTTING FAITH IN PRESIDENT

Certain Faction Has Taken the Name "Wilson Republicans," It Is Declared.

REPORT IS SUBMITTED

J. L. Day, Chairman, Announces Three Speakers; A. A. Courtney Tells of His Trip in Eastern Oregon.

"The women of eastern Oregon are largely for Wilson; there is dissatisfaction in that section of the state by both men and women who normally are Republicans, but who are calling themselves 'Wilson Republicans.' There is little enthusiasm manifest in the national campaign because the farmers are busy harvesting amid abounding prosperity."

This was the report that startled some 50 or 60 Hughes enthusiasts who attended a meeting at Central library last night of the Hughes alliance, and was made by no less a person than the Hughes alliance's own official, State Organizer A. A. Courtney.

Courtney Gives Report.

This was a called meeting of the alliance and was held under the auspices of the Republican county central committee. J. L. Day, chairman of the county committee, presided. Mr. Day announced that there would be three speakers address the meeting. He said that the first would be Mr. Courtney, who had just returned from eastern Oregon after making a thorough canvass of that part of the state and that Mr. Courtney would give a report on political conditions east of the mountains and also would favor the speakers with a few words on organization.

Steam Disappears.

Mr. Courtney, who wound up his talk with the expression of a belief that Hughes would get a good vote in eastern Oregon, seemed to take considerable of the steam out of the meeting and not much real interest was evinced in the remarks of those who followed and who undertook to create enthusiasm in favor of the Republican standard bearer.

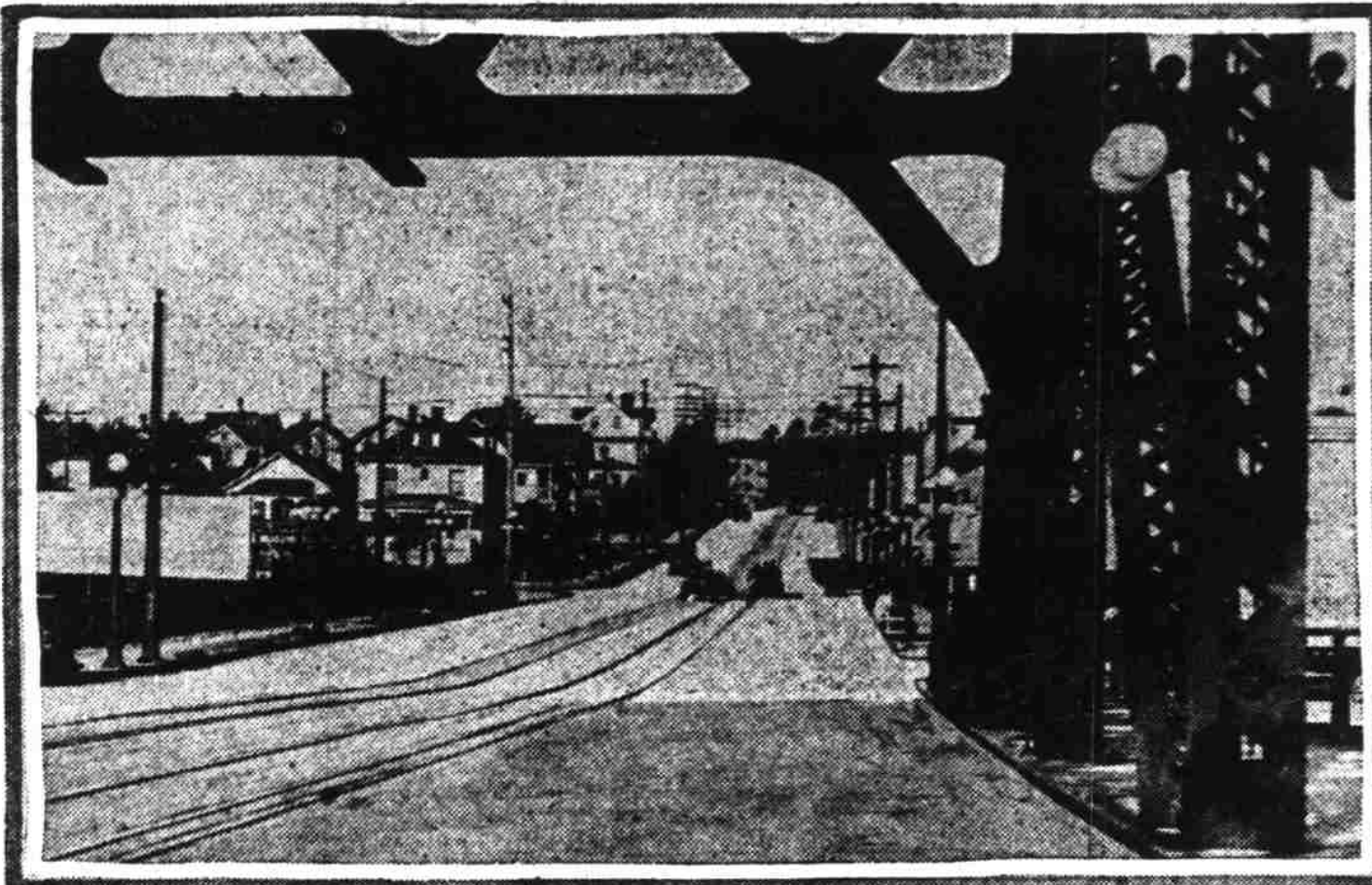
Methodists South Close Conference

IMPORTANT EAST SIDE ARTERY NOW OPEN FOR TRAFFIC

Following a period of reconstruction beginning June 20, Broadway from Larrabee street to Union avenue was opened to traffic Sunday.

Exclusive of car track work improvements aggregating \$45,000 have

made in way of regrading, widening and paving and the elimination of a reversal curve. The grade has been reduced from 6 to 4 per cent and for part of the street the curb has been set back five feet.

The improvements were made under the supervision of the city engineer. Completion of the work throws open one of Portland's principal arteries and relieves congestion over the steel bridge which has resulted during the closing of Broadway.

SALMON FISHING ON COQUILLE IS OPEN; RUN IS ONLY FAIR

Cannery Recently Bought by Macleay Estate and One Owned by Nass Running.

Marshfield, Or., Sept. 13.—The salmon fishing season on the Coquille river has opened and two canneries are in operation. One is the Coquille Cannery company plant which was recently purchased by the Macleay Estate company of Portland. This is the first season that the new owners have operated. C. F. Johnson is manager for the company. The other plant is owned by Mr. Nass of Astoria who has operated on the river for several years past. Both plants are using seines and each works on a different side of the river.

The run of fish so far has been only fair, but it is expected that later in the season it will be better.

The run of fish in Coos bay has not yet been big but it is not expected to amount to much until October.

First Coal Over New Line.

Marshfield, Or., Sept. 13.—The first carload of coal to be shipped over the new Coos Bay line has been received by George Doll, manager of the Libby mine, from E. H. Minner of Harrisburg. The local coal operators have been soliciting in the Willamette valley in the hopes of securing a market for the coal in that part of the state now that the railroad is in operation, and this is the first order that has been received. It is believed that there may be a big market for Coos bay coal created in other parts of the state where coal is not produced.

Election Held Void.

Marshfield, Or., Sept. 13.—Judge Skipworth of Eugene has handed down a decision in the case of the recall election of two directors of the school board of Eastside. In this election W. B. Byerly and Mrs. Irving Hadlock were recalled and Messrs. Steckel and Nelson elected in their place. The judge holds that the election was void. He said that the present law governing recalls did not apply to school directors.

Crew of Great Bear Has Reached Seattle

Only High Praise Given Master and Mate of Arctic Schooner Lost on Pinnacle Rock August 10.

Seattle, Sept. 13.—(P. N. S.)—Members of the crew of the Arctic schooner "Great Bear" wrecked on Pinnacle rock August 10, arrived here Tuesday from Nome.

Only high praise for Captain Louis Lane and First Mate John Borden, the Chicago sportsman, is expressed by the crew.

Those here include H. A. Erickson of San Diego, cinematographer; Walter Brandt, Los Angeles, taxidermist; H. S. Mott, second officer, and others.

Miss Anita Allen, the Stanford university girl, who was to have met the Great Bear in Nome and continue north, arrived but left at once for the south. She is the niece of Captain Lane.

Cheese Plant at Stanfield Is Burned

Fire Believed to Have Started in Electric Motor; Loss Amounts to \$5000; Another Building Is Leased.

Stanfield, Or., Sept. 13.—Originating from an electric motor, it is believed, fire broke out in the Stanfield cheese factory at 2 o'clock Tuesday morning, destroying the entire plant. It is estimated that the loss amounts to \$5000.

The factory was owned by A. Sahli and the building by E. W. McCormish of Pendleton. Both building and plant are covered by insurance.

The electric motor in the ice plant was left running and it is thought it became overheated and started the fire. Mr. Sahli has leased another building temporarily in Stanfield and will operate his cheese factory with the limited facilities at hand until a new factory can be constructed. This will be built at once.

Paulina, Or., Store Destroyed by Fire

Loss Is \$40,000, All Insured, When Blaze, Believed Incendiary, Wipes Out Stock of New Gilkey Store.

Prineville, Or., Sept. 13.—The new Gilkey store near Paulina, which was burned early Monday, carried approximately a \$40,000 stock of goods, well insured. The fire is supposed to have been of incendiary origin.

The store is backed financially by the Oregon & Western Colonization company and was free of serious encumbrance. Mr. Gilkey had been doing a large business among the stock men in the Paulina section. This cut off a large source of revenue from Prineville.

Along with the stock and buildings Mr. Gilkey lost two new auto trucks recently purchased to handle the business.

American Held as Spy.

Los Angeles, Cal., Sept. 13.—(P. N. S.)—After spending six months in a New Zealand prison as a German spy, and securing his release only on the representations of American officials, G. V. Hugo, a native of San Francisco, and said to be the inventor of smokeless powder, is in Los Angeles again today.

SALEM BANK COMES TO AID OF FARMERS WHO RAISED FLAX

Growers Will Be Paid Off on Assurance of Recommendation to Legislature.

\$15,000 AMOUNT NEEDED

State Board of Control Had Been Refused Amount of Money to Wipe Out Deficit.

Salem, Or., Sept. 13.—Although the emergency board followed Attorney General Brown's advice Monday and declined to give authority to create a deficiency of \$15,000 for the flax industry, Ladd & Bush's bank of Salem agreed Tuesday afternoon with the state board of control to pay off farmers with whom the state has contracts for flax straw. It is estimated that this will take about \$15,000. The only promise made by the board of control to secure the payment of the money by the bank to the farmers was that it would recommend to the 1917 legislature that it make an appropriation to pay the bank's claim.

The agreement of the bank to pay off the claims of the farmers is important to them, for otherwise they would have had to wait until the session of the legislature next January and February. At the emergency board meeting Monday it was figured that there would be sufficient funds secured from the sale of products of the flax plant to keep the manufacturer in progress until the first of the year, but none to pay the farmers for their flax.

Fifty Cars Better Off.

Salem, Or., Sept. 13.—The car shortage on the Southern Pacific railroad was less acute Tuesday, totaling 1470. The highest previous record was on Monday, when the shortage was 1544 cars.

Navy League Replies To Answer of Ford

Auto Manufacturer Called Coward for Attempting to Shield Himself Behind Congressman Who Is Shielded.

Washington, Sept. 13.—(P. N. S.)—The Navy league has issued a long statement referring to the answer filed Monday by Henry Ford to the league's \$100,000 libel suit against him. Part of it reads:

"The league is not surprised that so unimpaired an individual should demonstrate his cowardice by thus attempting to shield himself behind a congressman who is in turn shielded by the privilege of house of representatives on the floor of which statements either true or false may be made with impunity."

Representative Clyde H. Tavenner of Illinois is the congressman referred to.

The league says that Mr. Ford failed, however, to attribute many of his other "libelous statements" to the congressman and is thus personally responsible. The league also says it could have got Mr. Ford directly within jurisdiction by filing duplicate suits in other cities than Washington.

Dry Spellbinders Are Due Saturday

Presidential Nominee Frank J. Hanly Among Those Who Will Pass Through This State on Tour.

Traveling in two private cars—the Ellysium and the Stoneleigh—the official round-the-circle spellbinders of the prohibition party will pass through Oregon next Saturday.

Arriving over the O. & N. from his north Friday night, pulling out at 4 a. m. Saturday and slipping over the Oregon-California line Sunday, the expedition will stop for brief attention to the chief Willamette towns.

In the party are Presidential Nominee Frank J. Hanly, Vice Presidential Nominee Ira Landreth and Oliver W. Stewart, chairman of the national committee, besides some 27 others of varying degrees of political importance.

The train will reach Salem at 7 o'clock Saturday morning; pull out at 8:30 and reach Albany at 9:15; stay at Albany half an hour and get into Eugene at 11; staying at Eugene till 11:30 and reaching Roseburg at 2:30. Thirty minutes is to be allotted Roseburg also, and the party will reach Grants Pass at 6:50, leaving at 7:20 and reaching Medford at 8:20. Half an hour there, too, the train will proceed to Ashland, arriving at 9:25.

The prohibitionists will stop for the night at Ashland and pull out for Dunsmuir, Cal., at 1 o'clock Sunday afternoon.

Company Consents To a Receivership

W. D. Wheelwright yesterday filed suit against the Stanley-Smith lumber company, asking for the appointment of a receiver. In an answer filed at the same time, the company consents to the appointment of a receiver.

Mr. Wheelwright asserts that the company, which owns a sawmill and plant in Hood River county, has debts amounting to \$275,000, of which \$202,000 is for an outstanding bond issue, and that unless a receiver is appointed the company will become insolvent. Mr. Wheelwright says he owns 10 shares of the company's stock, having a par value of \$100 a share, and is a creditor of the company in the sum of \$10,000 and interest.

Visit to Southern Oregon Is Planned

Emery Olmstead Chairman of Delegation Which Will Make the Trip of Inspection on September 26.

Portland is about to pay to southern Oregon its long deferred visit. Urged by R. B. Miller, vice president of the Twohey Bros. company that the developments in sugar beet culture and manufacture around Grants Pass and the railroad extension toward the California coast were not sufficiently understood or appreciated here, the Chamber of Commerce has appointed Emery Olmstead chairman of a delegation which will make the inspection trip September 26.

Mr. Olmstead is working up added interest in the trip, which will be in no sense a trade excursion. Mr. Miller has long cherished the idea that Portland could share in the pioneering work now going on as well as in the later benefits.

Details of the visit are being worked out, largely in accordance with the wishes of those who will be in the party.

Allies' Buyer Here To Purchase Grain

Paul Klopstock in Portland on Second Recent Tour; Horses and Mules Object of Former Visit.

Paul Klopstock, buyer for the allies in the United States, is in Portland. Rumor is that grain is the chief commodity sought on this trip through the Pacific northwest, though previous trips have been in search of horses and mules.

Klopstock is registered at the Portland hotel from New York.

Newberg, Or., Sept. 13.—The Newberg Telephone company, which recently completed a building especially adapted to its business, gave a reception to the public Monday afternoon and evening which was well attended. Much additional equipment has been secured and the establishment is now one of the best of its size in the country.

COLONEL BELIEVES HE HAS THE HALTER ON MOOSE NECK AGAIN

Ex-Progressive Leader Starts Trying to Put Additional "Pep" in Campaign.

Oyster Bay, N. Y., Sept. 13.—(I. N. S.)

Colonel Roosevelt Tuesday began the job of putting more "pep" into the Republican campaign, a job assigned him last week by Republican managers. The colonel during the day received a number of Republican leaders at Sagamore Hill and was in telephonic communication frequently with Republican headquarters in New York.

The result of the Maine election and the more active participation of Roosevelt in the campaign brought broad smiles of satisfaction to the faces of Republican solons who journeyed to Oyster Bay. The colonel also, after he had teased his hat into the ring, beamed his satisfaction at the Maine results. He was especially pleased with a huge pile of telegrams from all parts of the country complimenting him for his part in the Maine fight and giving him most of the credit for the result.

"It's fine, very fine. I am very glad," grinned the colonel, when he was asked for his opinion on the result. He would make no other comment. Those who have talked with him, however, said he is highly gratified that the bulk of the 1912 Progressive vote was found in the Republican column this year. He takes this as an indication, it was said, that the rank and file of the Bull Moose party have buried their resentment and are still following his leadership. The Republican leaders were also of this mind.

The colonel's speechmaking plans have not been changed and will not be unless something occurs to make a change imperative. He will make five more speeches, the next one at Battle Creek, Mich., the end of this month.

Connecticut Soldiers On Border to Vote

Legislature Will Today Enact a Law Permitting Guardmen to Participate in the November Election.

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 13.—(I. N. S.)—For the first time in 53 years Connecticut guardmen may vote out of the state. The legislature today will enact a law permitting its soldiers doing border duty in Arizona to vote at the November election.

Though nobody is expected to test the new law, there is a general belief that it will be unconstitutional and that the proper remedy is not a legislative act, but a constitutional amendment.

This would take three years to adopt and ratify.

In his message Governor Holcomb suggested that no business be considered other than the field voting bill, and possibly an act to aid soldiers' dependents.
